EDITOR'S MAIL.

SIR, In your account of the trip made by a party of us from the Stanley to White Sands the statement is made that Gilbert P. DeRoche became exhausted, and that it was necessary for us to draw him in the boat. This I wish to correct, Mr. DeRoche arrived at White Sands in better condition than most of us. For a few minutes in crossing a small field of ice Mr. DeRoche was forced to sit in the boat on account of a strained leg, occasioned I believe by a fall. We all sustained a few more falls than we considered were really due us. Mr. DeRoche is a veteran of the Capes service and a very powerful man and had it not been for him our trip might not have ended so successfully; for in difficult and dangerous places he was the only man who knew how the ice boat should be hauled. It would have been impossible to draw a man in the boat any distance unless he were tied down to the seats as the boats in crossing hummocks took all kinds of fantastic positions.

I wish through your columns to express the gratitude of our party to Capt. Brown, the officers and crew of the good ship Stanley for their kindness to us. When I asked Capt. Brown for a boat to convey the letter I had to this I had readily consented and furnished every appliance necessary to make the trip a success and food enough for several days. He gave us a compass and carefully instructed me where to land as it is only in a very few places from Cape Bear for many miles to the westward that a landing is possible, on account of high bluffs. He also sent Mr. DeRoche an experienced iceboat man with us and to Mr. DeRoche were greatly indebted for the success of the trip.

Though we met the good people of White Sands at an icy time we will all retain sunny memories of them and their kindness.

Telegrams from E. Tannison Smith, received by David Small, G. W. P. yesterday stated that the former was at Cape Tormentine but that owing to the boats not crossing it would be better to omit the temperance meeting announced for to-night. Mr. Small has therefore put out tonight's meeting, and if the lecturer gets over to-day the meetings will commence to-morrow afternoon with the children's meeting and continue as advertised till the end of the engagement. The choir organized for the meetings will meet for practice in Wright's Hall this evening.

A PARTICULARLY sad sight was witnessed at the Railway station last evening. The corpse of Mrs. James McDonnell was being taken back to her former home at Albany. Only the day before she had been brought to Charlottetown to undergo an operation at the Charlottetown Hospital. But the operation meant to save her life was of no avail for the patient succumbed about two hours afterwards. There was general sympathy expressed for those who were taking back the dead body to the home which the living woman had left such a short time before.

A PARTICULARLY sad death is reported from Enniscorthy. On Friday last Patrick McCloskey a well-known resident of that settlement came to Charlottetown driving by team. Having finished his busness in the City, he started on the return journey to his home. Somewhere on the road he must have died in his sleigh, for upon the faithful horse arriving home, the waiting family were confronted with the sorrowful sight of the dead man lying where he had died. The deceased it is said had been suffering for some time past from heart trouble, and is reported to have been under the doctor's care shortly before his death. He was between fifty and sixty years of age, and leaves a large family.

At last the winter steamers have escaped after a week of imprisonment, from the grasp of the ice pack in the straits. On Saturday the change of wind loosened the ice and both steamers lost no time in forging a way through the rapidly separating ice fields. The Minto, which on Friday had ended most of her passengers at Carleton, on Saturday evening managed to get into Pictou Harbor. The Stanley after a hard tussle all day Saturday and part of yesterday at last managed to approach as near as was possible to Georgetown, the harbor of which is packed with heavy ice through which the steamer cannot make her way. A latest advice last night it was said that the mails and passengers were being landed on the ice and conveyed in sleighs to Georgetown. The steamer it is said has not suffered any serious injury as a result of her squeezing in the ice last Friday. The Minto is expected to leave Pictou this morning for Georgetown. It is very likely that the passengers landed from the Stanley at Pictou Island on Friday, shall have found their way to Pictou, and will be brought at last to the land. These are thought to include the Jere McAllister Co., and the Abegweit hockey team.

The special train came in Charlottetown in the afternoon, and took out again at 9 o'clock last evening all the outgoing foreign mail. Six boat loads crossed to this side Saturday with latest mails.

THE BRITISH NAVY ESTIMATE

LONDON, March 1.—A statement of the Naval estimates for 1907-8, presented to Parliament, introduce quite a novel feature in so much as it makes the construction of battleships during the coming year dependent in a measure upon the decisions reached at the next peace Conference at the Hague.

Thus the new construction estimated at \$10,500,000 against \$48,175,000 for 1906-7, will, says Lord Tweedmouth, First Lord of the Admiralty, include two, or unless an understanding between the naval powers is reached at the Hague Conference, three large armored vessels of the Dreadnaught type. One fast unarmored cruiser, five torpedo boat destroyers, twelve torpedo boats and twelve submarines also are provided for.
