CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Services in Central Christian Church on the Lord's day were conducted by the minister, Rev. M. D. Dunbar. Music for the day was under the direction of Mrs. E. C. Stewart, Organist and Choir Director. The Anthem: Jesus my Saviour Look on me" was sung by the choir at the morning service while a Male Trio brought a special number in song at the evening service. Taking for a text Ephesians 2:14 "For he is our peace, who hath made both one, and hath broken down the middle wall of partition between us," the minister addressed the morning congregation upon the subject of the Law versus the Gospel or "Break Down the Partition."

The Law suggested the minister, was as a father to the children of Israel, it was an imposed master to them. While in effect, they were kept under subjection by it; or as the scripture records—"But before faith came, we were kept in ward under the law, shut up unto the faith which should afterward be revealed." The Law, therefore, was through regeneration—the Gospel's through consecration. The Gospel is as a father rather than a master to all who will yield their lives to its commands. The Law, a burden to all who attempted, but failed to keep it, was finally taken out of the way. It was replaced through its fulfillment in Christ by mercy and grace.

The topic for the evening message was: "Manana! Manana!" which in itself describes the backwardness of the country from which it springs. The word, which in Mexican means "tomorrow" suggests the nature of that people. Nor is it a symbol of only Mexican nature but is suggestive of the careless attitude of many to settle the eternal issues of the soul while opportunity still is theirs. Using the text—"How shall we escape if we neglect so great a salvation?" the minister urged the congregation to face rationally these major questions, which stand as beacon lights of warning along the highway of life.

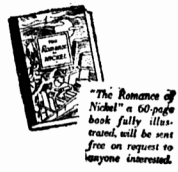
