NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—(A.P.)—Chicago Hawks staged one speedy offensive drive in the third period tonight and defeated New York Rangers 2-1 to go past the lowest individual place in the American Division of the National Hockey League.

A penalty to Albert Leduc, playing his first game for the Rangers, kept the Hawks from scoring until the late second period. While he was off, Johnny Gosselin scored on a short shot after a double pass from Johnny Sherry and Doc Romnes.

After 10 minutes of steady effort, Earl Selbert finally netted the Rangers goal following an exciting scramble around the net.

TORONTO, Feb. 18.—(C.P.)—Easily coasting to a National Hockey League play-off berth, Toronto Maple Leafs tonight held a 14-point lead in the league's Canadian division following their 6-3 victory over Boston Bruins Saturday night in their fifth meeting of the season.

The defeat dealt a body-blow to the Bruins' fast-moving chances of entering the post-season series. Without giant Eddie Shore after the first two minutes of the game, Boston were unable to hold the victory.

MONTREAL, Feb. 18.—(C.P.)—New York Americans, considered only an outside threat for a play-off berth in the Canadian section of the National Hockey League, today won a week ago, when today only a single point behind the third place holders, Montreal Canadiens, following their 4-3 victory over Montreal Maroons here.

Tiger Star Is Winner Of Baxter Mile

Bill Bonthron Leads Kansas Flyer to Tape in Close Battle.

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Princeton's brilliant miler, Bill Bonthron, today had taken the measure of Glenn Cunningham of Kansas in a thrilling race to the widely heralded Baxter mile—but the record-shattering features of the New York Athletic Club track carnival last night were furnished by an acrobatic son of Yale, Keith Brown, and Walter Marty, lanky jumper from Fresno (Calif.) State College.

Brown soared to a new world indoor mark of 14 feet four inches in the pole vault, surpassing his own previous record by 2 1/4 inches, while Marty brought the meet to a close by negotiating six feet, 8 3/4 inches in the high jump, bettering all world standards, indoors or out.

The mile fell away short of record blasting expectations, despite the presence of America's three best competitors at the distance. But Bonthron brought a crowd of 15,000 spectators in Madison Square Garden to its feet yelling wildly as he came from behind with a powerful spirit over the final quarter.

While the attendance at the Saint John game has not been as great as that accorded to the Hawks or Wolverines, still those who do go never fail to enjoy them, feeling satisfied that they have had their money's worth in thrills and excitement. Tonight will be no exception.

Canadiens Win From Maroons

ST. JEROME, Que., Feb. 18.—(C.P.)—Canadiens and Maroons, Montreal's entries in the National Hockey League, today gave the Laurentian Mountain a taste of big time hockey, Canadiens winning a fast exhibition 5-4.

The game marked the opening of the St. Jerome Arena, a natural ice rink with a seating capacity of 1,100. The first game was played in the new arena and the crowd overflowed to every inch of available space.

"I returned the contract offered me about a month ago," Faber said, "it was not better and I don't know yet if I shall quit baseball, if a suitable contract is offered."

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—Old Faber Times today has finally driven old Red Faber out of the pitcher's box. The 45-year-old pitcher, last of the surviving agitball hurlers in the American League, announced his retirement from baseball Saturday after playing 20 consecutive years with Chicago White Sox.

During the long baseball trail, especially as the years crept upon him and aging legs cramped upon him, Faber retired under fire. But the times were proportionately few in the 69 major league games in which he pitched and he always came back for more usually to rise to the heights again.

of Austrian rebels were understood, meanwhile, to have been confirmed by Sir John Simon, Secretary for Foreign Affairs.

This confirmation, it was said, was given by Haligonian, Secretary of the World Disarmament Conference, and Walter Carmichael, Secretary of the Trades-Union Congress, who interviewed Sir John regarding the Austrian crisis and were told Britain expressed a hope for clemency through the British Minister in Vienna.

Greatly Concerned

Many communications have been exchanged by London, Rome, and Paris in the Austrian matter. Three times in the last three months Sir John and Capt. Eden have stated emphatically in the House of Commons that the independence of Austria is a definite part of British policy.

This point was stressed even after the Austrian cabinet authorized Chancellor Dollfus to appeal to the League of Nations against Nazi terrorism and propaganda.

Capt. Eden assured the Commons recently that "great concern" was felt over the situation.

While stating that any action in the dispute would have to be joint action by the League Council, Eden asserted that "Austria had the right, which we fully recognize, to demand that there should be no interference with her internal affairs by any other government."

Secret Report

The secret dossier received by the British Government from the Dollfus regime is rumored to contain proof that Germany is officially encouraging Nazis in their campaign to bring the two German nations under the rule of the former Austria, Adolf Hitler.

It could only be learned from official sources that this dossier, a 180-page document, is a full report on the Nazi activities in Austria and those in Germany affecting Austria.

It was noted that before Austria took any steps to serve official notice to the League Secretariat, she sent this dossier to the various powers which are regarded as guaranteeing her independence.

The withdrawal of Germany from the League means that those powers would have the floor to themselves in arguing the Austro-German issue a Geneva.
