## LOCAL BRIEFS

### Latest News of the City and Province.

#### By Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

Yesterdays's C.P.R. contained a large number of exodians to the United States, all of an unusually high class of people. Prominent among the number was H. W. Anderson, formally mechanical superintendent of the Island Railway, Charlottetown, and his family of five. Mr. Anderson was on his way to New York to join his three sons, who have positions there. As a by-stander remarked at the station: "It is indeed to be regretted that men of this class cannot find work in this country." Mr. Anderson's friends hope to see him back again. He is well known by the militia men here, as he was one of the prominent rifle shots on the Island, and a member of the Engineer company, Charlottetown. St John Sun.

A CORRESPONDENT writes: "If the public were to assert itself in the matter of public bathing houses it would be decided at once to install a proper and well equipped house at a point convenient to the citizens of Charlottetown. Despite the declaration by some of the officials Charlottetown has not got a bathing house. True there are one or two sheds on the Boulevard but they are condemned "on sight." In the neighboring republic many of the bathhouses are well operated by private enterprise, and the charges are not high. There is to be found the care in disinfecting both bath room and suit each time after used, for instance, and the frequent renewals of brushes and comb several times a day, and, in fact, all those sanitary details which are not a feature of even the best regulated private bath. Bath houses are among the considered necessities to life and should be placed within the reach of all."

#### Interesting to Farmers.

The report for 1899 of the Department of Agriculture, recently issued contains some interesting facts bearing on the exports of what may be called agricultural manufactures that speak well for the country, both as to capacity of soil and population. Perhaps the most striking of these are in connection with hog products. Canada up to 1890 was a large importer of pork and pork meats, her exports being not much over half a year. Last year the value of pork, bacon and ham sent abroad was \$10,478,211, nearly \$10,000,000 being the contribution of the bacon curers. Bacon, indeed, is now second only to cheese in the list of agricultural exports, and the trade gives promise of still further development. Cheese, with \$16,776,705 of exports, stand at the head of the list, while butter gets credit for \$3,700,873, an increase of \$1,700,000 over 1898. The large recent increase in exports is, however, to a considerable extent, only a recovery of old ground. Twenty years ago butter was a proportionately important feature in the export trade. As the cheese factory system developed it fell off, and only in the past five years has it begun to recover. The factory system and the cold storage service have been to its advantage, as the steady increase shows. The profit to the country from these advanced agricultural industries has been marked, and there is every prospect that it will grow with years, and extend to other lines of products. The report speaks of an improving market abroad for Canadian oatmeal, due in considerable part to the climatic and soil conditions that enable some parts of Canada to produce the highest quality of oats, and, in part, to the favor that oatmeal has attained as a food for others than horses and Scotsmen. Canadian flour, also, is gaining a reputation for high qualities that will be of benefit to all concerned. The value of the flour exports last year was \$3,195,288, and altogether, the value of the advanced products referred to sent out of the country in 1899 was over \$30,000,000, nearly \$6 a head of the population.
