BUTTONS BACK—BACK AND FRONT

Buttons are back. They're in the front too, and on the shoulders and the hips. In fact they are news no matter where they are used and whether they are useful or not is immaterial.

Having been used as fastenings as early as the 15th century, buttons are returning to their earliest purposes—ornamentation.

Even if its use is basically utilitarian, the button doesn't stop there. It is likely to be disguised as a Chinese figure, a flower, bird or even an ear of corn and often the dress designer will transplant part of the pattern of his material and hand it over to the button manufacturer for copying.

A plain dress styled on simple classic lines, can be given character and an individual touch by the use of one large button, often placed at a diagonal neck closing.

If the gown is being a custom made, militarily, may choose a button suggesting her hobby—a sailboat for the aquatic-minded, one of the opera masks for the woman with a yen for the theatre, or a spruce's head for the horsewoman. If the frock is a ready-made item for her wardrobe, she may change the buttons supplied by the dress house for those of her own choice.

Tiny Ones Favorite

Tiny buttons are favorites with designers, especially in front closings that extend from neck to hemline and particularly effective are contrasting ones on plain colors.

Gold and silver are frequently used on black, red, green, and white, and all the pastels and the use of clear ruby red buttons, tiny and rimmed in narrow gold frames, or a maise an aquamarine frock stunning.

Silk blouses in shirt-waist styles can capture the feminine look with jeweled or tiny pearl buttons and smart blouse designers team up cuff links and buttons for a distinctive look.

Brides, too, include buttons in their bridal finery and many of the loveliest gowns feature button interest. Most customary are tiny ones covered with the material of the gown and they fasten the dress either in a basque style down the back or to the hipline, or catch it demurely down the front.

"To Have or Not?"

"To have or have not" is definitely up to the taste of the individual and is not governed by openings in the dress. Zippers are useful, as

Lively Speculation In Nova Scotia Political Circles

HALIFAX, Feb. 4 (CP)—In an atmosphere of uncertainty surrounding the Province's two economic pillars—coal and fish—Nova Scotia is preparing for the mid-March opening of the second session of the 43rd Legislature which may be the last piloted by Angus L. Macdonald.

Reports have it the slim, gray scholar-premier is destined for the Provincial Supreme Court bench. Already speculation has arisen as to a successor should the 56-year-old Premier, who served as Canada's naval chief during the war, step down. From recently mentioned is Harold Connolly, Minister of Industry and Publicity and a former newspaperman.

However, it is understood Mr. Connolly has been strangely preoccupied to run in the impending Federal by-election in Halifax. Some sources say he has been promised a Dominion Cabinet post if he can hold the seat which became vacant last fall with the death of W. C. MacDonald, another Liberal.

After Lieutenant Governor H. E. Kendall reads the speech from the throne, the House will delve into an agenda which may involve contentious, if not lengthy, discussion. Incidentally, the Governor's five-year term is up this year and it is understood he does not plan his tenure of office extended. There has been little speculation as to a successor but one name mentioned has been Ralph P. Bell, wartime Dominion director-general of aircraft production and prominent Nova Scotia industrialist.

Top items during the session likely to be taxes, taverns, and, if still requiring attention, the labor situation in the mines of Nova Scotia, largest coal-producing area in the Dominion, and in the fishing fleet.

Cabinet Ministers in session last week studied the latest Dominion tax formula, presented to Premier Macdonald in Ottawa two weeks ago, but no announcement was made on any decision. Should the proposals offer an acceptable basis for an agreement with the Dominion, such an agreement would require ratification by the Provincial House. On the other hand, if by that time no agreement is reached, Nova Scotia has advised that it will go ahead and revive an almost-forgotten 1919 bill empowering it to levy its own taxes. This would involve clause by clause discussion.

Legislation providing for taverns for cities and towns in Nova Scotia will likely be presented. To date, five communities, including this capital, have decided in referendums they wish to see beer and wine sold by the glass.

A Provincial Marketing Board to assist primary producers sell and export their goods is also contemplated.
