P.E.I.R. TIME TABLE.—The change in the time table of the P.E.I.R. comes into effect tomorrow.

IMPROVING.—It was reported from the Charlottetown Hospital this afternoon that both Mr. and Mrs. P. S. Brown, who are confined there, are improving. Mrs. Brown was taken to the Hospital on Tuesday afternoon, she having met with an accident. While out driving she was thrown from her sleigh in a runaway. Her injuries, however, proved not serious although very painful.

CONGRATULATIONS.—On New Year's day an esteemed fellow townsman, Mr. Phillip Large, celebrated the 83rd year of his birth and received congratulations from a large number of friends and acquaintances. Mr. Large is still smart and well and is daily engaged in the strenuous activities of business life. The Guardian joins in wishing Mr. Large many added years of health and usefulness.

EXCITEMENT.—Quite a lot of excitement was caused on Saturday the 20th day of December on the Rustico beach by the high tides caused by the north wind. The wind blew hard from that direction. Coupled with the tall end of a northern storm the waves caused a very high tide which furiously swept over the Rustico beach, causing some damages and great anxiety among the fishermen under whose dwellings the water rose to a depth of 2 feet 5 inches in some cases. Fishing shanties were carried off their blocks in two or three instances and fishing boats that had been snugged up for the winter were upset by the rising water. Had the wind blown from a northerly direction at the rate it actually blew from the north the damages would have been far greater and the anxiety and excitement would have almost caused a panic.

CONCERT.—A very enjoyable concert was organized by Miss Lucie Anne Doiron, teacher of Toronto school, in aid of her school and held in Mayfield hall on Monday night, Dec. 29th. A large number of people from all parts of the province and Rustico were present. The best order prevailed during the performance which is a credit to the neighboring parishes. The performers were many and suitably trained for the occasion beyond the expectation of the audience. The first number on the program was an organ solo by Miss Marguerite Dolron of Hope River who performed in a most entrancing manner. Then followed a dialogue of the most interesting nature. A chorus "Nearer my God to Thee" by seven of the young people, boys and girls of Hope River, principally from Mayfield and Toronto, was performed with the greatest of ease and accuracy which shows that ample time was spent in practise. After the above chorus was a dialogue, in which the characters were dressed to suit the nature of the play. Songs and dialogues of various kinds were given, all of which were in accordance with and even beyond the expectation of the eager audience. Varied and beautiful pieces were played on the graphophone the property of Mr. Joseph Boute which greatly contributed toward the success of the concert. A number of pianos supplied by the ladies of the district were bought freely and at a high price by the young men of the audience. Step dancing was performed by a few of the young folks, to the tunes played by Mr. Peter Leclair on the violin. The concert ended with God Save the King sung unanimously by the audience who afterwards retired with happy impressions of a well prepared concert with prevailing good order.

ELDON EXAMINATION.—On Tuesday, December 23rd, the semi-annual examination of Eldon school was held in the school-room in the presence of over forty parents and visitors. The schoolroom presented a most pleasing appearance in its holiday dress. Chief among the decorations was a beautiful framed picture of the King and Queen draped most artistically with Union Jacks; while an immense Christmas tree, its branches bending with the precious parcels entrusted to their keeping, also occupied a prominent position in the room. Promptly at one thirty Mr. J. D. Martin took the chair and the examination was opened by a chorus, The Iselann Hymn. The pupils were then examined in the various branches by their teachers, Miss Nellie Eubrey, and the Messrs. Macdonald, MacLean and Martin and the Misses MacLean and Macdonald; and by the interest and knowledge displayed by the pupils the visitors were fully satisfied regarding the intellectual progress of their children. The following program was then delightfully rendered: chorus, Heart of Oak; Recitation, St. Nick's Suggestion, by Margaret Gillis; Duet, Blue Bells of Scotland, by Mary Macdonald and Everett Lesour; Dialogue, A Christmas Wish, personating children of foreign countries at the Christmas season. Quartet, Christmas Day; Essay, The First Christmas Day, by Robert West; Recitation, Santa Claus, by Sherman Bowers; Dialogue, A Mother Goose Christmas, in which Old Mother Goose and twenty of her youthful characters paid a midnight visit to a small but ardent Mother Goose admirer. Santa Claus was introduced towards the conclusion of the last number and entered heartily into his task of distributing the wealth of Christmas cheer from the Christmas tree. Among the many, many gifts which the tree held was a beautifully bound volume of Burn's Poems to the teacher from the pupils. The teacher thanked the pupils for their thoughtfulness and after both she and Santa Claus extended their best wishes to all, for a Merry Christmas, the examination closed.

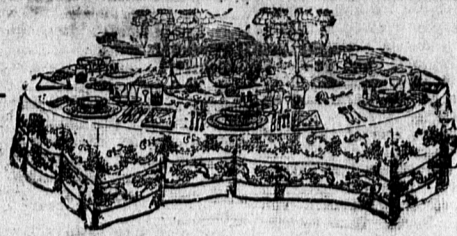
