SUMMERSIDE, P. E. I., June 13—The adjourned inquest into the death of Fred Gaudet was held yesterday afternoon at four o'clock in Compton's Funeral Parlors, Summerside, before E. T. Tanton, Coroner. Inspector Fripps of Charlottetown was present, T. L. Compton conducted the case for the Crown.

The jury returned the following verdict: "We find from the evidence submitted to the Court that Fred Gaudet came to his death during the night of June 11-12, 1933, through accidental drowning while in a state of intoxication and we strongly recommend that the source of this supply of liquor through which this accident was caused be thoroughly investigated."

Following the verdict Landry was released from custody. Sonier is being held until Friday to be tried under the Prohibition Act before Mr. G. M. Matthews, Magistrate for Prince County.

LONDON, June 13—(A.P.)—"Should the United States, Great Britain and France fail to point the way out of the economic morass at the World Economic Conference," Emile Francqui, the veteran Belgian diplomat told the Associated Press tonight, "the small nations of Europe will cluster about one sole statesman capable of leadership—Mussolini."

Surprise Caused At Failure Of United States Representative Hull To Make Anticipated Speech At World Conclave.

(By George Hambleton, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, June 13—This was a day of doubts, fears and the American debt at the World Economic Conference. But British authorities hoped to have the debt situation cleared up by tomorrow night at the latest.

It was submitted by Dr. Orestes Ferrera, Secretary of State for Cuba. The plan proposed a tariff convention with certain features novel in international treaty-making. It would place maximum tariff limits on certain distinct groups of commodities. Wage rates and hours of labor are considered and difficulties which may occur between neighboring states and between agricultural states and industrial states.
