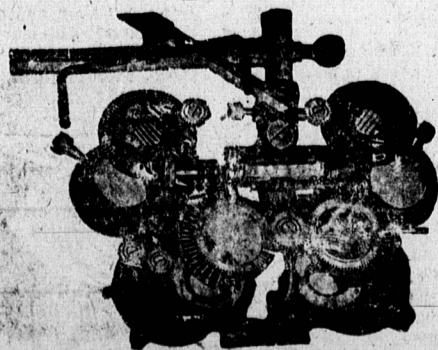

**ANOTHER ENEMY FOR SUBMAR-
INES INVENTED.**

WELLAND, June 19.—By the inven-
tion of a hydrophone that is said to
pick up the faintest sounds through
the water at a distance of from four
to five miles and to show the exact
location of the vessels creating the
sounds, J. A. Burgess, formerly science
master of Bishop Ridley College, St.
Catherines, Ontario, is believed to have
devised something that will not only
take the sting out of a submarine, but
in peace times warn ships of the loca-
tion and proximity of icebergs, other
vessels, rocks or shores in the case of
fog. Mr. Burgess has been conduct-
ing a series of tests in the North Sea
under the direction of the British Ad-
miralty for the past six weeks, with a
view to the adoption of his invention
for both war and mercantile vessels.

**Co-operative Marketing of
Wool**

Co-operative marketing of wool was
inaugurated by the Dominion and
Provincial Departments of Agriculture
throughout Canada with the purpose
of encouraging the Sheep Industry in
general, and to have the wool growers
give more and better attention to the
wool during its growth. This led to
the proper preparation of wool for
market, and to the grading of wool in-
to its various classes by competent
wool men supplied by the Dominion
Department of Agriculture before be-
ing offered to the manufacturers.

The quantity of wool marketed in
this way rapidly increased until early
in 1918 an assembly of delegates from
the Sheep Breeders Associations
throughout Canada organized the Cana-
dian co-operative Wool Growers'
Limited. This organization to be the
central body of the local Associations,
distributed from Coast to Coast. There
are in all, some twenty-four of the
local Associations and to these the
growers ship their wools. A cash
advance of about two-third of the
wool is given when it is received.
Graders supplied by the Dominion De-
partment of Agriculture then grade
the wool and each grower receives a

copy of the grading sheet concerning
his own clip.

The sale to manufacturers is made
by the Central Organization and the
balance of the sale price at once sent
to the individual growers. Thus the
marketing is done from grower to mill
through the Co-operative Organization
of the growers themselves. Last
season under this system approximat-
ly fifty per cent. of the total wool clip
of Canada was marketed.

In this manner wool growers have
received an average of from five to
ten cents per pound than when sold
through other channels. Yet the
manufacturers pay no higher price,
but receive a better and more staple
product.

The Sheep Breeders' Association of
P. E. Island is now receiving wool for
grading and co-operative sale. The
assembling points are Charlottetown
and Summerside.

Wool intended for the Charlot-
tewald station should be addressed to
W. R. Shaw, Secretary Sheep Breed-
ers' Association and that intended for
Summerside, to J. L. Tennant.
