

Late Market News

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Mar. 6.—Montreal receipts here yesterday were 1,111 cases as compared to 1,471 cases on the corresponding day last year. Heavy arrivals of eggs both from Canadian and U. S. points is depressing the situation here and the market is down two cents today. Halifax—With receipts of local eggs coming freely in addition to supplies from the U. S. and other parts of Canada, all egg prices on this market have been reduced. Dealers are paying country shippers for ungraded eggs extra 38 to 40 cents, firsts 35 to 36, seconds 30 to 31, thirds 24 to 25, fourths 20 to 21. Eggs prices here are working lower with quotations very irregular. Receipts are showing a normal increase and are of good quality. Firsts are in chief demand. Prices to retailers are extra 44 to 45, firsts 42 to 43, seconds 40 to 41, thirds 36 to 37, fourths 32 to 33. OOTAWA, Ont., Mar. 6.—As a result of increased receipts, Canadian egg markets are working lower. Toronto—Egg receipts here are increasing fast and in consequence the market is weak and lower. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extra 33 to 35, firsts 30, pullet extra 28, seconds 26 to 27, delivered. Brokers report sales of graded eggs at extra 33 to 34, firsts 31 to 32, seconds 28 to 29, thirds 27, fourths 23 to 24. Prices to retailers are extra 37, firsts 35, pullet extra 33, seconds 32. MONTREAL, Mar. 6.—Warmer weather has given a stimulus to egg production throughout the country and the condition has been reflected in the receipts here bringing in sight and end to the importations of American eggs for this season. Prices to retailers range from 42 to 43 cents for fresh specials to 34 cents for fresh seconds. More New Zealand butter from Hamilton Surrey which docked at Halifax last week, was received here today. Prices remained steady. Quotations average 34½ cents a pound wholesale in car lots, while retail prices are steady at 37 and 38 cents for solids and 38 and 39 cents for prints, there being a range of a cent in both cases. Other sections of the local produce markets remained unchanged.

PARK CORNER CREAMERY The annual meeting of the Park Corner Creamery was held in Irish Town Hall on Tuesday, Feb. 11th. Notwithstanding the bad roads a large number of patrons were present. The president in his opening remarks gave a brief account of the starting of the Park Corner Creamery thirty years ago under the management of Mr. John S. Cousins, who faithfully conducted the business till the present year when he retired and his son John E. Cousins was appointed in his place. He felt that the dairy industry was a great boon to P. E. I. and that it is a community were lucky to have such an up-to-date creamery in our midst, and we should do our part to keep this enterprise growing by giving our undivided patronage. The manager then gave his report for the past year and despite the low price of cheese a very creditable showing was made, the patrons receiving an average price of \$1.21 cents per 100 lbs of milk for cheese and 42 cents per lb for butter fat for the butter season, the butter milk being returned to the patrons according to the amount of cream supplied. The manager spoke in very optimistic terms for the ensuing year. He said he was installing a pasteurizer and consequently would be in a position to handle both cream and milk the entire season. He is also putting on a truck over the different routes to gather cream and he felt he could compete with any creamery in the province. Mr. F. J. Morrow, Dairy Produce Grader, was then called upon and gave a very instructive talk on the care of milk and cream. He showed how much better results could be obtained by the creameries if they would get the raw material in first class shape. He emphasized very strongly on cleanliness especially in milking and also the cans in which the milk is kept. The patrons present expressed themselves as being well pleased with the management of the creamery. The meeting then closed with a hearty vote of thanks being tendered to Mr. F. J. Morrow and Mr. John E. Cousins, Manager.

AREAS FREED OF BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS One million, four hundred and sixty nine thousand, seven hundred and sixty nine cattle had been tested for the disease of tuberculosis by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa up to the eight of October last. The work of testing was commenced by the Health of Animals Branch of the Department early in 1915 and as a result the cattle in fourteen extensive areas have been declared free of this disease.

In a pamphlet, "Bovine Tuberculosis," issued by the Department of Agriculture, the different plans for dealing with this policy are described, reasons are given for pursuing the work, and the locations of the cleaned-up areas geographically defined. (Issued by the Director of Publicity, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.)

Mrs. Walton, from the latest reports, is recovering. She was a frequent visitor to the Island and her many friends here will be deeply grieved at her terrible bereavement.—S.

FUNERAL OF REV. L. SMITH FROM BASILICA

Pontifical Mass Celebrated By Vicar General of Diocese.

The funeral of the late Rev. Lawrence Smith was held yesterday morning from St. Dunstan's Basilica to the Railway Station, where the remains were forwarded by the 12:05 (noon) train to North Wiltshire and thence to Kelly's Cross for interment.

At the Basilica a Pontifical Requiem High Mass was celebrated, in the absence of His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, by Right Reverend Monsignor J. C. McLean, V. G., assisted by Rev. Russel Smith, a brother of the deceased, Deacon, Rev. Mathias Smith, an uncle, Sub Deacon and Rev. Martin Monaghan, Master of Ceremonies.

The full choir of the Basilica rendered the music for the Mass. All the seats in the Sanctuary were occupied by the Priests from points throughout the diocese, the Altar boys being seated just inside the Altar rail.

The Students of St. Dunstan's University and pupils of the higher grades of Queen Square School occupied seats in the centre of the Basilica.

The Altar, Sanctuary and pulpit were draped in purple. At the conclusion of Mass, and before the Final Absolutions a touching sermon was delivered by Rev. James Murphy, D. D., Rector of St. Dunstan's University.

He preached from the text "Being made perfect, for a short space he fulfilled a long time; for his soul was pleasing to God; therefore He hastened to take him out of the midst of iniquities." Dr. Murphy, during the course of his remarks said there was only one thing in life that we were absolutely certain of and that was death—no human power can stay it. The hand of death has touched one in the prime of life and one who had a great future before him. They were assembled today to pay tribute to one who was their friend. He was in the class room he loved only a short time ago. Those who were present on that occasion little thought they would hear his voice no more. His life work brought him in contact with many who are now in the public life of this province. There was one underlying principal in his life said Dr. Murphy, to do what he thought was right, regardless of results. The deceased at one time made the statement that when he stood before his God he would feel he had always done what he thought was right. He referred to his Ordination on Dec. 21st, 1919, and his happiness in celebrating his first Mass. A bright man has been taken away, but we must submit to the will of God. The speaker related how he had entered St. Dunstan's as a student with the late Father Smith; they were in the same class room; they separated for a time but met later, they went to the seminary together, and went to St. Dunstan's together, but now came the parting; but he hoped they would meet in a better land where separation was unknown. In conclusion he asked that the congregation remember the deceased priest in their prayers.
