Ireland Looks Toward Election

(By Joseph Penning Canadian Press Correspondent) DUBLIN, March 15.—Though legally it can remain in office until its five years' lease expires next February, the time has now come when Eamon De Valera's Government must start thinking about the next general election.

It seems to be generally agreed that De Valera can face the Free State electorate once again with comparative equanimity. It is true he has been unable to keep all his promises—his minister for agriculture has, indeed, confessed publicly they were too optimistic—the so-called economic dispute with Britain is dragging on, unemployment is still a big problem, the outlawed Irish Republican army is definitely hostile and he has made enemies on the right as well as the left, but by attracting other elements to his banner he has made his position stronger than ever. But, above all, he has no serious rival.

At the same time, however, this might not be a prudent time to select for an election campaign. The political atmosphere in the Free State has become clouded by a controversy about the civil war feelings of Communist atrocities against priests and nuns have made a profound impression in the predominantly Catholic Free State and while De Valera rides out in storm, keeping Free State policy on Spain in line with that of other countries, he has been subjected to bitter attacks from the Cosgrave side for refusing to make the technical gesture of breaking off diplomatic relations with the Valencia Government and recognizing General Franco's administration at Burgos.

That the Vatican has not broken off relations with Valencia or followed the lead of Germany and Italy by recognizing General Franco is a strong argument in favor of De Valera's waiting policy, but the feeling persists in the country that the Spanish question could undoubtedly be exploited by a vote-seeking opposition if an election were to be held just now. According to present plans, De Valera will dissolve the Dail some time between June and September next. By that time, his Minister for Finance, Sean MacEntee, will have presented his budget. The casts indicate he anticipates being able to distribute a handsome surplus.

Before the election, De Valera will also have produced his new constitution, providing for the restoration of a two-chambered legislature and a head of state with powers something like those possessed by President Roosevelt. At the same time, the Free State will remain in the commonwealth for external purposes. The King, as is known from the legislation passed at the time of the abdication crisis, will have no functions in internal affairs.

SLEEP

Everyone realizes the need for a proper amount of sleep and at no time is this more necessary than during childhood. In her anxiety to get her young child asleep many a mother has walked the floor for hours, a practice which is not only harmful to the infant but one which may be disturbing to the whole household. All this can be avoided if proper habits of sleep are instituted at birth. This is best done by placing the crib of the infant in a room of its own which is quiet, well-aired and easily darkened. After a dry paper has been put on and the infant in a warm comfortable bed no other device should be necessary to induce him to go to sleep.

The child should always be put to bed while awake. In other words, he should learn to fall off to sleep in his own bed. If the child cries, see that he is not cold, or too hot. See that he is dry, and—if a young baby—that he has no gas on his stomach, and then leave him alone. If you pick him up just once or twice, next night he will cry for the sole purpose of being picked up. It is essential that when you put your child to bed you should leave him alone.

It has been computed that while a child is exercising he is using over four times more energy than while sleeping. Keeping this fact in mind, it is apparent that over-nourished children as well as under-nourished children require longer periods or more periods of sleep than other children do. Sleep disorders in older children are characterized by difficulty in getting to sleep at night, restlessness, tossing, talking in the sleep, grinding of the teeth, nightmares and sleep-walking. As a rule these complaints are not due to physical causes but are seen in nervous or highly strung children. This child is unable to sleep properly and must not be confused with the spoiled child who is unwilling to sleep. Regularity of sleep—plenty of it and no fussing with the child that just wants to be pampered all tend towards making the child healthier.

Lady Houston's Will Found and Worthless

LONDON, March 15.—(CP—Havas)—The long search for the last will and testament of Lady Houston eccentric imperialist, and philanthropist, who died last Dec. 29, ended today when it was announced the missing document had been found—and immediately ruled worthless.

The will was in a strong box in the Hampstead residence where Lady Houston died. Principal legatee of the will—Miss Juliana Hoare, aunt of First Lord of the Admiralty Sir Samuel Hoare, and a close friend of Lady Houston—pre-empted her death by about a year. Consequently the estate will be divided among numerous nephews and nieces who have been adjudged Lady Houston's nearest kin.

Miss Hoare is believed to have disposed of large sums for the eccentric widow through donations to British charities. The estimate which previously had been estimated at \$36,000,000 was understood to have shrunk to about half that sum.

Lady Houston was the widow of the shipbuilder, Sir Robert Houston. She published the Saturday Review for many years and was a dame commander-of the British Empire.
