## SYDNEY PLACED UNDER MILITARY RULE BY THE AUTHORITIES

Crowds of Men Around the Plant Prevent Free Ingress and Egress to the Works—A Clash Occurred When Graham Fraser Tried to Send Men in From His Yacht.

Sydney, July 5.—There has been no change of any consequence in the strike situation since yesterday. The 17th field battery and a squad of the 9th battalion of the Argyll Highlanders are guarding the plant and the city in general is given over to military rule. Major Cruise, of the field battery, is commanding.

The course the civic authorities intend to pursue is to let matters go on as at present until the military is increased to such a strength as will enable them to cope successfully with the men.

The work of recruiting men for the battery and the infantry corps began this morning and this evening the total number of volunteers in the plant numbered about one hundred men.

Last night it was expected that more trouble would ensue this morning at the works, but the hundreds of citizens who went there to witness the fray were disappointed, there being practically no demonstration of violence whatever, only at one of the entrances—and there because the company endeavored to land men there from Graham Fraser's yacht. In this they were unsuccessful and the yacht had to return to her wharf.

Several employees attempted to get in the works but were turned back, the strikers forbidding them when they did not go otherwise. The militia made no effort to interfere as far as laborers were concerned, but escorted the officials to the plant under cover of arms.

Nothing occurred that tended to bring on a clash between the men and the militia, except in one case in which a small squad of the soldiers were obliged to use their bayonets. Director of Works Graham Fraser, Sales Agent Jones and Mechanical Superintendent McDougall were about to enter the plant when the latter two were intercepted by a crowd of about fifty strikers. Five soldiers happened to be near and these were called upon to escort the officials into the plant. The strikers still interfered and it was only after bayonets had been used that a passage was opened through the crowd.

The clerical staff, foremen and superintendents were all turned back, the same as yesterday, nearly 200 being so treated. Italians, Hungarians and Newfoundlanders constituted the vast proportion of the men that crowd about the gates. They

were armed with clubs and bludgeons and were by no means a gang with which one would like to come in contact. They look as if they would not hesitate to use the weapons of warfare in their possession.

Grand Secretary Moffatt was in communication with the government regarding the appointment of a royal commission.

There took place tonight one of the biggest labor demonstrations ever seen in this province, when some 1,500 members of the P. W. A. lodges throughout the mining districts marched through the streets and held a mass meeting in the Rosslyn rink. That large building seldom contained a closer packed audience and the best of order prevailed. The lodges represented were Unity, Reserve, Golden Rule, Dominion No. 1, Island, Bridgeport, New Aberdeen and Inverisle, Dominion No. 2, Equity, Galedonia, Olive, Dominion No. 4 and Drummond, Sydney Mines. The procession was headed by the pipers' band and marshalled by John L. McNeil and Hector McLean.

At the rink, on the platform, were Grand Secretary Moffatt, Grand Guardian Fraser, Grand Treasurer Nicholson and the officers of the grand council and lodge officers.

Mr. Moffatt was the principal speaker. He outlined the causes leading up to the strike, as has already been outlined in The Herald. Several other speakers followed. The principal purpose of the meeting was to impress upon the minds of the people of Sydney the fact that the P. W. A., through the mines, were in sympathy with those on strike at Sydney and were willing to back them to their utmost ability.

Mr. Moffatt announced that at a meeting of the grand sub-council on Saturday it was decided to ask the Government to appoint a royal commission, or make arrangements for an unconditional arbitration, and pending the decision of either, as the case might be, the men would be willing to go back to work and if the commission or arbitrator decided against them they would abide by it.

Upon the arrival of the 6th and 8th from Halifax the riotous will be read to the strikers and further assembly on their part or demonstration of any kind will be forbidden.

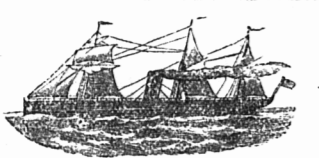
