Poole and Thompson General Merchants at Montague, have 40 acres of potatoes in one farm near Commercial Cross, and from their appearance there will be an excellent crop.—Half green mountains and half cobbles.

Very few potatoes are moving towards Murray River. As yet few fields have been dug in this section.

Mr. Duncan MacCannell, of Dover, is at present visiting friends in Port Wood. After passing through several prolonged and serious periods of illness in recent years followed by an unfortunate and painful accident resulting in one or more broken bones and a long confinement to his bed, Mr. MacCannell now declares himself fully recovered, and capable of arduous toil day after day. Evidently a constitution that has endured all this must be uncommonly strong and durable.

Mr. William MacDonald of Little Sands is the fortunate owner of a horse of kingly ancestry recently acquired by purchase. In him courses the blue blood of all the Hambletonians. In color he is pale golden and his glossy coat glows with the hues of health. This animal appears to have all the points of a winner on any course. He is of proper size and well proportioned clean limbed, and clean gaited, and has an intelligent eye. Everything about him betokens his high lineage. Mr. MacDonald intends to try him out early next summer and have him show his paces. Many think he would distinguish himself and reflect honor to his province in the Grand Circuit.

It is now many years since the ox passed out of the picture as a pack and draught animal, but many will call to mind the time in their childhood when the oxen bore the heat and burden of the day full ploddingly. On occasion they could be active but mostly only when un-leashed, and I have sometimes seen them swift enough to vie with the noblest race horse. This would be when rushing for their oats. Then indeed were they winged of foot and lithe in every limb. When at work they needed frequent instructions but they understood the language of the lash better than any other tongue and under its sharp eloquence they would do well enough. Long after they ceased to be used in harness in this province they were still the vogue in the New England States and I have often seen six oxen hitched tandem to a mighty dray. This was in the city of Hartford, Connecticut. They knew their business letter-perfect. I call back to memory now an incident of the distant past deeply graven upon my mind. The scene a field of stumps. Axe and fire had done their work, but the massive stumps of beech and maple still remained and were to be torn from their firm embraces. A stumping frolic! Twenty men and half as many horses were on the ground cutting, heaving, pulling and a pair of oxen, he pride and pest of their strong and bulky owners. The language that man used to those animals was strong and from his heart and his shouts came to my ears down the long corridors of time to this very hour but he made the oxen pull out the stumps and at the end of the day when the reckoning was made their quota of stumps was not behind the best. Oxen and horses all have joined the innumerable caravan since and not many of the men alas! remain alive. Sic transit gloria mundi, H.

would be borne by the department. It was recommended that a committee of seven members of Synod be appointed to supervise the Boy's Residence, and plan for its advancement. Rev. F. G. Mackintosh Synodical representative stated that last year 21 boys were in residence, with 18 at the close of the term.

Dr. A. C. Grant, made a stirring appeal for financial support, stating that the Presbyterians in Canada should raise \$200,000 additional this year to put the church in the position to which it is entitled. In 1925 he said, the Presbyterians led in education, home missions, foreign missions, and in every department of the church's activities, and to again place the church in this position the loyalty and generous support of every member is required. He pointed out that last year the budget allocation was \$700,000, but this total was not reached. The amount had been allocated \$400,000 to Ontario, \$200,000 to Quebec \$70,000 to the Maritime Provinces and \$50,000 to the Western Provinces. It was suggested that the Maritime Synod appoint a special committee in raising this amount.

Last year Col. Thomas Cantley M. P., New Glasgow, Dr. Murray MacLaren, M. P. St. John were members of the committee and today Synod appointed the following to be associated with them—Dr. Kennawin, of New Brunswick, Dr. Hugh Munroe, of New Glasgow, Dr. McCulloch Thompson and Chester MacLellan of Sydney.

The following protest was brought before the meeting:—"We, the undersigned members of the Maritime Synod, of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, having listened with deep regret to the resolution re temperance passed by the Synod at the morning session of today, after due consideration have concluded that we cannot allow the general public to get the impression that the said resolution is the unanimous finding of the said Maritime Synod, and we are compelled to register our protest against the indefiniteness of the said resolution.
