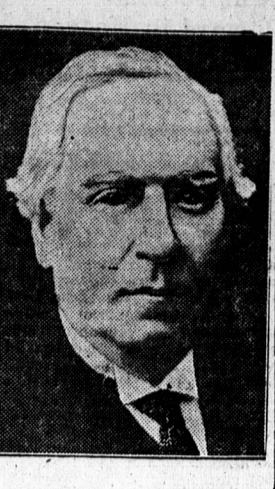

EGG LAYING CONTEST

Notes on the P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest for the 16th week ended February 20, 1926.

This weeks total of 587 eggs was an increase of 8 eggs over the production of last week. Owing to unfavorable weather conditions, however, production to date is now below that for the same date last year.

Mr. G. F. Connor's White Leghorns lead for the week with 43.7 points (49 eggs) Experimental Farm, White Leghorns, pen 4 were second with 40.7 points (45 eggs) Experimental Farm, White Leghorns, pen 3, were third with 36.1 points (41 eggs).

Mr. Talmage Foster's Barred Rocks lead the Contest to date with 45.2 points. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns are second with 40.3 points. Experimental Station, White Leghorns pen 1, are third with 39.6 points. Experimental Station, pen 4, are fourth with 37.5 points and Mr. Charles McKenna's Barred Rocks are fifth with 35.4 points.

The total number of eggs to date is 6794. Four small eggs were disallowed during the week being under-weight.
