Born on the Isle of Skye, Scotland, Feb. 1st, 1845, the son of Donald H. MacDonald and his wife Jessie Nicholson, he came to Canada with his parents on the vessel "James Gibbs" in the year 1858 when he was thirteen years old.

The late Mr. MacDonald was a staunch supporter of the church, and for over fifty years has been an elder. He was ordained an elder of the Valleyfield Presbyterian Church in the year 1885. After the organization of the church in Caledonia, he was a member and elder of that church, and resided and conducted a general store at

A BULLETIN FROM BERMUDA

Below we give a number of extracts from Miss Agnes Slack's budget of news items from Bermuda.

Bermuda is our oldest British colony with a form of Government which has changed but little during several hundred years. Many of the best men here have no votes as the franchise depends upon the ownership of property.

Life in Bermuda can be compared to living on an anchored ocean liner with the sea breezes constantly passing over its 150 Islands.

Bermuda is a great tourist centre. Every week 1,500 people from the United States arrive here by boat and play a most important part in the business of the islands.

The Spaniards landed on this unknown island in 1543. They were terrified by the dangerous coral reefs and simply wrote their initials and the date, and fled from what they called the island of demons—the wild hogs also did not appeal to them. On February 24th, Miss Res took me for a drive past Spanish Rock. The reefs, at low tide, as I saw them, can be plainly seen—solid masses of rock far down under the sea, making navigation exceedingly dangerous.

Snow and frost are never known in Bermuda, as the Gulf Stream sweeps its coasts. It is, indeed, a land of plea ant flowers and frequent crops of fruit and vegetables, as many as four crops in a year.

I have had interesting meetings with Portuguese children at their special school. They are strikingly beautiful and very quick. I was amazed when I asked them how many took wine or beer. More than half the children take intoxicants. These children are now

to have a temperance address: every quarter.

On Sunday, March 1st, at noon. I distinctly heard the King's address on the radio—time here is four hours behind England, so it would be four o'clock with you. The people here were delighted to hear our new King's voice, for they are extremely devoted to Britain.

My first work was amongst the white people, but on March 22nd I addressed over 400 colored people in their church. It was a most reverent congregation led by a colored minister of real culture—the Rev. Leo Pottinger, D. D. On March 27th I organized a union for these colored folk. The Bermudians are the most advanced colored race I have met in any of my travels.

On March 21st I attended the House of Assembly when Sir Stanley Sparing, who is a loyal teetotaler—and showed me much kindness—read the address to be presented to Sir Astley Cubitt, who is leaving Bermuda after five years as Governor. Later, at the Council Chamber, I heard the address presented and the Governor's reply.

I am very busy indeed, and am up against a Gibraltar in the drink traffic. Liquor bars are open for twelve to fifteen hours a day.

My address to the Women's Suffrage Society—mentioned in my last letter—was so appreciated that although none of them are teetotalers they have sent our W.C.T.U. three guineas as a thank-offering.
