AMERICAN OFFICERS HAVE BEEN RECALLED.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—The five American army officers on duty as military observers with German armies have been ordered home, and their places will not be taken by other officers. The reason assigned by Secretary of War Garrison for the recall order was that their mission had been fulfilled. This explanation, it was announced, would be the War Department's last word on the matter. It is known, however, that other reasons, largely of a personal character, were

considered by army officials in determining to withdraw the observers. The American officers, it is said, have found their position somewhat difficult because of the high tension which at least a few of those with whom they must come in contact in Germany have been strung by months of warfare and press reports in Germany criticizing the attitude of the United States on various subjects relating to the war.

So far as is known, the withdrawal of American military observers from other European armies is not contemplated.

HARBOUR FREE.—A Guardian reporter was informed yesterday that Georgetown harbour is now absolutely free of ice. Boats have been coming up regularly from Panmure Island and landing at McDonald Brothers' wharf since March 27. Motor boats have also begun to make use of the harbour.

SUPREME COURT.—The Supreme Court resumed yesterday and was engaged in hearing arguments in the case of Montgomery v. Douglass, motion for a new trial. The case was heard in January before Mr. Justice Haggard, without a jury and judgment given for the plaintiff. Counsel: K. J. Martin for plaintiff and D. A. McKinnon for defendant. Decision was reserved.

A CORRECTION.—Latest reports from Charles Rattee of the heavy battery, Halifax (not Neil as some despatches have had it) state that he is doing splendidly in the Military Hospital, that the broken limb is rapidly mending, and that he speaks in the highest terms of Miss Pope, Matron, and her great kindness. The accident happened on the morning of March 24th, the pole of No. 3 gun in some way swerving suddenly and striking the men on No. 4. Charlie received the blow on the leg, and was the only one of No. 4 to be really injured.

A PLEASANT SURPRISE.—"Home Talk," published in Brooklyn, N. Y., tells of a pleasing surprise given to Mr. M. A. Cuming a few days ago, by his employees, on his return from a trip to Cuba. The affair was engineered by a committee of the employees who numbered about 200. Cuming was "lured" to an automobile drive which ended at one of the fashionable hotels where the employees were assembled. Speeches were delivered and Mr. Cuming was presented with a handsome bronze Salton Roden figure, the only one of the kind in the United States and extremely rare and valuable. The presentation was followed by a luncheon, speeches and music. Mr. Cuming is brother of Mr. Charles Cuming, Chief Engineer of the Northumberland, whom he visited last summer. He is a manufacturer and a poet of considerable fame. One of his latest poems was published in a recent issue of The Guardian.

A gloom has been cast over Rustico and vicinity by the death of Isaac Marshall, a young man of eighteen years, who passed away at Hunter River Tuesday morning, as the result of loss of blood sustained by a deplorable shooting accident. The accident occurred on Monday evening, March 31st, and four other lads were on the shore near Gilles Cove, North Rustico, goose-shooting. They espied a flock of geese on the shore and were creeping towards them Marshall leading. Right behind him was James Blaquiere, aged 13. In some unaccountable manner, Blaquiere's gun discharged and the whole load of heavy shot was directed Marshall's leg just below the thigh, the muzzle of the gun being only three feet away. The boys at once ran for help, but as the next house was a mile away, the wounded man lost much blood before his rescuers arrived. Dr. McKenna attended the suffering man all night and Tuesday morning he was placed on a sleigh and driven to Hunter River Station, it being the intention to bring him to Charlottetown to be treated in the Hospital. While at Hunter River, he was attended by Dr. Rogerson, but the man was so weakened by the loss of blood that he died before the arrival of the train en route to Charlottetown. The deceased leaves to mourn a widowed mother and two brothers, Correllus and Stephen. Dr. Rogerson, the coroner, decided that an inquest was unnecessary, death being purely accidental.
