later working for him as the nominee is taken for granted by the party politicians.  
In the early summer, when Mr. Foss's candidacy was not looked upon with favor by a majority of the Democratic leaders, most of whom were lined up with James H. Vahey, Charles S. Hamlin, Col. William A. Gaston, or John R. Thayer. Mr. Macleod was throwing his influence to the side of Mr. Foss. On the eve of the Democratic convention, during the many hours when the delegates were in session in Faneuil hall trying to settle on a candidate for Governor, and in the deliberations of the "committee of four" following the failure of the convention to nominate a gubernatorial candidate, the cause of Mr. Foss might many times have been lost, it is admitted by leaders of both parties, had it not been for the work of Chairman Macleod and the lieutenants working under his direction.  
The judgeship is a life position and carries with it a salary of \$6500. Mr. Macleod's salary as chairman of the Democratic state committee is relatively small. One of his reasons for resigning is that he may provide a large income for his family. He expects to resume his practice of law before the winter is over.  
Mr. Macleod has many friends and admirers here. He is an old P. W. C. man, and his acquaintances and friends will be interested and gratified to know he is climbing the ladder of success.
