AN enjoyable social was held in the Wellington Hall last night. A special train left Summerside at 7.30 and when it reached Wellington upwards of 100 had taken advantage of it. The special left on return at 1 a. m.

THE funeral of the late Chas. Dockendorff of North River yesterday, was largely attended by friends and neighbors. Revs. Brown, Warren and Thomas were the officiating clergymen. The deceased was held in highest esteem by all, on account of his generous disposition. Rev. THE tender from Hugh Cameron, of the Waterous Engine Company, who supplied the steam roller to the city of Charlottetown, to furnish to the city a Buffalo Pitts double cylinder engine steam road roller, including a full set of 56 forged picks for picking up old roads, delivered on the street free of charge in six or eight days from the acceptance of the tender, for \$3,500, was referred to the city engineer.
