Prince Edward Island took the lead in dairy farming as well, it surpassed all others.

### Better Markets Needed

In the past the governments had centered their energies more or less on agriculture, and the federal and provincial departments had devoted much energy, and spent much money, in the improvement of two things, namely quantity of production, an quality. More success had been attained in quantity in the West than in the East. But there was another phase of agricultural success that in the mind of the Prime Minister was too much neglected, and that was not the problem of better or more production at all, but of suitable and adequate markets. In the other parts of the world much emphasis had been placed on this question of recent years, and Denmark, Holland, and the United States, had endeavored to develop their markets along certain narrow channels. Canada had also paid some attention to the question, but nothing like what it should have. In Western Canada there were now organized and in operation pools for the selling of western wheat. This idea had taken birth in Manitoba in 1919, when the Government at that time, of which the present Prime Minister was then a member, managed the sale of wheat much to the advantage of the whole Province. The idea then took root, and the farmers sold themselves to some terrible abuse on account of it because there were many who at first bitterly opposed it, and he had been one of the originators of the idea. As the whole thing worked out, in spite of the opposition, it was seen that government control was not the thing, and it was dropped. But the new government, on coming in said that the pools would be restored. However they made such a mess of the legislation and made the thing so unworkable that they could get no one who was willing to undertake the job, even though they offered a very high salary. The farmers then got together themselves, and imitating the plan of the old wheat board, met with considerable success. Whether the scheme would become a permanent remained yet to be seen. But the pool-idea had taken root in the country and a large percentage of farm products

did this they made it not a luxury tax any longer, for it became in reality, if not in name, a new excise tax or duty. The Liberal Government recognized this, because they called it the luxury or excise tax.

They removed also the tariff on car parts not made in Canada, but they left the protection as it was before. All that a purchaser got off his car now came from the national treasury.

As soon as the Liberals came into power it took the sales tax that the Conservatives had placed at three percent and raised it to six percent. This applied to clothing, harness, utensils and everything of common necessity. This tax brought the country one hundred million dollars a year. Two years ago the Liberals reduced it to five percent, but it still remained two thirds greater than it was under the Conservatives. And they had taken off the luxury tax on automobiles.

On the second of February, Mr. Stevens had levelled at the administration charges the most startling ever made in the Canadian Parliament. An investigating committee consisting of four Liberals, four Conservatives, and one Progressive was appointed. The Progressive had voted consistently with the Liberals for the past five years, and the committee was therefore loaded with a majority for the Government. This committee had unearthed things of a very startling nature, and had found evidence of extravagant waste, inefficiency, and corruption, that started all Canada. Customs officials were known to be implicated, and that people in high places were in league with wholesale smugglers, with those who had brought into the country goods made in prisons and laden with disease. On the evidence of business men it was stated that many industries had been forced to bankruptcy because they were unable to compete with these smuggled goods, much of it stolen property brought in from the States, here to find a safe haven and alone were importing millions made goods, with the result in thousands being driven out of employment. These illicit operations were of such an extent as to be almost unbelievable. Men whose sworn duty it was to put down smuggling and to prevent the importation of illicit liquor, were proven to be in the business themselves and making large sums from it. As a consequence of these revelations the Government found itself facing a self indictment that consisted of three thousand or more pages. The Committee brought in a verdict which declared that under the Liberal Government the procedure of the customs department had degenerated rapidly, and that was what the indictment conveyed. That this had been greatly accelerated in the last few years through Minister Bolvin of Customs failing to properly discharge the duties of his office. That was the unanimous finding of the Committee, but it went farther.

The Robb Budget  
The Liberals boasted that Mr. Robb had reduced taxes. So he did, but they were taken that the Liberals had themselves put on. Every reduction of taxes long before. As a matter of fact the taxes were mighty little reduced, and further they were reduced at the expense of the public debt. The reduction of taxation on automobiles had been all very well and good, but thought that he would rather have had the other necessities used by the common people who were too poor to buy automobiles.

The Automobile Tax  
The Premier would say something about the history of the automobile tax. The Liberals would like the people to believe that they had reduced the protection on motor cars. So they had, but they did it to get the advertising. The Conservatives felt quite certain that the Liberals would not stick to this legislation, but there was a big talk in the Liberal camp of sticking to their guns this time. "Who knew them knew they wouldn't." And neither they did. They sneaked out the back door to avoid being seen, and got into the predicament, so that no one would know it. The Conservatives had a luxury tax on automobiles, which seemed very fair, for that party thought that those who could afford to have automobiles, could afford to pay taxes on them. It was applied alike on Canadian and imported cars, and there was no element of protection in it. When this tax went on the price of cars went up, and the Government knew when it came off the price went down, but the Government would leave the motor car protection as before. The Liberals first reduced the excise tax and then took off the luxury tax from Canadian cars, but left it on imported cars as before. When they

Liberal Log-Rolling  
Whether or not the King Government gained power by right means, it was apparently more anxious to gain the friendship of the Progressives, and the majority of votes, than it was to govern the country. They were the main cause of what Canada had suffered in the last few years in industry and population. In consequence of the procedure of the King Government, Canada had lost the best portion of the sons and daughters of its homes.

A False Doctrine  
There never was a false doctrine preached than that the Maritimes had no need of protection. If everybody lived just by agriculture alone, then farming would not be

so successful. What better could happen than that industrial centres should spring up within the agricultural districts? Hadn't Sydney at one time been Prince Edward Island's best market? This case was a direct illustration that the smaller the industrial population the smaller the farming population. The best thing that could be done for agriculture on the island was a course that would add to the consuming masses, to pursue a course that would build up industries near at hand. Mr. Meighen said he was not arguing against foreign markets, but the government must first keep the home markets at their maximum. If you hear talk that prices are determined by other people, don't believe it. No country ever came great that did not bring into its own land everything concerning that land, or did not see that work was provided for all its classes. The principles of Macdonald, Carter, and Tupper had been proved, and had through experience taught us that whenever the country wavered in its principles, the country and its children suffered. Don't let anyone blind you to the soundness of the fiscal policy, pleaded Mr. Meighen. It was never more vital to the interests of Canada than it is today.

Home and Foreign Markets  
Mr. Meighen said he would next discuss home and foreign markets. In this country there was always a surplus of products, and the people here in this Province were more dependent than most on a foreign market for selling their produce. Everything the Government could do, continued the Prime Minister, would be done to enable this country to reach the home market. Any government with which a speaker was connected would spare no effort to do that. But at the same time it was necessary to build up a home market in our own country.
