CANADA WINS THE BLUE RIBBON MARATHON EVENT

John C. Miles, Sydney Mines, N. S., Defeats Field of 1 1/2 Stars, Breaking the Record of Clarence Demor, Made in 1924. Time Two Hours, Twenty-five Minutes, Forty and Two-fifth seconds.

BOSTON, April 19—Canada won nearly five minutes behind the Blue Ribbon Marathon event of the United States today when John C. Miles of Sydney Mines, N. S., defeated a field of 1 1/2 stars, breaking the record of Clarence Demor, made in 1924. Time two hours, twenty-five minutes, forty and two-fifth seconds. Miles also was fairly fresh after the hard struggle over track stars today in winning the Boston A. A. Marathon in the record time of two hours, twenty-five minutes, forty and two-fifth seconds. The old record set in 1924 by Clarence Demor, noted United States distance runner, over the same course of 26 miles, 385 yards was two hours, twenty-nine minutes, forty and one-fifth seconds. Miles appeared fresh as he broke won the event, was third to finish the tape at the Exeter Street club house of the Boston Amateur A. A. after the gruelling grind held over the official Olympic distance. Albin Stenroos of Finland, Olympian Marathon Champion, finished time was 2:34.03 2/5.

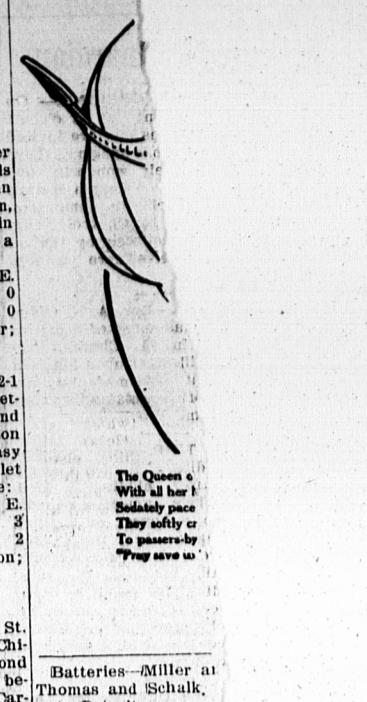

MONTREAL, April 19.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was improved and exporters worked at moderate amount of business. The trade in cash grain was quiet. There was little demand from exporters or local buyers, but as the offerings were not large the tone of the market was firm. Prices for spring and winter wheat grades of flour were well maintained under a good enquiry. The undertone to the market for all lines of millfeed was steady and the volume of business transacted was fairly large. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was slow but prices were unchanged. The egg market was without any new feature to note. Prices for butter were reduced 1 1/2 to 2 cents per pound. The cheese trade was extremely dull.
