

ANCHORS IN 9-8 VICTORY OVER THE LEGIONAIRES

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Hit Batsman Decides Nip & Tuck Encounter In Last Of Ninth

West End Anchors, getting away to a fast start, yesterday captured the first game of the second session of the City Baseball League by defeating the Legionnaires 9-8 in a tense nine inning struggle that saw the winning run score from third base as "Lefty" McAleer, relief pitcher for the losers, hit batter Mike Hennessey with the bases loaded to force in the winning counter.

It was a bitter blow to the Legionnaires, who had scored five times in the eighth to send Ready to the showers and pushed the tying counter across in the top half of the ninth. McAleer, relief pitcher for the losers, walked, stole second on a very close play; went to third on an infield out; and then centered in as relief pitcher Charlie Ryan committed a balk with two down and a count of two and two on the base.

Taking full advantage of Legion errors in the first three innings, Anchors, also hitting well with runners aboard, raced into a 7-0 lead in the first three as Spy Ready held his opponents in the hollow of his left hand; Legion pushed across two runs in the fourth on the strength of Baldy Williams' mighty triple but from then until the eighth could do nothing with the assortment of hooks thrown by Ready, who up to that time had yielded a mere three hits and one run while Anchors had added another counter in the fifth for an 8-0 lead and a margin that looked to be plenty big, but the roof really fell in the Legion's half of the eighth.

The first two batters drew Annie Oakley's first; four solid smashes including Perry's double drove in five runs and it was curtains for the Anchors starting hurler as Charlie Ryan came in to relieve; Ryan walked the first batter to face him but Glen Matheson raced nearly to the infield to snare Blanchard's pop fly and double McIsaac off first and end the uprising.

Ryan got the first batter in the top half of the ninth on strikes; McAleer hitting for Lund, drew a base and stole second; he went to third as Harold Hennessey was being thrown out at first and then came in standing with the tying

counter as the Anchors' pitcher balked.

Chipman, Anchors catcher, walked a double off McAleer who came in for McIsaac to start the ninth; Ryan was hit by a pitched ball; Ready ground out to first to advance the runners to second and third and the sacks were loaded as Stanley was safe on a pop fly to the infield; the game ended a minute later as Hennessey was hit by a pitched ball. Chipman walked from third with the winning run.

Anchors pulled off two double plays during the encounter, Ryan to LeClair in the seventh, and Matheson to Ready in the eighth with McKenzie, Blanchard and Matheson coming through with spectacular fielding efforts on hard hit balls.

Swimming Classes To Begin July 7th

With the closing of schools young people all over Prince Edward Island are making plans for the summer's activities. Outstanding among these will be the swimming and water safety programme conducted by the Prince Edward Island Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society. In preparation for the opening of these swimming classes Red Cross instructors will be trained or take a refresher course at the Leadership Training Camp which is being held on the Y.M.C.A. site at Holland Cove from June 30th. to July 5th. It is expected that prospective swimming instructors from the following centres will be in attendance at this camp: Georgetown, Montague, St. Peter's, Cardigan, Souris, Morrell, Mount Stewart, Keppoch, West Point, Summerside and Charlottetown. These instructors will then be ready to organize swimming classes in their own communities on July 7th, which will be the official opening date all over the province.

Over 600 children took advantage of these classes last summer when 198 received the junior, intermediate or senior awards for which they were tested at the conclusion of the course. During the past week the children in all the Charlottetown schools were told about the swimming lessons to be conducted at Brighton and Kensington beaches and displayed great enthusiasm at the prospects of learning to swim and look after their own safety, as well as that of others, or of becoming more proficient in these skills.

Yankees Split Twin Bill At Washington

New York Yankees won 4-1 1/2 games ahead of the pack Sunday as they split a twin bill at Washington while the second-place Boston Red Sox were taking a double pasting at Philadelphia.

Last year's American League champion Sox lost by scores of 3-2 and 6-5 as Connie Mack's red-hot crew pulled within a half game of the Yawkeymen Phil Marchildon chalked up his seventh win in the opener and Joe Coleman's smart relief twirling saved the nightcap.

New York captured the second game of their set, 3-1, after Washington took the opener 5-1.

Four Chicago hurlers fought Cleveland Indians with four hits to register a 3-0 victory at Cleveland as Taft Wright's single in the ninth scored George Dickey from second to break a tie. The second half of the double bill was rained out after half an inning had been played.

Detroit Tigers gained third place by a slim percentage point over Athletics as lefty Hal Newhouser and Dixie Trout came up with 7 1/2 innings of relief at Briggs Stadium. Trout was relieved by Al Benton when he got into trouble in the seventh.

Philadelphia smashed out three homers in a 4-0 victory over Boston on an inside-park homer by Ferris Fain with the bases loaded highlighting a five-run rally in the fifth inning of the second game. Pete Suder's first career clout of the season was the opener in the sixth inning. Sam Chapman for the A's and Ted Williams for Sox also belted big ones.

Pain's line smash eluded Sam Mize on an attempted shoestring catch and rolled to the 410-foot marker in deep centre field.

At Washington, Early Wynn notched his ninth victory in the first game as Mickey Vernon, last year's league batting champion, hit his first homer. Don Johnston gained the win for Yanks in the second although he needed help.

Vetron Luke Appling homered at Cleveland to lead Chicago to their victory as young Pete Gehrlein chalked up a win after relieving in the sixth. Pat Seery homered for Indians.

Yanofsky Wins Chess Ch'ship

QUEBEC, June 29.—Twenty-two year old Abe Yanofsky of Winnipeg held the Canadian chess championship tonight for the fourth time in five tournament years after winning out in a field of 14 top-ranking Dominion contenders in the 1947 competition here. Yanofsky won the title in 1941 and tied for it with Regina's Frank Yerboff in 1942 and 1944.

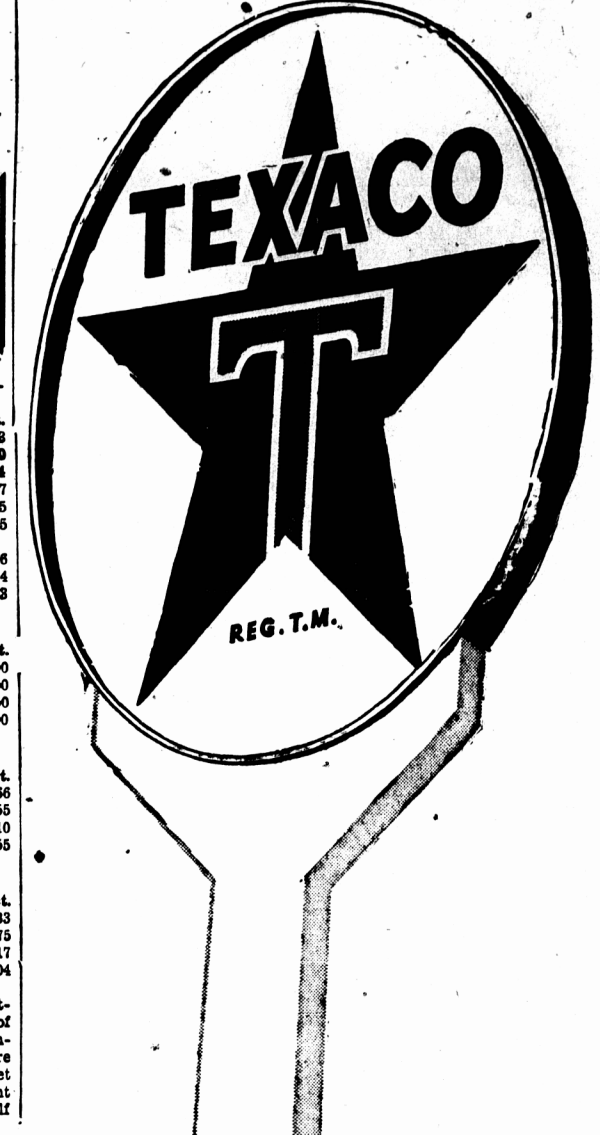
In winning the title the westerner rang up 11 victories and two draws during the week-long, 13-round competition, which ended last night. He paced a field of competitors ranging from 18-year-old Orlan Bain of Quebec to Siegfried Wreschner, 48, of Montreal.

World Record

BERKELEY, Calif., June 28.—Herb McKenzie of Illinois University raced to a world's record time of 46.3 seconds Saturday in winning the 440-yard dash in an all-star track and field meet between athletes of the Big Nine and Pacific Coast Conference.

Four clockers caught the flash from Jamaica in the time that was faster than the accepted record of 46.4, set in 1932 by Ben Eastman of Stanford and equaled in 1941 by Grove Klemmer of California.

The old master of the links, Bobby Jones, ground out his third United States open golf crown in the most lopsided title playoff of all time 17 years ago today. Posting identical scores of 294, Jones and Abe Espinosa went another 36 holes, honors going to the great Bobby by 23 strokes—141 to 164.
