Five Injured In Rail Accident

MONTREAL, Jan. 10.—(Canadian Press)—Five passengers were taken to Hawkesbury, Ont., hospital today with minor injuries received when three coaches of a Canadian Pacific railway train running between Ottawa and Montreal was derailed three miles west of Calumet, Que., the railway announced. The passengers, none of whose injuries was serious, were Mrs. Emile Gaston, Verdun, Que., Mr. and Mrs. Lucien Thomas, Montreal; Mrs. Denise Jette, Ste. Hyacinthe, Que., and Miss Claire Hune-

ault, Calumet, Que. Other passengers suffered only superficial bruises and scratches, the announcement stated.

The accident occurred at 4:15 this afternoon and was caused by a broken rail.

—PENSIONS TRIBUNAL—Colonel McKenzie and Major Thompson, of the Federal Pensions Tribunal, held a session of their Court in Summerside on Monday. Several cases came before them and evidence taken. Decisions will be given at a later date.—8.

—BARN BURNED AT TRAVELLERS REST—The barn and hen house on the farm of Mrs. Wm. McDonald, of Travellers Rest were burned to the ground in the early hours of Monday morning. The fire was not discovered until the building was practically in ruins as the farm was unoccupied. There was some machinery and wagons in the barn, but no livestock.—8.

—SUMMERSIDE TOWN COUNCIL MEETING—The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held on Monday evening; Mayor Manson presiding. Councillors present were: Schurman, McNeill, Grady, Bell and Kelly. After the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings, the town bills were passed as follows: Paid bills, \$6,753.07; Unpaid bills, \$24.58; Electric Light Paid Bills, \$423.02; Unpaid bills, \$755.66. The monthly reports of the committees were received and the meeting adjourned until January 16th, when the annual statements will be submitted.—8.

—PASSED AWAY ON SUNDAY—There passed away on Sunday evening on the Pearson homestead at Seven Mile Bay, John Hagan, in his 73rd year after a brief illness. The deceased was a most highly respected resident of North Carleton for many years. He was formerly of Kelly's Cross. Some years ago he met with an accident in the woods, which left him lame, but he continued to farm up to the time of his last illness. He was a member of the Roman Catholic Church at Seven Mile Bay and received the consolation of his religion before he died. There are left to mourn his passing, two daughters, Mrs. Jeremiah Noonan and Mrs. Frank Kelly, of Albany and four sons, Basil, Herman and Augustus, of Halifax, N.S., and Emmitt, of Albany; and one brother, Frank, of Kelly's Cross, to all of whom much sympathy is extended. The funeral took place on Tuesday morning from Seven Mile Bay Church, Rev. W. E. Monaghan officiating. Interment was in the cemetery adjoining the church.—8.

—FORMER ISLANDER DEAD—Dr. John F. McNeill received the sad news on Saturday of the death that morning of his brother, Daniel K., at his home in Betalock, Saskatchewan, after a short illness. The deceased was 73 years of age and was born at Canoe Cove, the son of the late Daniel McNeill, of that place. When a boy the family removed to West River, where Mr. McNeill resided until some few years ago, when he took up farming in Saskatchewan and was very successful. His wife died many years ago. There are left to mourn, two daughters, Catherine, Mrs. Charles Andrew, (formerly of Summerside), who has lived with her father since the death of her husband; Miss Jean, and two sons, Wallace and John, all residing at home; also four brothers, Cecil McNeill, Vancouver, B.C.; Dr. James W., Superintendent of the Provincial Hospital, North Battleford; Rev. Norman A. McNeill, of Sussex, N. B., and Dr. John F. McNeill, M.L.A., of Summerside; and one sister, Mrs. C. R. Marsh, of Fullerton, California, to all of whom much sympathy is

extended. Interment will be in Betalock, Saskatchewan.—8.

—ANNUAL MEETING—The annual meeting of the Summerside Fire Department was held on Monday evening in the Firemen's Club Rooms in the Civic Building. The chief, W. B. McNeill presided. The officers for the coming year were nominated and will be submitted to the Town Council for their approval at their next meeting on Jan. 16th, and were as follows: Chief, W. B. McNeill; Assistant Chief, Duncan Palmer; Secretary, George Hogg. These officers all served in the same capacity last year. Officers appointed for the different companies are: No. 1 Company, Captain D. F. McNeill; 1st Lieut., Earle Sudbury; 2nd

Lieut., Charlie Mountain; No. 2 Company, Captain Claude Kenny; 1st Lieut., Earl Corne; 2nd Lieut., Eddie Ferguson; Hook and Ladder Company, Captain, Fred McLeod; 1st Lieut., Jerry Doucette; 2nd Lieut., John Watson. A motion was passed unanimously expressing the thanks of the Fire Department to the Mayor and Councillors and especially to Councillor Kelly, chairman of the Fire Committee, for their hearty co-operation and interest during the past year. The chief complimented the men on the efficient manner that they have turned out for fire practices and their promptness in turning out in answer to a summons. There have been a number of minor fires during the year, and one or two that might have proved serious had not

the firemen answered the call to duty with promptitude.—8.

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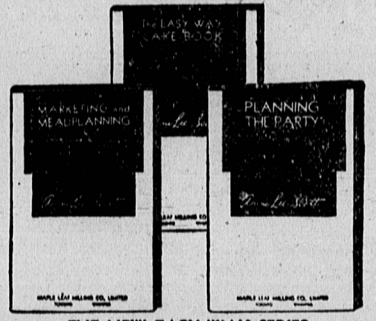
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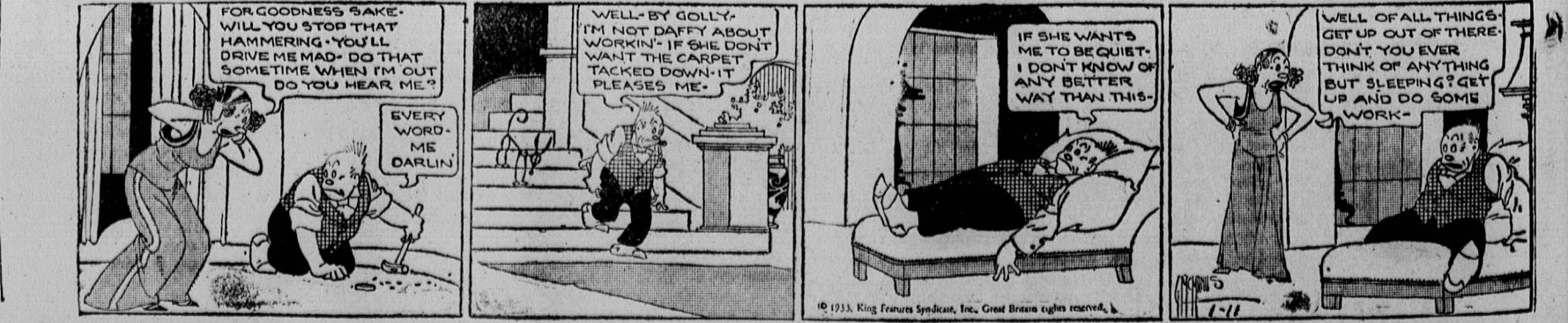
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
