Says Berry Told Of Quarreling With His Wife

George H. Prosser Relates Interview With the Defendant

HOPEWELL CAPE, May 6—In the Albert circuit court yesterday the case of the King vs Ezekiel Berry, charged with murdering his wife, Minnie Berry, was begun by T. T. Goodwin, and R. C. Rand, of Moncton, and the defence, by U. King, of Petitoadac, and James Friel, of Moncton. The prisoner on being arraigned pleaded not guilty.

The following petit jury was sworn to try the case: Charles A. Bray, William McCray, Hanford Irving, Eastman Steeves, Howard Woodworth, Stillman Anderson, W. Wilbur, W. H. Kinney, Arthur M. Casey, Medford Dickson, Howard Barker, German Day, Mr. Goodwin opened the case for the crown.

Mr. Friel on behalf of the prisoner opened with strong objection to the opening of the crown prosecutor and said it was no opening at all as it did not go over the evidence to be produced by the crown and did not say what the prosecution was going to prove. He further asked that Chief Justice McKown order the crown to furnish particulars of the case. His honor said he would not dictate to the crown what it should do.

George H. Prosser, Complainant, the first witness for the crown, was called 11.40.

On the court resuming this afternoon the direct examination of George H. Prosser was continued by Mr. Rand.

The witness noticed that the day dress on Mrs. Berry's body was open at the neck. He also noticed a little water on the floor. The accused told the witness that at 6.30 in the morning he followed his wife's tracks to an old engine and saw something lying on the water. At first he could not tell whether it was his wife or a log. He, Berry, came back to the house and cooked pancakes and got his breakfast and then went down and got the body of his wife and carried her up half way. He then got a hand sled and hauled her the rest of the way to the house. Berry told the witness that he came home a week previous to his wife's death and she was ugly then and had been ugly ever since. He had three children with his wife and quarrelled with her Saturday night of the tragedy. Berry showed the witness where he had found the body of his wife in the water. The witness helped move the body in Berry's house and lay out the body. The body was then limp and warm. He saw truth on Mrs. Berry's lip.

Mr. Prosser under cross-examination by Mr. Friel said that he saw three foot tracks on the snow at the house, three at the engine and three by a culvert.

Mrs. Blanche Prosser, wife of the last witness, told of Berry going to their home on December last, and witness went with her husband to the Berry home. She saw the body of Mrs. Berry there and noticed marks on the body as described by her husband Mrs. Berry's hair was not very wet. The witness did not think the accused felt very badly the day of her death.

The next witness called was Margaret Bannister. She had known Mrs. Berry thirty years. She went to the house of her accused on the day of his wife's death. She noticed the body of the wife and the

FEEDING DUCKLINGS

Ducklings should not be fed for thirty-six hours after being hatched. Practically all food given them until they are ready for market as green ducks should be ground grains in the form of a moist mash. They are voracious feeders and grow rapidly. They require feeding five times daily, especially at the start. For the first week a good ration consists of equal parts of bran, cornmeal and middlings, with five per cent, sand to serve as grit. After the first week, five per cent, meat scraps may be added and the ration could be made more of a growing ration by having two parts of bran to one each of cornmeal and middlings. After the first or second week cut alfalfa or some kind of green food should be added to the mash food. It should be pointed out that the ground grain should always be slightly moistened with water or skim milk.
