The Moslems insist that the introduction of these objects and the practice of congregational praying is an infringement of the status quo, and point to a variety of official rulings, both Turkish and British, in support of their contention; and although the mats and other things to the introduction of which objection is made may seem insignificant, Christians are in no position to blame the Moslems for making a mountain out of a molehill, as they have to remember with shame that rival Christian churches have shed blood about the position, not of a whole mat or carpet, but of one small corner of a carpet in the Church of the Nativity at Bethlehem.

The Christians are accustomed by now to the existence of Holy Places cheek by jowl with those belonging to rival Churches (in Jerusalem, unfortunately, "rival" is in most cases the word to be applied to Churches which elsewhere would be quite content to be "sister"), but the Moslems have more spacious ideas. The Rock of Sacrifice of the Jews, on which Abraham made ready to offer up Isaac, which afterwards served in turn as the foundation for the great Altar of Sacrifice in front of the temple of King Solomon, Zerubbabel, and King Herod, and of the High Altar of the Crusaders' Temple Church, was the spot from which the Prophet Mohamed started on his journey to Heaven while still in this life. Its sanctity in Moslem eyes therefore is such that it affects its surroundings far and near, and for this reason the Moslems refused to sell the courtyard under the Wailing Wall, although it is nearly 200 yards away from the Rock, when the Jews, in 1919, made an offer to buy the place at any price in reason which the Moslems might fix.

MOVE MARY BOOTH WITH 15 OTHERS FROM ARMY POSTS

LONDON, Sept. 9.—Commander Mary Booth is reported in a London newspaper as speaking as if her leaving the command of the Salvation Army in Germany is due to her objection to committee government in the Salvation Army.

I am informed at International headquarters in London that Commander Booth has been moved from her post in Germany precisely in the same way as fifteen other commissioners have recently been changed. She has not yet received a new appointment but has been given three months' furlough. There has been no change whatever in the system of government of the Salvation Army, though an inquiry into the Army's constitution is being held.

Mrs. J. H. McPhail's pen of B. R. 20 leads the contest for the week with 49 eggs, 51.9 points; Mr. S. R. Pendleton's B. R. pen 19 is second with 43 eggs, 49.1 points; Mr. George Boswall's B. R. pen 18 is third with 43 eggs and 49 points.

The Experimental Farm, Fredericton, N. B. B. R. hen 10 still leads the contest with 243 eggs, 282.6 points; Mr. S. R. Pendleton's B. R. hen 6 is second with 251 eggs, 280.5 points; The Experimental Farm, Fredericton, B. R. hen 3 is third with 230 eggs, 277.3 points.

WOULD ABOLISH RIGHT TO MAKE PRIVATE WAR

GENEVA, Sept. 9.—Great Britain formally proposed in the Assembly of the League of Nations today that the right to make private war should be struck from the covenant of the league. Right Hon. Arthur Henderson, British Foreign Secretary, in submitting the proposal, cited provisions in the Covenant which, under certain circumstances, recognized the right of a member to resort to war. This right had been abolished under the terms of the Kellogg-Briand Pact, he said.

"Our only purpose," Mr. Henderson added, "is to bring the covenant into line with the wider outlawry of war which we have all signed."

The British resolution notes the effect of the signature of the Kellogg Pact, and adds: "The tenth assembly considers that, in order to take into account the progress thus made in organization for peace, it is desirable to re-examine articles twelve and fifteen of the covenant of the league to determine whether it is necessary to make any modification therein."

"I am happy to say," the British Foreign Minister continued, "that I submit this resolution not only in the name of the British delegation but also in the names of the delegations of France, Italy, Belgium, Chile and Denmark. The resolution in principle has also the sympathetic approval of the German delegation."


