Good Prices For Hogs

Prices for hogs during 1925 show a marked advance over those prevailing in 1924, as will be seen from the following comparative statement:

The movement this year started earlier than last year, and shipments were made every month. The swine clubs shipped co-operatively 75 car loads, which averaged 70 hogs to the car. Last year 52 cars were shipped in this way.

Live Stock Market

(Canadian Press.)

MONTREAL, Dec. 14—Dominion livestock report—Cattle receipts 1,441. There were only few good cattle on sale. Balance of cattle were of just common to medium quality. Early good cows and cows of good quality were sold for \$4.50 to \$5. Tops in cows were \$5.50 and just plain common kinds quoted up to \$6.75. There was fair percentage of just medium heifers which realized in most cases \$5.50. Steers grading medium or slightly better were sold around \$6.50 with few of quite good weight and quality up to \$7. Bulk of common to just medium steers brought from \$5 to \$6. Canners and bulls were unchanged. Butcher steers good \$6.50 to \$7.00, medium \$5.75 to \$6.00, common \$4.50 to \$5.25, butchers' heifers good \$6.00 to \$6.75, medium \$4.75 to \$5.50, common \$3.50 to \$4.25. Butcher cows, good \$5.00 to \$5.50, medium \$3.00 to \$4.25, canners \$2.00 to \$2.25, cutters \$2.75, butcher bulls common \$3.00 to \$3.75. Calf receipts \$42.

Few good veal were picked out at \$11 to \$12 dollars but the general run of common and medium sucker calves sold from \$9 to \$10.50. Grassers were \$5, and some heavy grain fed calves brought \$7.25. Quotations good veal \$11.00 to \$12.00, medium \$10.00 to \$10.50, grassers \$7.00 to \$9.00, grassers \$5.00. EATING WITH BRITISH ROYALTIES
BY 'A LADY OF THE COURT'
(EDITED BY ELIZABETH CRAIG.)

(Copyright by Montreal Star news Bureau) These recipes are taken from the old household "Scrap Book" started by Queen Victoria in 1831. To this book various members of the Royal Family have contributed directions for the preparation of their favorite dishes. Contrary to general belief, the meals of the British Royal Family are not elaborate. The recipes can be utilized by any Canadian housewife.

HER MAJESTY'S OPEN TART

(A favourite open Tart of some former Queen of Great Britain—1840)

Boil one large carrot well. When cold pound it in a mortar and rub through a sieve. Mix with graded biscuits, 1/2 lb. of melted butter, a pinch of salt, sugar, sack and graded nutmeg to taste, also orange flower water to taste. 6 yolks of eggs, and 3 whites of eggs, beaten to a stiff froth. Have ready a dish lined and rimmed with pastry and cooked till almost ready with rice in the centre to keep pastry from rising in the middle. Throw out the rice, gently pour the filling into the pastry-lined dish, garnish quickly with peeled fingers of orange, sprinkle them with castor sugar. Bake 1/2 hour in a moderate oven.

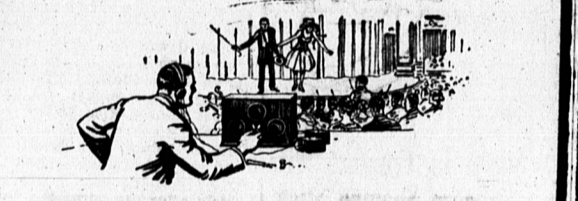

NOTE—Use castor sugar for sweetening cream.

OMELETTE

Put 6 yolks of eggs in a basin with 6 ozs. pounded sugar, a tiny pinch of salt, a tablespoonful of fine Hungarian flour, and orange flower water, grated lemon rind, grated orange rind, and vanilla, ratafia or cinnamon to taste. Mix these ingredients up with a broad wooden spoon into a creamy batter, and then mix in lightly and quickly the frothed whites of nine eggs. Fry in butter in a hot omelet pan.

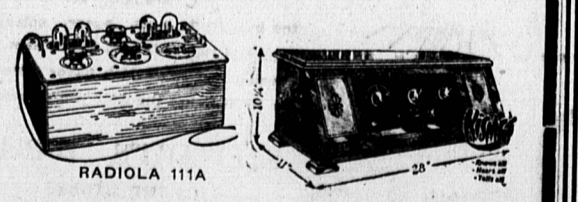
