THE MARKET.—Prices at the market yesterday continued much the same as previously quoted. The attendance was small. Butter sold at 35c per lb and eggs at 25c. There was a quantity of rhubarb which sold at 8c to 10c per bunch. Fowl, of which there was very few sold from \$2.00 to \$2.50. In the fish market fresh herring sold at 20 cts. per dozen; lobsters 20 cts. per pound, fresh cod, of which there was a large quantity, 8c per lb; fresh haddock, a very small quantity sold at 12 cts. per lb. Outside hay was selling at 95 cts. to \$1.10 per cwt. and very few oats which sold at 70c to 75c per bus.

ISLAND CHAMPION HERE.—Mr. William Halpenny has arrived in the city from Montreal and will immediately take up his duties as Abegweit athletic coach. Mr. Halpenny's appointment to this position is a fitting and commendable one as he is a man with a clean personal record and a most enviable reputation as an athlete. Beginning his career in this city he became Maritime pole vaulter and was induced by the wealthy Montreal Amateur Athletic Association to make his home there. Step by step he advanced and became Dominion champion. He represented Canada on the world's Olympic teams in Sweden, St. Louis, Chicago and has also competed on many occasions in New York and other large cities. Mr. Halpenny has resigned his position as assistant coach to the Montreal A. A. and will make his home in Charlottetown, his native city.

ISLANDERS PROMINENT.—Calgary recently held a big musical contest and festival in which island musicians figured. Mrs. F. B. Mahoney formerly Miss Winnie Blake of Charlottetown, who sang in the soprano class of the festival, Knox Church, was awarded the gold medal of her class by the adjudicator, T. T. ## An Eloquent Eulogy

TEXT OF ADDRESS DELIVERED BY REV. W. J. McLEOD AT SERVICE IN MEMORY OF REV. DR FULLERTON LAST SUNDAY

Rev. W. J. McLeod, in paying tribute to Rev. Dr. Fullerton in his address at the memorial service on Sunday said:

"Twenty-eight years of untiring devotion to the cause of Christ, almost the half of his short but intensely lived and fully rounded out life, and almost the whole of his active career, the prime days of manhood given unstintingly in this particular corner of God's Vineyard, only a man who is big of mind and stout of heart could have this record, and leave at the end a people whose loyalty and devotion grew stronger with the passing years.

Always active, he not only carried on most efficiently the work of the busy pastorate, but was a sane leader, whose counsel was sought both in the affairs of church and of state. Nothing was too trivial to claim his attention, no one too humble to win his sympathy, and he brought to bear on all things a mature judgment which invited for him his natural distinction of leadership. Many there are in that wide circle of acquaintanceship where life touched his, who are deeply grateful for his personal interest, assistance and support. No appeal was unanswered, no creed was a barrier, as quietly but wholeheartedly he went about his tasks, ministering in the name of the Nazarine. The broken needs who came with un certain step, the struggling souls who fought often what seemed a losing fight, found in him a friend who over tried to fan the smouldering flax into a flame, to heal the wounded spirit. With love for the desolate and the broken his heart went out to them in service, expressed in the kindly word, no thought of act which sought to bring to him his natural response of soul to soul. To the sufferers languishing on beds of sickness, to timorous souls facing the Valley of the Shadow, to the disconsolate the sorrowing and the broken hearted, his words of comfort, his numerous acts of kindness, his tender ministrations brought the encouragement of Christian hope.

His interests were not confined to the church, but were wide and varied, as his many gifts. Throughout, he kept up the studious habits acquired in earlier days and with the versatility characteristic of his natural ability he was equally at home in the pulpit, or on the platform. Endowed with a keen logical mind, he enjoyed a keen battle of wits, and never would he retreat from the stand of sincere conviction. An able debater, strong, forcible and convincing, he drove home his arguments with a fervor that bespoke intensity of purpose, he could give and take hard blows without cherishing the least ill will after the smoke of battle had blown away. Generosity of heart and judgment marked his friends in every sphere. He lived in a big world. A profound theologian and sound reasoner, an ecclesiastical authority, his opinion carried weight into the courts of the church. His knowledge of Presbyterian law and principle was thorough, and often to him the final appeal was made. His true courtesy coupled with a decided firmness, won the respect of brethren in all courts from the humble session to the more formidable Assembly.

As a pulpit orator he excited and graced every occasion in a way that did credit to his head and to his heart. In many Sanctuaries of our land his deep rich mellow voice proclaimed the words of truth and soberness. He preached a strong and virile gospel, and a lasting message that challenged the thinking mind. To him, religion was not a thing of cant or levity, but a serious reality, the expression of eternal verities. Equaled only by his love for his church was that love for his country, and he gave himself unreservedly to her service. Stirred by the warm glow of the thrills every Scottish heart he recollected at the thought that Britain's sons would be trampled beneath the feet of the oppressor, that the sons of men in whose veins flowed the blood of a Wallace, a Wellington or a Nelson, that the sons of fathers who had purchased liberty by untold sacrifices should relinquish what had been so dearly bought, he made effort assumed to treat, no demand exacting, as with ready response he offered himself voluntarily for the far-flung battle line, or

He, though dead, still speaks—speaks throughout the whole church to which he consecrated his life; in the Province where he is known and respected—in this city where he identified himself with every cause for betterment;—in this church where he has been so long revered as a tower of strength; above all in the home, where he was best known, and therefore most beloved,—a kind husband and father whose place cannot be filled.  
May the knowledge of a life well lived and a fight well fought, and a crown well won, sustain them in the hour of trial, and ever be before them in life's struggles as a prayer of the one they love. May God be with them and through the eyes that are dimmed with tears reveal, through a human Father's love, the love of a Heavenly Father with Whom he is now at Home.  
Hear the words of Victor Hugo, words that warmed the heart of our departed friend and tell of his eternal home.  
"I feel immortality in myself. I am rising I know towards the sky—The earth gives me its generous sap, but heaven lights me with the reflection of unknown worlds. (You say the soul is nothing—but the resultant of bodily powers. Why, then is my soul more luminous as the bodily powers begin to fail?)  
Winter is on my head, but eternal lived and a fight well fought, and a crown well won, sustain them in breathe at this hour as I did at the age of twenty the fragrance of lilacs, and violets and roses. The nearer I approach the end, the plainer I hear around me the immortal symphonies of the worlds to come. It is marvellous yet simple. It is a fairy tale yet a fact. When I go down to the grave I shall have ended my day's work. But another day will begin next morning: Life closes in the twilight; it opens with the dawn."  
Also his favorite poem in Whit-tier:  
I know not where his islands lift  
Their fringed palms in air;  
I only know I cannot drift  
Beyond his love and care."  
For though from out our bourne of Time and Place,  
The flood may bear me far,  
I hope to see my Pilot face to face  
When I have crossed the bar."
