dom loan. The loan was obviously important to Canada which had granted a \$1,250,000,000 loan to Britain on the condition that the American one was approved by Congress.

Norman Jacques (S-C-Wetaskiwin) dealt particularly with the policy of his party and said Social Credit could be defined as Christian nationalism. He referred to a series of addresses he made in the United States and said their purposes was to bring about a better understanding between the United States and the British peoples.

Mr. Adamson said Canada was going to suffer if she did not protect her currency and one of the best ways of protecting it was through the production of gold.

Production was the answer to Canada's problems and he felt the Dominion should be importing British industries and a large number of people from the British Isles.

Mr. Benedickson said he could think of nothing that would help Canada more than an increase in the price of gold in the United States.

"cause celebre." He asked the jurors to put out of their minds that they had ever heard about the home or the Youngs and to confine themselves to evidence in the case from which they might draw inferences.

A modern definition of defamatory libel was "a false and damaging statement."

Local Milk Producers Hear Interesting Talk

Dr. Harold Shaw, provincial pathologist, addressed the Charlottetown Milk Producers' and Vendors' Association at its semi-annual meeting held last night in Prince of Wales College.

Mr. Major MacRae, president of the Association, presided. At the outset of his address Dr. Shaw emphasized that he was addressing the Association on the subject of milk from the health point of view and not from an economic one.

Resolutions were passed expressing confidence in the leadership of the Hon. John Bracken and provincially of the Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan. Resolutions were also passed expressing appreciation of the record of Mr. Heath Strong and pledging support of both candidates.

Two Types Organisms—There are two types of organisms found in milk, he said. These comprise the organisms which are normally found in milk and are harmless; and those that get into milk and which very often may cause disease to the consumer.

Bacteria in milk, whether harmful or not, multiply so rapidly in milk that is of suitable temperature for their growth that one bacterium can multiply to 8,228,408 in eight hours. To prevent that multiplication is the great problem confronting every producer of milk.

Harmless organisms found in milk may come from the teats of the cow, from the dust in the barn, or from traces of milk left in bottles or utensils. Harmless though they may be from the standpoint of disease, they can and do change the milk. They make it sour; in other cases, they change parts of the milk to putrid, foul-smelling substances.

Milk-borne diseases caused by harmful bacteria which has gotten into the milk include typhoid fever, diarrhoeal infections, diphtheria, tuberculosis, and many other diseases less known by the average person.

Stringent milk-control regulations have cut down the mortality rate among infants in Montreal. Dr. Shaw said, from 183 per 1,000 per live births for the five-year period, 1915-1919, to 69 in 1944. Since 1927, no case of typhoid fever in Montreal had been ascribed to pasteurized milk.

Dr. Shaw then went on to enumerate several methods for the testing of milk including the plate count and the methylene blue tests. The amount of butter fat in milk had nothing to do with its healthful qualities, Dr. Shaw said, as those were determined solely by whether or not it contained harmful bacteria.

In concluding, Dr. Shaw said he believed an adequately trained individual in each County would be able to assist both the producer and the processor to improve the quality of their product.

Up for nomination so far are Halifax Mayor Ahern; Dan Wallace, who resigned as national film board secretary to offer for the nomination; Barrister John H. Dickey; and John A. West, deputy mayor of Dartmouth which is included in the Halifax riding.
