## EDMONTON GIRLS MAKING HISTORY BY GOING AFTER OLYMPIC HONORS



For the first time in history, Canada will be represented at the Olympic Games in July of this year by a team of young ladies—the Commercial Graduates Basketball Club, of Edmonton, Alberta. The application of the club for official sanction of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada to represent the Dominion at Paris was unanimously granted, the only stipulation being that the team must meet all its own expenses. This was made necessary because the basketball tournament will be an exhibition event, and not part of the official Olympic program.

It is estimated that it will cost at least \$10,000 to finance the undertaking, and that this colossal enterprise is being handled entirely by the young ladies comprising the "Grads" is something that is probably without parallel in the history of sport.

About a year ago the western

girls won in rapid succession the Canadian and International basketball championships from London, Ontario, and Cleveland, Ohio. So decisive were these victories that the "Grads" sought further honors and immediately communicated with the Federation Sportive Femine Internationale in an endeavor to arrange a tournament open to the world during the Olympic games. The suggestion met with the approval of the French governing body, with the result that the Edmonton girls will attempt to bring to Canada its first championship in basketball.

In preparation for the games in Paris, the westerners have met and defeated the best teams in both Canada and the United States, running up a string of twenty straight victories since they first won the Canadian title. On several occasions, more than 5,000 spectators have packed the Edmonton arena

to see the "Pride of the West" in action. Every member of the team is a graduate of the Commercial High School and a former student of Coach J. Percy Page. Winifred Martin, the captain, holds two degrees from Queen's University, and in 1918 won the Canadian type-writing championship. Like most western girls, all the "Grads" are excellent skaters, while several of them are also prominent in golf and tennis circles. Two members of the team are teachers, one a book-keeper and the others stenographers. Their ages vary from 17 to 24, and their weights from 121 to 139.

## ABEGWEITS SHOW THE WAY TO CRYSTALS LAST NIGHT 4-2

### Champions Demonstrate Class in Second Period, Moving into Commanding Lead And Are Never Headed.

A game replete with numerous thrills, hard backchecking, sensational goal saving and just enough roughness to keep the fans on edge throughout, featured the third hockey fixture in the P. E. H. L. last night at the Arena, when the Abegweits went into a one game lead by defeating the Summerside Crystals by a score of 4 goals to 2.

The game was played on perhaps the most perfect sheet of ice this season, and upwards of nine hundred fans, including approximately one hundred and thirty Crystals rooters, who arrived on a special train last evening from Summerside to witness the game.

The visitors, although beaten last night showed exceptional hockey especially in the second and third periods, bringing the fans to their feet time after time as they skated into the scoring belt.

"Longshot" Charlie Cahill was the most outstanding player on the Westerners' lineup last night, his work on the front line was brilliant from start to finish, while McQuarrie and Gauthier showed class in spots which was hard to beat; Gauthier's backchecking and McQuarrie's defence was an exceptional feature especially in the last period.

**2nd PERIOD**  
Official time—9:09. This frame gets away fast with Kelly going in to Crystal territory for a long shot and misses. A series of end to end rushes occur, Roy Prowse finally giving the Abbie rooters an opportunity to cheer when he banged the puck behind Corney for the first tally of the evening at 9:14—he was accompanied by "Wackey" E. Prowse replaces McEachern the same time. Prowse's counter evidently had a tendency to increase the pace as both teams were moving with great speed, Cahill intercepting pass and shoots from outside defence, Diamond again saves nicely. For the rest of the period the Champions dominated the play the forward line, Prowse, Gordon, Cronin, McEachern, being too fast for the Crystals forwards. Gordon shows class from Cronin's pass at centre ice and manoeuvred through for the second score at 9:16 and two minutes later again counters for the third and final tally of the season. Score Abegweits, 3; Crystals, 0.

During the first session, in fact, to be exact, eight minutes past the opening whistle, Crockett the Crystal star goalie received a nasty gash on the forehead when he "bobbed" Cronin's shot at the mouth of the net; he was relieved by Corney who showed up equally as well, giving a splendid exhibition of net-minding for the remainder of the game.

The Abegweits' victory although clean cut and decisive was a hard fought win from bell to bell, with the front line at intervals being forced to back-check with a vengeance in order to hold their opponents. Combination however, proved the deciding factor of the issue when the Maritime Champions, in the second period got going and beat Corney for three counters before the bell; McEachern, Gordon, and Roy Prowse working smoothly throughout.

The champions last night were somewhat handicapped by the absence of Fred Moore from the defence who is out of the game temporarily due to injuries received last Friday night at Summerside; nevertheless, Kelly, his team-mate carried on and played a bang-up game for the entire stanza.

**THE GAME**  
Started on time 8:30 sharp, with Gordon carrying into scoring zone, but loses to Cahill who goes through to Diamond, "Dutchy" saving nicely. Kelly secures rubber, stick-handles past neutral ice, but shoots wild, Cronin gets rebound and Crockett, Crystal goalie makes nice stop. The visitors take charge of rubber and bombard Diamond, but there is nothing doing. E. Prowse and Gordon get going for what looks like a score, Prowse overkating on the pass. The Champions although skating hard and stick-handling, are forced to bend to the Crystal defence, who are well up and repeatedly break all efforts at combination. Cahill intercepts pass and goes for rink end rush, but it is time wasted as Diamond sheds the disc.

The game slowed somewhat with both squads resorting to long shots Cronin nearly counters for Abbies on bully in front of Crystal net and after a mixup, Cronin again gets in a slant, the rubber hitting Crockett on the forehead forcing him to retire from the game.

After a delay of ten minutes the fixture resumes with Corney replacing Crockett in the net. The Abbies force the issue and the new goalie has a busy time under a rain of rubber, but proves equal to the occasion by making a number of sensational stops. Morris finally relieving the situation on a pilgrimage into local territory, Diamond being called upon to deliver and repeated when Rogers got the rebound.

Lon Campbell receives a big ovation from the fans as he replaces Cronin on the wing. The Abegweits again try combination but in vain, as the Crystal forwards back-skate nicely to ruin all endeavors. Gordon shows up remarkably at this stage, giving an exhibition of skating and stickhandling, wonderful to behold.

The Crystals although showing nice team play on the front line, resorted to long shots which were out of the question, as Diamond handled all chances with ease.

The first penalty of the night occurred when E. Prowse was chased for 2 minutes on a trip. With Prowse "resting" the Crystals redoubled their efforts for a counter Gauthier nearly realizing as Diamond takes the shot on one knee. Shortly before the bell, McQuarrie gets a forced vacation for tripping, Lon Campbell and Gordon at the same tie combining for a rink-end advance, but are felled by Rogers at the mouth of the net. On the eve of the game McEach-

defence is worked overtime on the onslaught, but this is only momentary, as Gordon and Lou Campbell combine to force Summerside approach, forcing Corney to make one of the best saves of the night as R. Prowse gets Campbell's rebound which made Corney's job all the more complete. Cronin replaces McEachern on the front line as Cahill goes through for what looks safe, Cronin and Diamond plays safe, Cronin and McQuarrie are banished for two minutes as the going becomes faster, Diamond is again forced to work with a will to keep the rubber outside but is at last beaten when Gauthier scores from ten feet out at 9:55. Score Abegweits 3, Crystals, 1.

With the last act half gone, the homsters redouble their efforts and are rewarded when E. Prowse counters from the wing on a dribble at 9:58. Score, Abegweits 4, Crystals, 1. Toward the end, the Summerside boys show real hockey ability and stamina by forcing the Abbies to head after an onslaught on Diamond, McQuarrie counting individually at 9:58 1/2. Score Abegweits 4, Crystals 2. McEachern relieves Gordon and skates to Corney who is compelled to move fast on the shot to save. McQuarrie takes the rebound accompanied by Cahill into Abbie territory where the bell brings hostilities to a close. Final score: Abegweits 4, Crystals, 2.

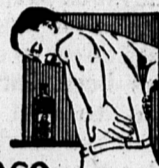
