The interim injunction issued by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell against the Prince Edward Island Granite Holding Company on Thursday, Dec. 18th last and which ordered the Company to cease all dealings in securities for ten days following service of the injunction, was made absolute by the Chief Justice yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Warren Cottrill of St. George, N. B., told the Court he was the president of the Company and that his failure to register under the Security Frauds Prevention Act had been unintentional. He was willing, he said, to have the Court make the injunction absolute and state he would register under the Security Frauds Prevention Act which requires that all companies, incorporated under the laws of the Province, and dealing in securities must register with the Provincial Secretary.

Edward Kerr, 63, a well-known barber in the town of Montague was burned to death on Christmas night when a fire destroyed his home and place of business during the height of the first fierce blizzard which swept the Province this year. The tragedy was believed caused by a "flash fire" from an exploding gas lamp.

It is thought Mr. Kerr was knocked unconscious when thrown to the floor near the doorway by the blast. Rescue efforts by his two sons, Garth and Sidney, and by Wilfred Waterworth, Charlottetown, failed. Sidney suffered a severely cut right arm which necessitated hospital treatment. The lamp exploded in a small kitchen behind the barber shop.

The two-storey wooden building, located on the east side of the street on the north end of the bridge, was completely destroyed. An addition to the building was fire fighters were hampered by the high wind and heavy snow fall.
