Chinese Make New Gains In Burma

CHUNGKING, Nov. 20—Chinese troops are fighting inside Bhamo, strongest remaining Japanese base in North Burma, and have recaptured Mungshih, 82 miles inside China from the Burma border, the Chinese High Command announced today.

Against these Allied victories, the high command announced today, directly that two great Japanese forces aggregating probably 260,000 troops who are invading Kwang-chow province from the east and north had completed a junction west of Leuchow, severing China and completing an unbroken link all the way from Manchuria to Hong Kong.

The Tokyo Radio in a broadcast recorded by the federal communications commission, declared that the United States air force bombed the air field at Mungshih, about 100 miles southwest of the point where the Japanese junction appeared to have been effected. The unconfirmed report said the Manning bomber was the sole enemy air base in South China.

R. C. N. Efficiency In Handling Mail For Personnel

OTTAWA — A Christmas parcel for anyone in the Royal Canadian Navy would have to work overtime to get lost or mislaid, or even turn up late on board any of His Majesty's Canadian Ships. The Canadian Fleet Mail offices have a water-tight system of recording every one of them, large or small.

Because the Navy handles all its own mail separately, they can use their own system of handling letters and parcels destined for shore establishments in Canada, the United States and Great Britain and extend, as well as for every Canadian ship at sea. Fleet Mail workers have to know where every ship of the R. C. N. will be at any given date, and their officers work closely with the Operations section of the Navy.

Parcels Go Direct

Parcels mailed to any sailor, officer or Wren in Canada go direct to the Fleet Mail Office where they are stationed; for naval personnel overseas or at the east coast, they go to Fleet Mail, Halifax. The Navy records each parcel, with the name of the sender and the man or woman it is going to, and makes three copies of that list. The parcels go into sealed Navy bags, which are numbered and Fleet Mail knows exactly what parcels are in every mail bag, when the bag left the Base and where it went.

Base mail office returns one receipt, certifying that the bags arrived there containing those certain people, and when the sailor gets his parcel handed out in the mail on board ship, he signs the third receipt which completes the series. It's a pretty thorough system and takes a larger staff, according to Fleet Mail officers here, but no loss of time is involved in handling these parcels; they go right through in the usual quick order.

In Case Of Fire

If there were a fire and any bags of Navy mail were burned, records would show exactly what parcels were missing or damaged, to whom they were addressed, and where they had come from. Sufficient information is recorded to identify any particular parcel, and they could probably be replaced at once.

Intricate timing is involved in ensuring that Christmas mail arrives on time in the Navy, and Wrens and sailors who work in Fleet Mail offices have to be conversant with huge index and filing systems which show where every member of the naval service is at the moment. Unlike army or air force organization, naval personnel are moved from one unit to another when they are drafted, and do not retain the same regimental, unit or squadron address.

Stresses Great Thirst of Overseas Troops for Hometown News

OTTAWA, Nov. 20 — (CP) — Back from a tour of European battlefronts, Joseph W. G. Clark, Director-in-Chief of Public Relations of the armed forces, said in an interview here tonight that Canadians at home would do well to prepare themselves mentally for understanding returning war veterans.

"Some of them have been away six Christmases," he said. "They have mingled with the fighting men of other countries, they have travelled half the globe, they have faced death and they have learned to make great decisions."

"They are used to close comradeships — many of which are international and inter-Empire in scope — and they don't understand narrow and parochial mentalities."

"In truth they are citizens of the world with broad horizons and we must be prepared to bring ourselves up to their level when they return. That is the understanding they will rightly expect."

He spoke of the great thirst for hometown news he noticed throughout his tour.

"They can't seem to get enough news of the neighborhood type and they all ask the same question: 'Why don't the folks at home fill in on our changes such as the new grocery store or new paving on Green Street or who is president of the local bowling league?'"

This War—Four Years Ago

NOV. 22, 1940—British bombers caused heavy damage at Stavanger, an airbase in Norway. R. A. F. bombers Bari and Taranto harbours. Greeks captured Koriza; all Italians reported driven from Greece; soil Turkish government proclaimed martial law in nearly all sections of country.



Fighting bitterly and at times fanatically, the Germans have taken advantage of every natural obstacle in the Lowlands of Holland and Belgium to hold back the Allied advance. The first Canadian Army staged a miniature invasion of their own as one point in Holland, sending amphibious forces across water to hit the enemy at an unexpected water. Tactics such as these, have almost cleared water approaches to the port of Antwerp, badly needed as a supply port for future operations. At left Canadian soldiers with their landing vehicles and equipment get ready to embark on their amphibious attack. Top right shows one of their landing vehicles hitting the water as the operation began and below the men and equipment are ferried across water to establish their beachhead.
