EXCERPTS FROM THE MEETING OF THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE MEETING, NOVEMBER 6, 1935.

It was reported that the Order had sent greetings and messages of welcome to Their Excellencies, Baron and Lady Tweedsmuir upon their recent arrival in Canada. Two minutes' silence was observed in memory of the late Mrs. Forsy Page, a valued member.

The Order's wreath will be placed on the Cenotaph at Whitehall, London, on Armistice day by one of its members, Mrs. Howard Ferguson, and a wreath will also be laid by the National President at Ottawa on the National Memorial.

That an allotment of \$70.00 will be made to each Province for its organization, was the announcement of the Endowment Fund Convener, Mrs. J. A. Stewart of Perth. Eight new Chapters were reported by Mrs. M. J. Mulock, the Organizing Secretary: "C. G. Palmer", Junior, at Duncan, B. C.; "Lady Alice Scott", Edmonton; "St. Dunstons", Junior, Mossbank, Sask.; "Peter Yemassee", Theodore, Sask.; "Sir Isaac Newton" and a New Canadian Chapter of Polish extraction, "Pisudski" both in Winnipeg, Man.; "Forest Hill Village" and "Duchess of Gloucester", both in Toronto.

Congratulations of his new appointment were sent to Principal W. H. Fyfe, a member of the Order's Advisory Board; and the following new members of the Board were announced: Col. C. R. McCullough, Hamilton, Rt. Rev. P. Carrington, Bishop of Quebec; Hon. R. B. Hapson, K. C., LL. B., M. A., Ph. D., President of Mount Allison University, N. B., and L. A. De Wolfe, Esq., Nova Scotia.

Would Give Women Places On Bench

SYDNEY, N.S.W., Nov. 14.—Before the year closes women might be acting as jurors in Australia and also sitting on the bench. The Minister of Justice, New South Wales, L. O. Martin, has promised to introduce a bill to give women that privilege.

They would not be presiding magistrates, but act as assessors do in industrial courts. They would be permitted to express to the presiding magistrate, with becoming brevity, it is hoped, their opinions on the cases.

The desire to do this has long held a place in the thoughts of women who are active in public affairs, and they are bent upon translating ambition into fact. The Children's Court is their first objective. They claim that they are better qualified to deal with young children than the ordinary magistrate. The Children's Court, however, deals with cases of youths aged 18 years, as well as with younger ones, and even women advocates admit that a man is better able to deal with some older juvenile offenders than a woman.

At the exhibition garments, boots and shoes, and a large variety of articles in common use, all made from non-animal products, were exhibited. The Vegetarian Society holds that no one has the right to exploit the animal kingdom at any cost of pain and suffering to the animals. When the world is converted to vegetarianism some substitute will have to be found for the animals' skin.

It is one of the arguments of the anti-vegetarians that men cannot do without leather, but the society's members say they are going to do without leather.
