Potato Movement Slows Down Until Mid-January

Movement of potatoes, both in Canada and the United States, is slower at present than it has been since the shipping season commenced, states the weekly market report of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, prepared this week by Mr. L. P. McIsaac in the absence of departmental officials at Ottawa. At some shipping points, the report states, potatoes are actually selling below the support price. The U. S. support price advanced automatically 20 cts. per hundred weight on December 1 and will advance another 20 cts. on January 1. From that time onward, through February and March, the U. S. support price goes up 5 cts. per month, with no further advance after March. This means that the American producer will move very few potatoes until he secures the January advance. Locally the report notes "no life whatever in the potato market, on either seed or tablestock." Some warehouse operators have been obliged to reduce their stocks materially. "We are satisfied from the information we have," the report states, "that there are more potatoes on the Island today than we ever had in our experience for the same period, notwithstanding the heavy movement we enjoyed up to the present both by water and rail.

10,000 Cars Unshipped
"As of December 1, after allowing a million bushels for seed purposes, we have in the vicinity of 10,000 cars of potatoes yet to ship." It is expected, however, that by mid-January there will be a reasonably good demand from the United States. This is contingent on the U. S. authorities placing no embargo against Canadian potatoes. A good demand is also anticipated from several foreign countries if their currency can be converted into Canadian dollars. With the quantity still remaining unshipped, it is highly desirable to keep a steady flow to the markets when any demand occurs.

Turnip Market Brisk
The turnip market continues as last reported, when it was stated there would be in the vicinity of six or seven hundred cars of good turnips remaining to be shipped. There has been no definite reply from the Government with respect to the proposed turnip marketing scheme or any indication of their attitude towards producer control marketing boards. Assurance has been given, however, that the matter is being studied. Turnip prices to Ontario growers this week have ranged around 75 to 80 cts. per bushel, delivered to the waxing plant in the rough. There is a brisk demand. It is likely there will be some further research measures effected next year to control the turnip borer or root maggot which has played havoc in many turnip growing districts this year. The following are the current market prices: Summerside and West Prince—Seed: Light movement ranging around 65c per bushel at warehouse. Foundation at some points is moving slowly at 10c more, 75c delivered. Tablestock movement is light. Price 65c per bag delivered. Kensington—Seed: No movement. Tablestock—all varieties 65c per 75 pound bag. Borden Line—Seed: Movement practically nil. Tablestock—few moving at 65c per bushel at the car. Few turnips 60c per bushel at the car.
