

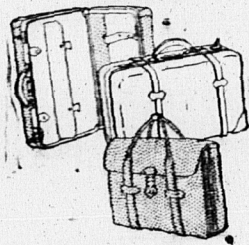

He also went to the strike in the Shushanna district in the interior of Alaska in 1912 which turned out to be a "wildcat" stampede. Y. M. C. A. CAMP In Prince County

The two boys' camps held this year under the auspices of the Prince County Y. M. C. A., have been the most successful of any yet attempted. The first camp for the boys of Alberton, O'Leary and surrounding districts was held at Margate, Kensington, and the second, on the second, on the point below Mr. Hiram Thompson's Margate, held from July 31st to August 10th, for the boys of Summerside, Kensington and surrounding districts with four boys from Hunter River also registered. The sites were each near the ideal for such a camp, and the weather with the exception of a couple of days at Margate could not be improved on.

In all fifty-five boys and twelve leaders were registered at the two camps and all greatly enjoyed and benefited by the ten days' outing. The programme carried out at each camp was a full one and with the system of dividing the camp into tribes and placing them in competition with each other that it followed at all well organized boys' camps resulted in a very excellent camp spirit.

Each day's activities began with the campers being roused at seven o'clock for a ten minutes' brisk physical exercise followed by a breakfast. The boys still seated around the breakfast table, morning worship was conducted led in turn by different members of the camp. Then came a period of camp duties, after which followed the morning half hour of Bible study in which all the campers took an active part. A practical period came next during which campers first did life service, etc. were taken up. Immediately before dinner came the morning swim with instruction to non-swimmers. Following dinner came a meeting of the Grand Council which was made up of the camp leaders and the Y. M. C. A. chiefs in charge of tents, at which all questions of programme, discipline, etc. were dealt with in an absolutely democratic manner, the boys having an equal voice with the leaders in the decisions made. During Council Meeting, the brave prepared their tents for the daily inspection which is a very strict one and after the first couple of days marvellous neatness and very noticeable improvements were evident. The afternoon programmes varied from day to day, including athletics, nature hikes, woodcraft, scoutcraft, etc. with an afternoon swim just before supper as a regular feature. After tea, a league series of baseball was carried out, a campfire held each night with a closing devotional message to end the day. The Sunday programme in camp were most inspirational with a regular Church service at 10 o'clock, planned and conducted especially by and for the boys and held either in the big marquee or under the trees. A Sunday afternoon study period or a talk on the 3 C's—Clean Speech, Clean Habits, Clean Athletics, and the evening vesper service around the campfire, together with many personal interviews with the boys, went to make the Sundays red-letter days in camp. The Sunday morning of the near future, it is expected that next year will see an even larger number of fellows in these camps. No parent should allow a boy to miss the opportunity for training in all round Christian citizenship which is given at camp, if it is at all possible for him to do so.

Practically all the non-swimmers and a number of visitors learned to swim and the better swimmers demonstrated several of the recognized methods of life saving for the benefit of those who were learning. Swimming at these camps is only allowed at regularly stated periods and is always under expert and vigilant supervision so that possibilities of accident are practically eliminated. Special emphasis was laid this year on two things, first, daily Bible reading and prayer or as it is called, the Morning Watch, and second, the question of a definite decision for the Christian life which would culminate naturally in Church membership and as a result of the two camps, fifty-five boys went home pledged to the Morning Watch habit while twenty-three fellows expressed the desire to unite with the Church at the first opportunity and nine others are looking forward to such a step in the near future.
