## Pre-Season Hockey Training Period Draws To Close; Canadiens Score First Win

Firing of the starting gun close at hand, statisticians were busy today figuring just what chances Dave "Sweeney" Schriener had of retaining his National Hockey League scoring title. Odds were against the slick-haired youngster from Alberta's foothills—they seldom repeat in the big time. Staunch supporters of Calgary's Dave figure he'll duplicate Charlie Conacher's feat and take the laurels a second straight term.

Conacher's hopes of regaining his crown received a jolt when Maple Leaf Club ruled the Big Bomber would not start against Detroit Red Wings in Toronto Thursday and would likely see no action in Saturday's game with Amerks as guests.

But there are others who threaten to dethrone Schriener. Marty Barry, smooth pivot man of the champion Wings, has been prolific in pre-season engagements, while his wing-mate, Larry Aurie and Herbie Lewis, both have to be reckoned with. Cec Dillon, Rangers' winger, appears headed for a great season and Chicago's Paul Thompson may reach top position.

Conn Smythe's men looked mighty good before a home crowd last night as they split up for the final exhibition game of a strenuous tour. It looks as though Toronto folk will see lot of wide open hockey and whether George Hainsworth gets the goal call again or is replaced by young Turk Broda, there will be little to worry about in the net minding division.

Jimmy Fowler, Toronto product who made good with Syracuse last year, was given his OK tag by the experts. The big blond likes it rough and is a dangerous rusher—he should succeed in filling the defense gap left vacant by popular Andy Blair who was sold to Chicago Black Hawks.

So pleased with his new York Rangers' rejuvenated lineup, is Lester Patrick, he's becoming absent-minded. As the boys loafed around their hotel after trimming Philadelphia Ramblers 7-2 in an exhibition game yesterday, Lloyd Doubell, Stratford rookie, asked the Ranger boss if he had sore feet. Lester glanced down to discover he had forgotten to change his bedroom slippers for shoes.

It's axe-welding time in Canadiens' camp and nine players will find themselves in other circles within the next few days. Manager Cecil Hart figures 23 players are too many to handle to the general benefit of the club, and showing of players in tonight's exhibition

hibition tussle with Providence Reds will determine the fate of several rookies.

Boston Bruins, first team to test Canadiens' strength in a league fixture, continued to show power as they took a lead in their Maritime series with Montreal Maroons. With Eddie Shore back in harness, Bruins licked Tommy Gorman's men 3-2 at Halifax last night in the fifth pre-season joust between the two clubs. Cooney Weiland showed a return to his scoring form figuring in two of Boston's three counters.

## Now U.S. Pros Talk Stymies

NEW YORK, Nov. 2—(AP)—The stymie argument that flared into the headlines when Johnny Fischer, the new amateur champion, was benefited by a "break" in defeating Jock McLean of Scotland in the United States final at Garden City's due for another going over—this time from the professional side.

The stymie question was debated so heatedly prior to the national amateur that the United States Golf Association decided to feel the collective pulse of the simon-pures to determine the majority attitude. Questionnaires asking the contenders to describe the stymies and the effect they had on the various matches were circulated. The returns are being studied by U. S. G. A. officials prior to their annual debate over the question of retaining or abolishing the stymie from competition in this country.

Although there is no indication that the controversial subject is on the docket, it is bound to come up for discussion when the United States Professional Golf Association holds its meeting in Chicago, Nov. 10-12, just a few days before the national P. G. A. tournament at Pinehurst, N. C. Opinion among the mercenaries of golf is "quite divided on the subject of the stymie.

Inasmuch as the P. G. A. tournament—scheduled for Nov. 16-22—is the only considerable one in which the money golfers compete for keeps over the match-play route, there will be heated discussion if a stymie turns an important match one way or another.

The pro game is generally tuned to medal play, in which stymies do not figure. A ball on the green which impedes another is putted out or lifted. Even if the ball closer to the hole affects the sighting of the putt and is not in a direct line between the "away" ball and the hole it may be lifted.

The show has attracted 537 horses, a new record for the exhibition. The military competition, a nightly event culminating in the team championship on Tuesday, will bring into action the representatives of Canada, the Irish Free State, Great Britain, France, Sweden, Chile and the United States.

In addition to disqualifying Privileged and giving the first prize money, \$25,300 net, to Matey's owner, the stewards suspended Arcaro.

## Braddock In No Hurry To Post Forfeit

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—James J. Braddock is due to deposit a \$5,000 cheque with the New York State Athletic Commission tomorrow, but there was no indication tonight the money will be laid on the line.

The Commission wants the cheque as evidence of the Heavyweight Champion's intentions of fighting Max Schmeling in a title bout next June. It is long overdue. Brig.-Gen. John J. Phelan, Chairman of the Commission has been firing telegrams from the New York headquarters of the Cham calling his attention to tomorrow's date, but Tex Sullivan, Braddock's secretary said neither the title-holder nor manager Joe Gould would be on hand.

Braddock is in Hot Springs, Ark., recuperating from an arthritis attack which caused postponement of the September fight and Gould is with him.

"Gould is due back the last of this week or the first of next and will take care of the cheque then," said Sullivan.

Braddock also was ordered in tomorrow for a physical examination and general check-up.

Evidence that the Champ is well on the road to complete recovery is seen in Gould's announcement that Braddock will fight an exhibition in Havana late in December with Jack McCarthy, Boston heavyweight.

Principal business before the Commission tomorrow probably will be to name Izzy Jannazzo to fight Barney Ross Nov. 27 for the Welterweight title.

## Rookies Make Good Showing In Campaign

NEW YORK, Nov. 3—Having made good in their first real try in the big time, 10 new major leaguers, headed by Joe Dimaggio of the Yankees, Bob Feller of the Indians and Jimmy Ripple of the Giants, lead this winter's line at the baseball payoff window.

Dimaggio, with an average of .323 to present to a world championship management, is almost certain to get a substantial boost. Feller, centre of baseball's most interesting current controversy, will likely get what he wants without haggling; and Ripple, former Montreal Royal, who batted .306 and practically replaced Hank Leiber in centrefield for the Giants, will probably get his reward when owner Horace Stoneham mails the 1937 contracts.

General raises are expected for the pennant winning New York clubs, with Carl Hubbell, Freddy Fitzsimmons, Joe Moore and Mel Ott of the Giants, and Red Ruffing, Monte Pearson, Pat Malone and Bump Hadley, Bill Dickey, Lou Gehrig and Frankie Crosetti of the Yankees getting the biggest boosts.

## Other Prospects

Others in the National League whose prospects are good are Paul Waner Pirates, who won the National League batting crown with .373; Frank Demaree, Cubs, who boosted his average from .325 to .347; Kiki Cuyler of the Reds, who kited his mark 71 points to .328; and Baxter Jordan, Bees, who finished in the .323 slot.

## American Club Owners May Force Postponement Of Hockey League Opener

NEW YORK, Nov. 3—(CP)—Opening of the National Hockey League in season in Chicago Nov. 5 appeared in jeopardy tonight.

Following action of the major ice circuit in announcing today the League had incorporated the New York Americans under a new name and new management officials of the club declared unless the Americans' rights were protected the game would not be allowed to start, if it was legally possible to halt it.

Marty Schenker, business manager of the Amerks, entrained for the team's training camp at Oshawa, Ont., tonight. He will leave with the team for Chicago, he said and unless the players participate as signed players of the Americans he would prevent them from taking the ice if a court restraining action would accomplish this purpose.

The League took action today after declaring forfeit the Americans franchise two weeks ago for failure of the club management to meet an N.H.L. demand to liquidate its debts. President Frank Calder was named president and treasurer of the new outfit named "American National Hockey Club Inc." Manager Mervin Dutton was appointed vice-president.

Schenker claims the players are all signed to contracts bearing the signature of the "New York Hockey Club," (The Americans) and that his counsel has advised him the players cannot perform for any other corporation, at least not until legal action has been taken and a decision rendered one way or the other.

Negotiations for financing the Americans for the coming season were proceeding, Schenker claimed, even when newspapermen arrived at his office today to inform him of the League action.

"And not only will we halt the game in Chicago," Schenker concluded, "but we can, I am advised, stop the games in Toronto Saturday night and in New York on Nov. 12."

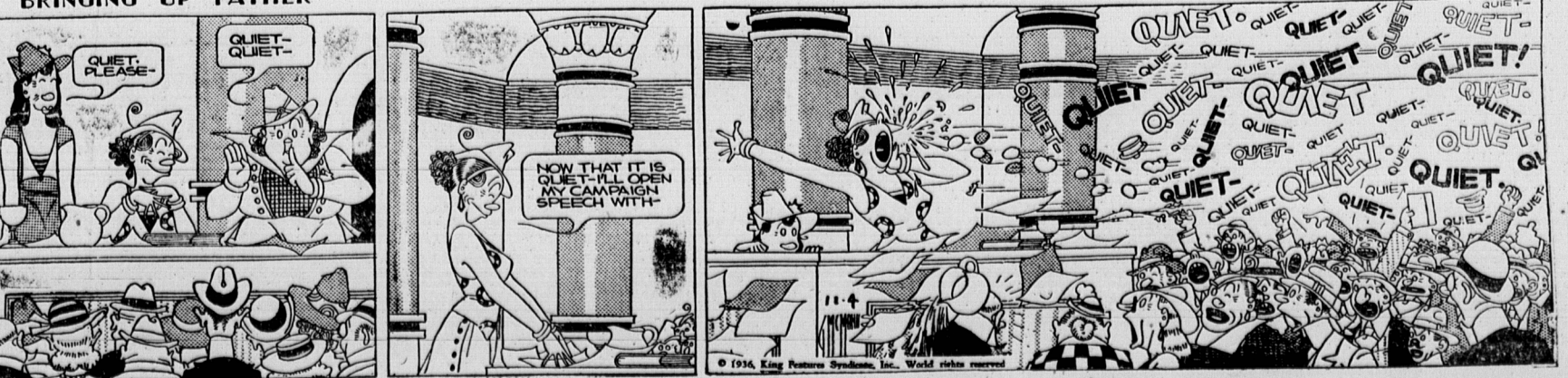
