THE LONGEST DAYS.—Today, Thursday, is one of the three longest days in the year, the 19th, 20th, and 21st. On those days the sun rises at 4.30 and sets at 8.08. On Friday the days begin to shorten, the sun rising one minute later, on the next three days another minute is deducted, this process being continued at the rate of about one minute every two days during the remainder of the month. The sun sets at the same hour, 8.08 till July 1st. On the 2nd it sets one minute, earlier after which the process of shortening the day by clipping off a minute at each end goes on until about the latter part of December.

WARNING TO AUTOMOBILES.—At the annual school meeting in Hampshire district on Tuesday evening an animated discussion arose in connection with the running of automobiles. Complaint was made that reckless drivers are in the habit of speeding along the road and that some have even gone so far as to take the number of their cars, so as to conceal their identity. The attention of the Automobile Association is directed to this matter and they are reminded that should this kind of recklessness be continued it will result in an agitation against the auto that will certainly close this road to them for all time to come. It is up to the Association to see to it that no autoist shall be allowed to bring the whole fraternity into the bad grace of communities which have only recently been persuaded to permit the autos to run on their roads.

WAS THERE A JONAH?—Four young Charlottetown girls who took a motor boat trip to Bonshaw last Sunday with four of their young friends of the male persuasion had an experience which they are not likely to forget in a hurry. They left Charlottetown Sunday morning and arrived safely at Bonshaw after a sail of about two hours and a half, and had a very pleasant sojourn there. Coming on towards seven o'clock in the evening their thoughts began to wander homeward, and the party, along about that time, set sail. At 9 p. m. the expedition found themselves "lost." It appears that the navigator trying to steer a course, like Columbus by the stars, got mixed, and the next thing the voyagers knew they were in sight of unknown land, which, it was ascertained, was a place known as Long Creek. A course was shaped anew for Charlottetown and coming on towards ten o'clock West River Bridge was sighted on the lee bow. Owing to the lateness of the hour and the fact that the stars had all retired early giving the voyagers no guide to sail by, it was agreed that it would be unwise to endeavor to navigate the tortuous windings of the West River, solely by the faint gleam of a pocket flashlight. Therefore, it was decided to land and seek shelter at some adjacent farmstead. While the boat was being headed for the shore she ran on a flat and despite all the prying of the engine, poling and rowing, the obstinate craft could not be persuaded to budge one way or another, and finally the tired crew signed to themselves to the cheerful gale by trying to float her and re-outlook of sitting all night in an open boat clad in light summer clothing with a slight drizzle of rain as the way and mud. He floundered out and soon the party got ashore and found the friendly farmhouse they had been praying for and got something in the shape of refreshments. —(they were nearly starved). At 9 a. m. Monday morning the adventurers made a fresh start for home. Twice their engine broke down, but after hard coaxing was persuaded to try again. By this time there was great anxiety in a number of city homes, and there were all sorts of conjectures as to what had happened and searching parties were being formed. When approaching Rocky Point quiet heavy seas were running and the voyagers were beginning to fear that they had only escaped the dangers of West River to become victims of the deeper waters nearer home. In fact their boat on several occasions came close to capsizing in the waves. The adventurers were finally sighted by Mr. George Vickers, who in his motor boat bravely faced the heavy seas and after hard work got a line on the craft and after a desperate battle with the elements succeeded in towing the wayward craft to Connolly's Wharf. Needless to say, there was joy and gratitude in the hearts of the girls, the three young bankers, and the motor boat owner, as they set foot on the solid plank of the wharf. It is said that it will take considerably more than ordinary persuasion to make some of the party undertake another Sunday motor boat trip.
