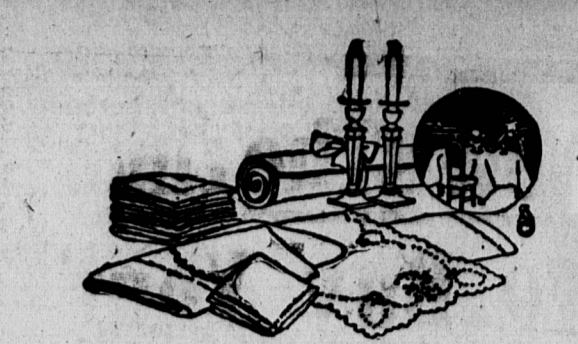

ANCIENT TEMPLE
 ATHENS, April 8—Greek archaeologists have unearthed an imposing temple at Rerras, Thessaly. The structure is in an excellent state of preservation and is stated to be as large as the temple of Jupiter at Olympia.
 The bronze inscriptions established the date of 400 years B. C. Numerous tablets have also been found bearing indications of laws and resolutions of ancient civilization.

'Babe' Ruth was Peevied at Umpire
 Failure to Get a Hit Causes Outburst at Morality by Home-run King.
 IS OUT OF CONDITION
 Result of Not Attending Strictly to Training is Explanation of Fellow Players.
 ATLANTA, Ga., April 7.—The big tour of bunting Babe Ruth through the Southland, supported by the Yankee and Brooklyn ball nines, is proving a big "bust" as far as the Babe's hitting is concerned. He had another bad day at Birmingham yesterday afternoon—couldn't get the ball out of the diamond in four trips to the plate and struck out with the score tied and two men on. He roared so at the umpire, George Moriarty that an inning later when the official enforced a ground rule, robbing Zack Wheat of a home run, the crowd rose in disgust and began flinging cushions onto the game was called in the ninth with Wheat on second and still a theoretical chance for Brooklyn to win.
 Ruth doesn't often play the baby act, but he did today, and his fellow players declare it because he hasn't been attending strictly to training, is out of condition and is angered over his failure to get started against the good hurling of the Dodgers pitchers. He was at bat in the seventh with two men on base, when Young George Mohart, pitching for Brooklyn, sent over two fast, breast-high curves. Moriarty called them both strikes, whereupon Ruth "blew up."
 He asserted both pitches were too high and shook his fist in Moriarty's face and had to be called to the bench. When the inning was over he renewed the argument. It was this that "set" the crowd against the umpire.
