Chief Justice to Act In I'm Alone Controversy

(Special to The Guardian)

WASHINGTON, April 29.—William Howard Taft and Francis Alexander Anglin, the chief justices of the Supreme Courts of the United States and of Canada respectively, were mentioned today by Secretary Stimson as the probable commissioners to pass on the controversy by those two countries over the sinking of the Canadian rum runner I'm Alone, in the Gulf of Mexico.

With both governments committed to arbitration, preliminary steps were begun today. Consideration, however, is yet to be given to these details by Secretary Stimson and before he decides them definitely he will seek the approval of President Hoover. The question will then be subject to accommodation with Canada through conferences between the Secretary of State and Hon. Vincent Massey, the Canadian minister.

It was assumed in American circles today that the commissioners would sit here but that the sessions would not be held until some time in the summer or early fall. The procedure for hearing the case, however, is to be decided without delay and Secretary Stimson will be in a position to confer on that subject with Minister Massey this week.

SIXTY THOUSAND BIRDS PASS R. O. P. TEST

A Federal Department of Agriculture policy that is responsible for a world's laying record, the shipping of birds and eggs to Japan, South America, New Zealand and many other countries to say nothing of capturing orders from the world-famed Petaluma poultrymen of California, must have something in it that is worthwhile and of value to Canadian poultrymen.

The policy responsible for this development in the poultry industry is the Record of Performance for Poultry under the direction of the Dominion Live Stock Branch.

Since its inception nine years ago it has increased in usefulness, volume and efficiency, and altogether 162,873 birds have been trap nested, and handled according to r. o. p. requirement. Of these 59,462 or 36 per cent have been certified, having met all requirements regarding vigor, production, egg weight, breed type, and freedom from standard disqualifications.

The report just published covering last year's work is available for distribution and may be had on application to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. It contains the records of 38,071 birds of all the popular breeds, entered by 288 breeders in all parts of Canada, and really forms a splendid directory of breeders for those anxious to obtain stock for the purpose of flock improvement.
