**GROWING MIXED GRAINS.**

An increasing number of our best farmers are feeding to their live stock almost the entire product of their fields, and in this manner are able to return to the soil the fertility which the growing crops exhaust. These as well as some others whose methods have not always been so prudent, will be interested in the fact that by growing mixed grain sown together, a considerably larger yield per acre can be obtained, than from either barley or oats sown separately, while the mixed crop is in every way excellent for feeding purposes. In another column we print a bulletin from Principal Cumming of the Truro Agricultural College elucidating this point and showing the splendid results of an experiment in this line at that excellent institution. While on their way to the Maritime Board of Trade meeting a few weeks ago Rev. A. E. Burke and Capt. Joseph Read passed through Truro and had a view of the growing patches of mixed grains. They were quite enthusiastic over the experiments and the good work being done by the College generally. Principal Cumming was then absent in England purchasing valuable stock for the farm, his purchase including an animal from the King's stables, Manager Fuller and all the professors at Truro College appear most anxious to make the institution to Maritime Canada what Gaelch is to Ontario. Great things are expected of Principal Cumming not only in animal husbandry but also in all that pertains to the farm. We feel sure that our farmer readers will peruse with interest and be impressed by the striking facts given in Principal Cumming's article on the growing of mixed grains and on other related topics.

"Rifleman" writes The Guardian in strong condemnation of the Government for this year refusing passes to the militiamen attending the D. R. A. matches at Ottawa. It would appear however that the free transportation given for a time to rifle men over the Government Railways was complicated by creating an inequality. The company railways do not carry riflemen free. We think that "Rifleman" himself will see the propriety of treating our marksmen from western and eastern Canada alike. Either all should pay or all be carried free.

The Winnipeg Tribune signalled the inauguration of the new Provinces as a day of mourning rather than as a day of rejoicing. It dressed its columns with broad ripples in black in token of grief for the demise of provincial rights in the west. The Tribune is a strong newspaper, but in this case seems to have "slopped over," to use an expressive vulgarism. Saskatchewan and Alberta are all right, their prospects brilliant, and nothing but the hand of Heaven or their own folly can give cause for wearing crape on their account.

Eighty years ago the merchants of Montreal started an agitation to provide a channel to the sea for vessels of 250 tons. In time the channel was made 14 feet deep and everywhere 150 feet wide. Now it is 28 feet deep and 300 feet in minimum width. The Marine Department has undertaken to make the channel 30 feet deep at low water and 450 feet in breadth by 1907. As fast as these improvements have been made larger and deeper ocean-going steamships have been put on the route and not infrequently a steamer has come to grief from being loaded too near the limit of draft, or from some temporary shoaling of the water at one point in the course. The St. Lawrence is a great national highway, and although the cost of its improvements has been heavy the 30 foot channel is worth obtaining even at great cost.

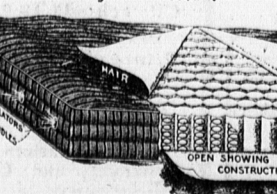
