CHANGES IN TIME ISLAND DIVISION, NOVEMBER 2nd, 1925

Changes in time covering the train service of the Island Division of the Canadian National Railways will go into effect November 2nd.

Service to the Mainland will be by train No. 39, leaving Charlottetown daily except Sunday at 6:45 A. M., due at Borden 8:50 A. M., Sackville 11:45 A. M. and Moncton 1:45 P. M., making connections with the Westbound “Ocean Limited” for Montreal and with No. 13 train for Saint John and Boston. Connection is made at Sackville with Train No. 2 “Maritime Express” for Truro and Halifax, and with No. 18 train, Eastbound Local.

S. S. “Prince Edward Island” will leave Tormentine for Borden at 10:30 A. M. or after the arrival of train leaving Sackville at 7:15 A. M., and connection is made with train leaving Borden at 11:45 A. M., connecting at Emerald Jet. with train No. 213 for Summerside, leaving Charlottetown at 2:45 P. M. S. S. “Prince Edward Island” will again leave Tormentine after the arrival of Train No. 42 from Moncton and Sackville, due at Tormentine at 2:35 P. M. connecting with No. 3 train at Emerald Jet. for Summerside, and arriving Charlottetown 6:30 P. M. There will be no later trip of the Steamer and the noon train now leaving Charlottetown at 1:15 P. M. will be cancelled.

Train No. 213 will leave Charlottetown for Summerside at 11:20 A. M. and No. 3, Mixed Train, will leave at 3:00 P. M. as usual.

Train No. 214, leaving Summerside at 7:00 A. M. will connect at Emerald with train No. 39 for Borden, and arrive in Charlottetown at 11-4-11-13-18-20-25-27.
