VERY deep sympathy is felt in Millport for Mrs. Gilles and relatives in the death of Capt. John Gilles, which occurred at St. Elizabeth Nursing Home, Glasgow, last week of amputation of the right foot, which operation was performed on Tuesday, and on Thursday he died. He was conscious till the last death being due to heart failure. There were four doctors and five nurses and he had every care and attention. Captain Gilles was a gentleman of outstanding physique and very well known in Cumbria, where he has resided each successive season for a number of years. His popular pastime was on the bowling green, where his fine gentlemanly qualities won him a host of friends, and his death, coming as a surprise to a wide circle, is deeply regretted.—Glasgow Scotland Herald. Roberts of Liverpool, Eng., where he was largely interested in ships, having retired as Ships, Commodore.)

Mr. Gay is a son of the late Howard Gay of Pownal, and was born at that place April 23rd, 1834. In 1856 he settled at Albion Cross and engaged in farming, in which occupation, "by prudent thrift and hardy toil," he succeeded in a marked degree. Mr. Gay enjoys the distinction of possessing the first "tread" threshing machine in this part of King's County and with it he traversed a wide range of country, having threshed for the farmers from Poplar Point, Lot 54, to Glouce, Lot 41. Mr. Gay raised a large family of sons and daughters. Those living are: Howard in Eureka Cal., Samuel in Santiago Cal., Mrs. Schroeder in Dawson City; Catherine in Boston, Mrs. Blair, Somerville Mass.; Mrs. Van Warner, Amherst Mass.; Archibald and Maggie at home. Mr. Gay enjoys the respect and esteem of the community in which he has lived so long. His numerous friends join in wishing him many happy returns of his natal day.
