than I could stand," Geoffrey Shakespeare, head of the Government scheme for evacuating children, issued this statement:

"I am full of horror and indignation that any German submarine captain could be found to torpedo a ship over 600 miles from land in a tempestuous sea.

"The conditions were such that there was little chance for passengers 'either adult or children, to survive.

"This deed will shock the world. It is another example of the barbarous methods associated with Nazi Germany and it is only comparable with their present brutal and indiscriminate bombing of women and children in London."

All the parents of the children lost now have been notified. Mr. Shakespeare said. This was done by trained social workers who went to homes, "breaking the news as gently as possible."

Mr. Shakespeare also wrote a letter to each home affected in which he declared, unhappily the course of the ship has shown that neither by land nor sea can there be complete safety."

The children, in the words of one of the surviving rescuers, acted "magnificently" and when the ship suddenly slipped under these in lifeboats were singing: "Roll Out the Barrel."

Of the 87 children lost, 42 were boys and 45 girls. Four children were five years old; five were 8; two were 9; fifteen were 10; eight were 11; sixteen were 12; eight were 13; five were 14 and two were 15.

Among those lost was Col. James Baldwin-Webb, a member of parliament for Wrekin in Shropshire, and general manager of Baldwin's Steel Works of Birmingham. He was en route to Canada on a Red Cross mission. Badly injured when the torpedo hit the ship, he steadfastly refused to enter a lifeboat until women and children had been accommodated.

The captain went down with his ship after shouting: "Look out for yourselves now!" to the departing lifeboats.

Geoffrey Shakespeare, chairman of the Children's Overseas Reception Board, said that the children were well and in good health, although some are slightly bruised.

Says Invasion

"only the first step" he declared. The same spirit which is now being shown by the British people also prevailed in Poland during the brutal attack on that country, the consul added.

Beaten Morally
He believes that Paris will be jealous of London in future. "The Paris of 1870 and the Paris of 1914 is not the Paris of 1940 which surrendered to the enemy," he said.

He claimed that France was "morally beaten" before being "materially beaten."

Dr. Brzezinski hoped to see Canada also become one of the gathering places of the Polish forces now spread abroad. Poland will be reorganized, he said.

The spirit of the Polish people at home is unbroken. The peasant, the worker and the intellectual people of the country would not morally surrender to the enemy, which gives us hope they will constitute for us a very important factor in the final victory," he said.

The people of Poland hate Hitler and the Bolsheviks, he added. He claimed that the British people and the Polish people had many common features of national character. The people of both countries are ambitious and proud.

The first alliance between England and Poland was in 1920. Before this it was the policy of Great Britain not to have any commitments in Eastern Europe, he declared.

Describing the attack made on his country at the start of the present struggle, he claimed his country was "brutally attacked." There were 120 German Divisions with modern motorized equipment and also great masses of "soldier-clerks." He referred to the large number of Bolshevik soldiers as "cannon fodder." The consul continued.

Poland has been under foreign occupation before for as long as 120 years and the country would not mind a couple of years under other domination now the consul said.

He claimed that Poland is unfortunately situated geographically being between Germany and Russia. The people of America are fortunate in that they are between two oceans, he added.

The people of Poland do not consider that they are beaten. Although they are in a military sense, they have been morally victorious, he declared.

Dr. Brzezinski said that the Polish people are brave and good. "The women are charming and the men brave and good," he said. The Poles have always been good soldiers, farmers and workers. In spite of their many setbacks due to wars, they have contributed greatly to science, poetry and in the field of inventions.

He thought that this province resembled his native country more so than any other in the Dominion. Like his homeland, even inch of the rich red soil here is made use of.

"I can not see the white banner of capitulation above the heads of our soldiers, but instead you will see the red and white (Polish flag colors) banners of freedom flying over the heads of our soldiers marching to the re-birth of our country," the Consul said in conclusion.

Brilliant Career
Born in Galicia, the former Austrian part of Poland, Dr. Brzezinski has had a distinguished career. He was educated in Vienna and Lwow, and graduated with his Doctor of Laws degree. In the Great War he was an officer and also fought in the Polish army against the Bolsheviks in 1920.

Following demobilization, he served in the office of the attorney-general at Warsaw and entered the foreign service of his country in 1921.

From 1921 until 1922 he was vice-consul at Essen in the seat of Krupp, Germany, and the following year was attached to the foreign office in Warsaw. In 1923 he was appointed chief of the Consular Section of the foreign office and remained in this position until 1928.

For the next three years he acted as Polish Consul at Lille, Northern France. From 1931 until 1935 he was Polish Consul at Leipzig, Germany. In 1936-7 he was, Rumania, General in Kharkov, in Soviet Ukraine. Coming to Canada in Montreal as Polish Consul he has been here ever since.

Visited Green Gables

Another point of interest to the Consul was Anne of Green Gables' home, which he visited. The Consul had read the book by Lucy Maude Montgomery, and was particularly interested in every part of Green Gables. He also saw "Lake of the Shining Waters" at Cavendish. The Golf Course at the Montserrat Park and also Rustico were visited before returning to the city.

This morning the Consul will visit the Charlottetown Airport, Provincial Building, City Hall and St. Dunstan's University.

He will be received today by His Honor, Lieut.-Governor B. W. Page, Premier Campbell and His Excellency Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan. In the evening he will be entertained at a banquet given at the Charlottetown Hotel by the Provincial Government, the City, and later will address the Rector's Concert at Prince of Wales College.

CHORUS OF DEMANDS FOR RETALIATION

LONDON, Sept. 22.—(CP Cable)—The third week of Germany's air assaults on London and on civlty centres elsewhere in the United Kingdom, opened today amid a rising chorus of demands that Britain carry out retaliatory raids against the Reich.

British officialdom so far has been strongly opposed to reprisal attacks, contending that the end of the war would be hastened by lashing at such Nazi military objectives as oil and gas stores, aircraft factories and fields, and ship concentrations.

Noting increasing demands for the bombing of German civilian life to match the attacks which have flattened British homes, the Sunday Dispatch in a front-page editorial said:—

"Our civilians are gallantly bearing a heavy strain. Would they be helped by the knowledge that their attackers were suffering similarly? British bombers are already being mustered for a necessity and must be carried out ruthlessly."

The most vigorous demand for total air war against Germany came from John Gordon, the Sunday Express editor. He declared that the invasion is already defeated and the British air forces are only wasting time and precious bombs by continuing to attack it.

"The only place worth while dropping our bombs on at the moment is Germany," he wrote. "Bombs there can win the war. The people we want to shake are the ordinary men and women in Germany. These are the people Hitler is most desperately anxious you should not bomb. He's afraid what might happen if a stampede started there."

Waves Of R.A.F. Planes Bomb Nazi

LONDON, Sept. 22.—(CP)—Royal Air Force bombers, methodically securing the German-held "invasion coast" across the English Channel through daylight and darkness, have blasted a 400-mile path of flame and destruction during the last 24 hours. It was announced tonight.

The raids began in daylight Saturday, the Air Ministry said, and were kept up by wave after wave of bombers through the night and into the early hours of today.

Its report described havoc to the German "invasion ports" docks spurling flame, ships reeling under bomb hits, and the skies lighted for miles by roaring oil fire.

From all these forays, ranging the coast of the Channel and North Sea from France to Germany, all British planes returned despite the "usual furious barrage" of German anti-aircraft fire.

The Netherlands ports of Rotterdam and Flushing, the Belgian ports of Antwerp and Ostend and the French ports of Dunkerque, Boulogne and Calais were among Nazi bases heavily bombed.

Besides oil tanks, barge fleets, warehouses and railroad yards battered with explosives and incendiary bombs, the Air Ministry said, German merchant ships also were attacked and one large supply ship was hit by fire bombs.

A supplementary bulletin issued by the Air Ministry giving a detailed account of the R.A.F.'s bows described barges blown up and set alight by many huge explosions at Boulogne and said that Calais harbours took a "terrible battering" from British dive-bombers which set sticks of bombs methodically hour after hour.

Escaped Nazi Back Behind Prison Bars

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Sept. 22.—(CP)—Fritz Fuchs, red-headed German civilian prisoner, was back behind prison bars today after his fingerprints identified him as the man who escaped from a north-western Ontario internment camp early last Monday.

Fuchs admitted his identity when questioned by city police Saturday. Police Chief George Taylor said Fuchs had been in custody since Tuesday, when he was apprehended by a Canadian National Railway constable near the Port Arthur roundhouse.

After being taken to the police station he was remanded to the district jail while investigation continued. His fingerprints were sent to Ottawa where they were found to correspond with those of Fuchs.

Excise, Customs Officials Meet

FREDERICTON, Sept. 22.—(CP)—Increased vigilance against smuggling of weapons into Canada was urged Saturday night by R.C.M.P. Inspector F. W. Allan, Fredericton, speaking at the annual banquet of the Association of Customs and Excise officials of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

He also asked the officials to do all they could to prevent the spreading of false rumors.

I. D. Cameron, Saint John, was re-elected president of the Association. Other officers are first vice-president William Birne, Edmundston, N.B.; second vice-president H. D. Sullivan, Saint John, and secretary H. L. Yeomans, Saint John.

Among the executive members elected were L. W. Goodwin, Charlottetown, and M. C. Steeves, Moncton.

Steamship Grounds Near N. S. Strait

CANSO, N.S., Sept. 22.—(CP)—The 1,715-ton Newfoundland steamship Imogene was grounded tonight off Nova Scotia near the Strait of Canso, after striking a rock Saturday afternoon.

The vessel's crew of 28, all except one Newfoundlanders, escaped to shore in the ship's boats, but the fate of the Imogene was uncertain. Efforts were to be made to salvage her.

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New Cabinet For Egypt

CAIRO, Sept. 22.—(AP)—A new Egyptian Cabinet was formed today committed to a policy of full cooperation with Britain but no immediate declaration of war on Italy.

The new cabinet is the same as the last, with the exception of four Saadist party members who refused to their party's demand for an immediate declaration of war.

The cabinet is reduced from 17 to 10 members. Premier Hassan Sabry Pasha remains at the head of the Government.

Neither of Egypt's two most powerful parties, the Saadists and Wadists, however, is represented in the new Government as a result of the resignations.

The fact that the cabinet is now united on the war issue is expected to result in the smoother functioning of Egypt's internal affairs and to benefit Britain from that standpoint.

"Bravo London", N. Y. Mayor's Exclamation

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—(AP)—In a two-way transatlantic broadcast Saturday, Sir George Broadbridge, former Lord Mayor of London, declared "London has steered herself for resistance and victory." And New York's Mayor LaGuardia replied with a "bravo London!"

Kidnapped Child Safe With Parents

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 22.—(AP)—The kidnapper of three-year-old Marc de Tristan was captured and has confessed and the child is safely en route home to his parents, the Federal Bureau of Investigation announced here tonight.

The kidnapper is a German alien, the FBI said in an announcement authorized by J. Edgar Hoover, director. His name is Wilhelm Jakob Mullenbroich and he is 40 years old.

The bureau has the man in custody, but it refused to disclose where he was born in Germany. In 1900 and entered the United States under the German quota on Jan. 18, 1935 from Vancouver, Wash.

PRASED N. Z. FIGHTERS

WELLINGTON, N. Z.—(CP)—The New Zealand pilots fighting in the Royal Air Force are a terror to our enemies," said Lord Beaverbrook, Britain's minister of aircraft production, in a cable to Prime Minister Peter Fraser accepting a gift of £21,000 (\$75,810) for fighter aircraft.

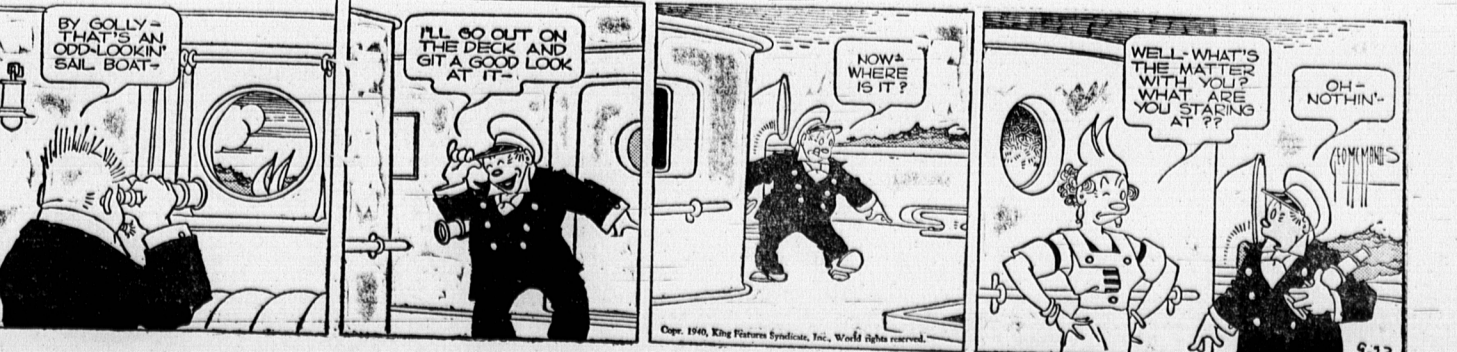
