

Millions Left To A Secretary
(By Dominion News Service)
LONDON, June 16.—After being made a bankrupt through no fault of his own, a London man awoke one day this year to learn that he had been left a fortune of \$13,000,000 by an American woman whom he had befriended in Rome. Such is the romance of Capt. Harry L. Zeitun, formerly interpreter at Bow-street Police Court, and a familiar figure in the cosmopolitan life of the City and West End.
His benefactor is Mrs. Stone Woods Davies, who died last December. She was the daughter of Dr. William Stone Woods, the millionaire banker and founder of Excelsior Springs, Missouri, who died in 1917, leaving his daughter about \$15,000,000, after ten years. Mrs. Julia Davies is said also to have inherited part of her mother's fortune, estimated at a vast sum. The last will of Mrs. Julia Davies was made at the Savoy Hotel, London, on May 8, 1923, when Captain Zeitun, who was at the time her secretary, was made sole residuary legatee of her American and English estates. She directed that her husband, Mr. George Westlin Davies, should have no claim whatever upon her estate. Her husband is contesting the will in the Missouri Court, but the ground of the appeal are not yet known.
While in Rome on a special mission in January, 1922, Captain Zeitun met Mr. and Mrs. Davies at his hotel. Mrs. Davies became ill and the captain, who was educated in Italy, did what he could to secure her the best attention. She recovered in a fortnight's time and offered Captain Zeitun a post as her secretary. After his mission was over he accepted. Mrs. Davies and her husband came to England, staying at the Savoy Hotel.

Bell Ringer Has Long Pull

LONDON, June 18.—Twelve enthusiastic bell-ringers spent a whole day recently in the belfry of Southwark Cathedral, where they rang the great bells for nine hours and forty-eight minutes without stopping for a moment.
They made a record for the highest number of changes ever rung in London, but they failed in their attempt to beat the world's record on twelve bells.
The ringers began at nine o'clock in the morning, intending to ring 12,555 different changes. H. B. Peck, however, who was pulling the tenor bell (which weighs two and a half tons), began to show signs of exhaustion when they had pulled 12,675 changes, and the conductor, H. Langdon, decided to abandon the attempt on the record.
"We were, of course, standing all the time," said Mr. Langdon, whose hands were shaking with the effort, "and we had nothing to eat or drink. We had to keep our hands on the ropes the whole time without a second's pause."
"The greatest possible mental and physical concentration is necessary for such performance. If one man went wrong, then we should all be wrong at the end. No mistakes were made."
"Bell-ringing is fine training. All of us are amateurs and we did this simply out of love of bell-ringing."
The axes of the tingers, all of whom are members of the Ancient Society of College Youths, varied from seventeen to sixty-five.
