## PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

[Tunnel Debate Concluded.]

Hon. Mr. Haszard reviewed the acknowledgment of our claims by the Dominion and the winter service for the past few years. He urged that the Government be approached in reasonably mild terms and the address presented, he thought, was couched in such language. It argued well, he said, to see both parties united in our claims. No matter how the tunnel is started it will take years to complete and in the meantime we want a more powerful steamer. If such is not sufficient let us by all means from one end to the other of the Island press for the tunnel. We want not a "third" steamer but a "suitable" steamer, and then the Government may do what they like with the other steamers. Pending the construction of a tunnel, which as one member he was prepared to press with all his power, he urged a powerful steamer. He did not think Sir Douglas Fox's survey was a complete one. Tunnel constructing though greatly perfected in recent years is still a difficult task and requires much more surveying than has been done at the Capes. He did not think M. J. Haney's offer to construct a tunnel for \$10,000,000 was really as bona fide as it would appear. He would like to have a little more authoritative statement from Mr. Haney than the one made. However he would say if a tunnel can be built for \$10,000,000 or anything like that sum let us have it at once. The Federal Government should not then hesitate for a moment. The government have got everything due by us while we have not received what is our just due from the Dominion.

The Memorial was then read clause by clause and passed.

It was agreed that the Lieutenant Governor be asked to transmit the Memorial to the Governor General.

Hon. Mr. McNutt reported that the bill to incorporate the Life Assurance Agents of Prince Edward Island was of a private nature and was set down for second reading in the morning.

EVENING SESSION.

House met at 8.30.

House resumed committee with Mr. McWilliams in the chair on the bill entitled an Act respecting the Legislature. On motion of Hon. Mr. Peters the chairman left the chair. [The bill thus lapses. Mr. Peters explained that this was owing to errors in the drafting and another would be introduced.]

The Speaker resumed the chair.

The bills respecting the Condensed Milk Company and the Charlottetown Water works were reported of a private nature set down for second reading tomorrow.

Hon. Mr. Peters introduced a bill to provide for the Consolidation of the Debt of the Province which was read a first time and set down for second reading tomorrow.

Hon. Mr. Haszard introduced a resolution of thanks to Sir William Macdonald for his work on behalf of education in the province. Hon. Mr. Haszard, Mr. McKinnon, Hon. Mr. Peters and Mr. Mathieson spoke eulogistically of the work of Sir William Macdonald and the resolution was unanimously adopted in committee and ordered to be transmitted by the clerk on motion of Hon. Mr. Peters.

A bill to amend an Act respecting the Legislature was read a first time and set down for second reading tomorrow.

Hon. Mr. Haszard submitted a bill to amend the Jury Amendment Act 1880 which was read a first time and set down for second reading tomorrow.

House adjourned till the morning at ten o'clock.

FRIDAY MORNING.

House met at 11.30.

Mr. Morson asked the Commissioner of Public Works what steps have been taken during the year 1904 towards the completion of the opening and finishing of the

road on Lots 51 and 66, running along on Lot 66 about the northern end of the farms of Alexander Murphy and Galien McNeill and coming out on Baldwin's Road, Lot 51, at or near the end of the road lying between the farms now or formerly owned by Alexander Reid and James Monar respectively, and whether or not it is the intention of the Government to complete said road during the present year.

The Commissioner said a portion had been opened some time ago and a part still remained unopened. An investigation would be held in recess and if in the public interest the work would be proceeded with.

Mr. Morson asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government during the present year to replace the Bridge at Montague by a new Bridge, and if so whether such Bridge will be constructed of steel or of what other material.

Hon. Mr. Cumiskey said the engineer had reported there was a good place for a steel bridge which will be built if the cost is not too great.

Mr. McKinnon asked Commissioner of Public Works to lay on the table of the House a copy of all plans, specifications and estimates of cost made for his department respecting the new bridge now in course of construction at Morell.

4. Were any of the tenders accepted, if not, why not?

5. Was the work already performed done by days labour. If so who was the engineer in charge of the work.

6. What is the present condition of the work, when is it proposed to complete it and at what estimated cost.

The Commissioner said he hoped to table the returns early next week.

Mr. Kitcham asked does the Government propose to adopt any measures for the relief of persons in need of seed, grain who are unable to pay cash for the same.

Hon. Mr. Peters said there was no intention to do so at present as seeds could not be imported more cheaply than the dealers whose business would be interfered with. In the case of hay it was different.

Mr. Mathieson said this was not a question of competition. The object is to secure a measure of relief not necessarily by importation of seed for poor men who have not the means of buying it.

Mr. Mathieson asked when the reports of Departments of Agriculture, Education and Public Lands would be submitted.

Hon. Mr. Peters said there was no Commissioner of Crown Lands but the statement would be prepared as quickly as possible. The other reports are now in the printers' hands.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Hughes bills to incorporate the P. E. I. Tourist Association and the P. E. I. Pharmaceutical Association were read a first time.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Haszard, House went into Committee with Mr. McWilliams in the chair on a bill to amend the Trustee Act which was reported agreed to with amendments.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Haszard the House went into Committee with Mr. McWilliams in the chair on a bill to amend the Partition Amendment Act which was reported agreed to without amendment.

Both bills were set down for third reading on Monday.

On motion the House went into Committee with Mr. Arsenault in the chair on the bill respecting the Charlottetown Condensed Milk Co. Hon. Mr. Haszard explained that it was introduced with the concurrence of the Council. It provides for the exemption from taxation of the Company's property and plant, on motion of the City Council for a term of ten years, in terms of five years each and such exemption when granted shall be irrevocable.

Bill was reported agreed to.

House adjourned till Monday at three.

### JAP MINERS EXPELLED.

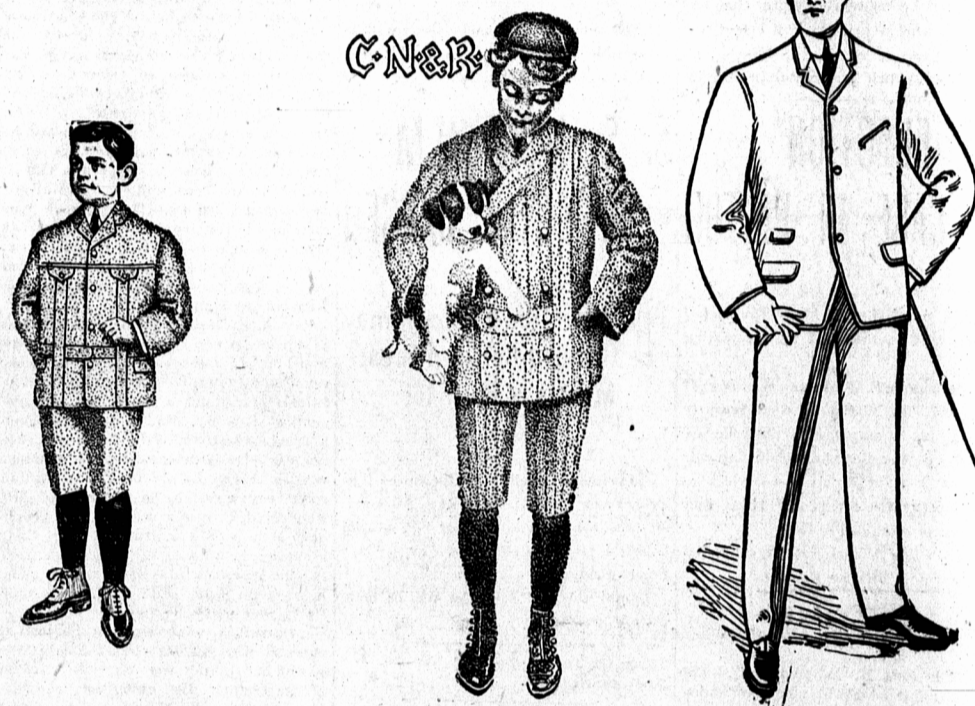

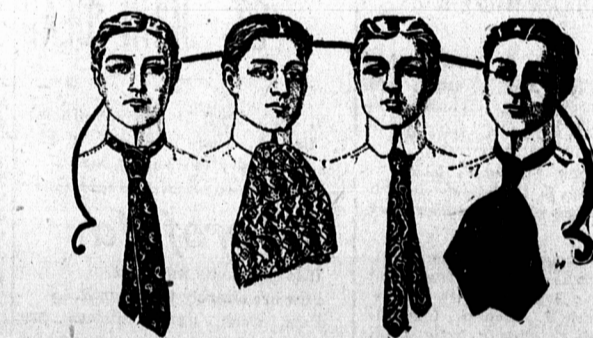

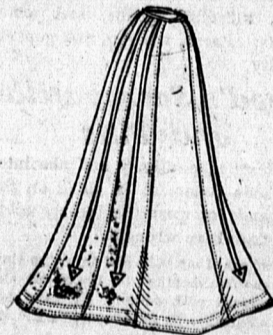
