NO PERMIT TO EXPLORE TIBET

CALCUTTA, July 28.—The authorities say that the reason Dr. Sven Hedin, the Scandinavian explorer, has been refused permission to visit Tibet was that it had been decided for reasons of policy that no British subjects were to be allowed to explore Tibet, and what was refused to British subjects could not be conceded to foreigners.

The Government thought that Tibet should continue in that state of isolation, the maintenance of which was constituted by Mr. Broderick in 1904. This decision in no way affected access to the trade routes sketched by the Lunan Convention.
