ROTARY MEETING - Corporal Leslie F. Richardson, United States Army, a survivor of the Bataan march of 1942 and a prisoner of the Japanese until the surrender was the guest speaker at the weekly meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club on Tuesday. He described in vivid detail his experiences as an inmate of a prison camp. Mr. Richardson was introduced by Mr. "Cy" Stewart who is connected with public relations work concerning the survivors of the Bataan march. Mr. Richardson's mother is a native of Summerside and at present the two men are visiting his aunt, Mrs. Joseph Stewart, Sea View. Guests at this meeting were Mr. Austin A. Scates of the Charlottetown Club and Mr. Fred Bingham, Summerside.

KINSMEN MEETING - The regular meeting of the Kinmen Club of Summerside was held on Tuesday evening at Leo Coyle's Restaurant with Mr. Fred Gallant as the speaker. Lower Ration May Forestall Reduction

OTTAWA, Oct. 2 - (CP) - The Dominion Bureau of Statistics today reported stocks of creamy butter in nine principal cities at Oct. 1 totalled 43,836,975 pounds against 42,948,477 pounds of Sept. 1 and 46,793,516 at Oct. 1, 1945. Commenting on the figures, Prices Board spokesmen said it was too early to determine whether the individual butter ration would have to be reduced this winter, as was done last year. They noted, however, that while stocks were lower this year than at the same period a year ago the butter ration also was lower, totalling roughly six ounces per person per week against the rate of approximately eight ounces last fall. The lower ration may forestall any further reduction.

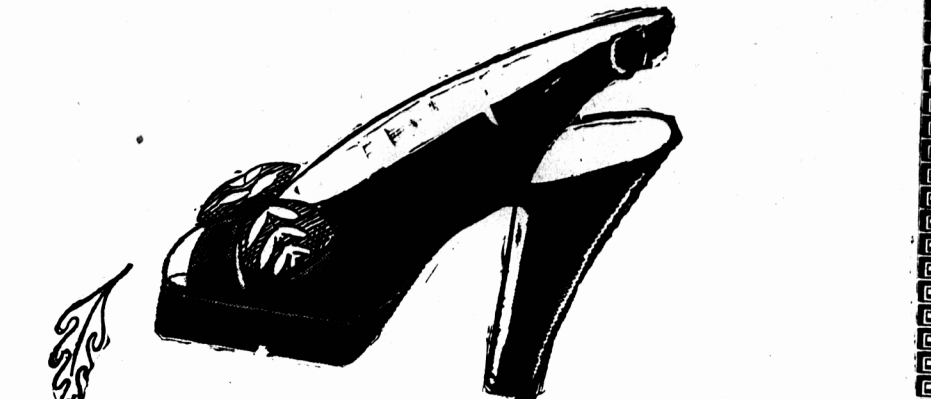

Passion Play Is Reviving In Germany

(A cabled despatch from Oberammergau, Germany, by David M. Nichols to The Chicago Daily News.)

Like everything else in Germany the famous Passion Play in Oberammergau is reviving. The first U.S. forces here he said "wanted us to produce the play immediately. But we couldn't do that. It requires at least a year to prepare. Unless it is done well, it isn't worth doing at all. We have had no practice since the war began."

Lang, a tall, forceful man, talked with us in the garden of his pension which is now requisitioned as an officers' club. He still retains his woodcarving shop in the rear of his own separate quarters in the garden.

More prosaically, he draws damages from the village council for the year-long period and hopes, like everyone else, that Oberammergau may come again into its own.

CAUGHT WOMAN IN FAR NORTH

VANCOUVER, Oct. 2 - The story of a two-year effort to bring an Eskimo murderer to justice was related by one of the passengers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police patrol ship St. Roch, which has reached here after a hazardous Arctic voyage.

Constable Arthur Levins of Carleton Place, trailed the woman, Anangiak, after she shot her husband some 250 miles from Cambridge Bay in October, 1944.

Report of the shooting did not reach Constable Levins until May, 1945, and when he reached the scene the woman was inland hunting caribou. He was unable to trail her down until some months later.

She was tried at Coppermine and sentenced to one year and nine months imprisonment which she will serve at R. M. P. barracks at Cambridge Bay. Anangiak's sentence was light according to white man's standards, but consideration was given the fact that many Eskimos are unfamiliar with white man's laws.
