POLICE COURT—At the Police Court yesterday morning four vagrants picked up by the police last evening were remanded until Friday. A party charged with resisting arrest was given thirty days in jail without the option of a fine. The defendant in a prohibition case, unlawful possession, was fined \$300.00 and costs or two months in jail. In a second prohibition case, unlawful sale, the defendant was fined \$300.00 and costs or two months, while a third prohibition case was withdrawn on request of the prosecution.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES IN SCHOOLS—In speaking at the Teachers' Convention on the precautions to be adopted in the case of the outbreak of infectious diseases in schools, Dr. B. C. Keeping was reported to have stated that when a second case breaks out in the same school, it shows laxity on the part of the trustees. What Dr. Keeping said was that there was danger in not taking precaution of the presence of infectious diseases among school children and that the trustees, constituting the local Board of Health, should use every endeavour to take measures which will prevent a solitary case becoming epidemic.

JUNIOR RED CROSS MEETING—A meeting of the Abegweit Juniors of Hope River was held at the school on March 28th. The vice-president occupied the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Roll call was answered by an original verse. It was reported that the portfolio was completed and sent. House Discusses Resolution Re Fishery Industry

Public Accounts Committee Reports On Sinking Fund Securities And Finances. House In Committee On Bills Yesterday.

Provincial Legislature, March 28. The House met at 11:40 a.m. Premier MacMillan introduced the following bills:

An Act respecting the Marketing of Natural Products.
An Act respecting Farm Credits.
They were received and read a first time.

Hon. Mr. Wood tabled the report of the committee on printing and binding journals.
Hon. Mr. McPhee tabled the report of the Legislative and Public Library.

Public Accounts Committee
Mr. J. A. MacDonald tabled the following report of the Public Accounts Committee and moved its adoption:
"To the Hon. the Speaker and members of the Legislative Assembly:
Your committee appointed to report on the Public Accounts for the year ending Dec. 31, A.D. 1933, beg to submit its report as follows:
Your committee met and examined the securities held in the Sinking Funds of the Province and your committee finds that the Sinking Funds correspond with the list as shown by the Public Accounts for the year ending Dec. 31, 1933.
"The total ordinary revenue for the year amounted to \$1,268,083.38 while the total ordinary expenditure, less \$105,905.00 provided for reserve fund, amounted to \$1,392,715.70, making a deficit on ordinary account of \$204,632.32.
(Signed, J. A. MacDonald, chairman, L. S. Hunter, D. F. Bethune, W. A. Stewart.)"

Opposition Amendment
Mr. McIntyre moved, seconded by Mr. Cox, the following amendment:
"That the report of the Public Accounts Committee be not adopted but that the said report be referred back to the Committee with instructions that they include as liabilities of the Province all outstanding bills unpaid at the end of 1933."
The amendment was lost on a straight party vote, 10-15, and the majority report of the Committee was adopted on the same division.

Charlottetown Debentures
On motion of Mr. Stewart the House went into committee with Mr. J. A. MacDonald in the chair on an Act amending the Charter of the City of Charlottetown to the amount of \$30,000, for unemployment relief.
The bill was agreed to without amendment.

Game Act Amendment
On motion of Hon. Mr. McPhee the House went into committee with Mr. Wiggins in the chair on an Act to amend the Game Act, 1928.
The bill repeals Sec. 31 of the Act and substitutes therefor:
"No person shall kill in one day more than two salmon, twelve bass or thirty trout; neither shall he export, sell, or feed to foxes, minks, or other animals, any salmon, bass or trout. Any person guilty of an offence under this section shall be liable to a fine of twenty dollars and costs."
Objection to the clause was taken by Messrs. Cox, McIntyre and LePage, on the ground that it discriminated against fishermen who frequently catch and sell as many as a dozen salmon in a day and who under this legislation would be limited to a catch of two salmon.
Hon. Mr. MacPhee pointed out that the provision in this regard was exactly the same as in the existing Section read:
"No person shall kill in one day more than two salmon, twelve bass or thirty trout; neither shall he export nor sell any fish he may catch under penalty of \$10.00 and costs of prosecution."
Hon. Mr. McPhee explained that far as it has jurisdiction and the statute could not be interpreted to make it an offence for a person to sell fish which he could legally catch under the federal statutes.
Mr. LePage said if the old Act were wrong it should be re-enacted and something "sensible" put in its place.
The bill was finally agreed to without amendment.

Charlottetown Act Amendments
On motion of Mr. Stewart the House went into committee with Mr. J. A. MacDonald in the chair on an Act to amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act.
Clause 1 of the bill adds to Sec. 51 of the Act the following provision:
"(3) Every motor vehicle subject to assessment during the year of assessment shall for all purposes of assessment and taxation be deemed to have a true and real value of not less than five hundred dollars and no assessed value thereon shall be reduced on appeal below such five hundred dollars."
Mr. LePage objected that the proposed legislation was unfair, as some people had cars valued at only \$100 or \$200. Taxation should be on valuation.
Mr. Stewart said it had been passed by the City Council which had recently been elected and he assumed that they had the indorsement of the citizens.
Mr. Lea asked if the citizens were aware of the nature of the bill.
Mr. Stewart replied that its contents had been published in the press.
Mr. T. A. Campbell indorsed Mr. LePage's contention that the provision was unfair.
Premier MacMillan said he was inclined to agree with the member from First Prince and suggested that be referred back to the City Council.
The clause was held over.
Sec. 2 of the bill substitutes for Sec. 63 of the following:
"The City Council to allow such rate or rates of discount, not exceeding six percent, as it may by-law fix and determine, on all assessments on real estate, personal property, or income, paid in full or in determined instalments within such time or times after the completion of assessment as such by-law shall fix, and such rate or rates may by such by-law be made variable according to the time or terms of payment."
"All taxes and assessments or portions thereof, whether for general civic purposes, or for permanent streets or sidewalks, (excepting poll taxes) in arrears after the thirtieth day of November of the year of assessment, shall bear interest from the first day of July of such year, which shall be added to such arrears and in all respects be collectible therewith. All such taxes and assessments in arrears at the time of assessment hereof shall bear interest at the rate of six percent from the date of such assessment, and all interest thereon accrued by virtue of prior assessments is hereby confirmed. Section 21 of said Act is hereby amended by striking out the words "thirty days" in the first and second lines thereof, and substituting therefor the words "four weeks."
The clause was agreed to without amendment.

AFTERNOON SESSION
The House resumed at 4 p.m. On motion of Premier MacMillan the House went into committee with Mr. Hunter in the chair on the Appropriation Bill, covering the items in the Estimates. It was reported agreed to without amendment.
On motion of Premier MacMillan reading with Mr. J. A. MacDonald in the chair on the Highway Traffic Act.
The bill was amended by deleting the clause defining a chauffeur under the Act as one "who drives a motor vehicle, either whole or part time, for compensation, directly or indirectly."
The clause imposing a fine of \$10 on motorists convicted of negligence in splashing pedestrians or other persons with water, mud, etc., was discussed and amended, the fine being reduced to \$5.
The clause fixing the speed limit at 30 miles per hour was discussed.
Hon. Mr. MacPhee suggested it would be safer to leave the law as it is, in the discretion of the Courts, without fixing a definite speed limit.
Mr. T. A. Campbell expressed his concurrence. He suggested that the asphalt surfaced roads be painted with a white line in the centre.
Hon. Mr. MacPhee said this provision is now in the Act, from which he cited. The Act, Sec. 42 (4) provides:
"The driver of a vehicle entering a highway from a lane or private road or drive shall yield the right of way to all vehicles upon such highway."
Mr. Lea believed this section should be given wider publicity so the law was frequently violated.
Hon. Mr. MacPhee approved of the suggested white line, but there should be a definite speed limit.
Mr. Lea recommended the placing of stop signs on roads leading into the main highway.
Hon. Dr. MacDonald approved of the Attorney General's suggestion that fixing the speed limit would be dangerous, as it would be taken as a minimum by many drivers. He emphasized the danger of speeding, a practice which he said was all too common.
The clause defining the speed limit was deleted.
The bill after further discussion

was reported agreed to with amendments.

War Veteran Exemption Extended
On motion of Premier MacMillan the House went into committee on an Act to amend the Income and Property Taxation Act.
Clause 1 extends the taxation exemption for another five years to ex-soldiers and war nurses.
Clause 3 provides, as an addition to Sec. 23, that in the case of the death of any taxpayer the personal representatives shall make an annual return of all income received by the estate of the deceased taxpayer.
Clause 4 provides that if the death of any person or taxpayer, it appears to the Provincial Treasurer that the deceased person was in receipt of a taxable income but had failed to file a return of his yearly income or that the taxpayer has made an incorrect return or returns of his yearly income, the Provincial Treasurer may cause an assessment to be made against the estate of said person or taxpayer and the amount of said assessment shall be a first charge and lien on the assets of the estate. Right of appeal to the Probate Judge is given.
Mr. LePage believed it would stimulate tax collections wonderfully if the Election Act were changed and electors in arrears were disfranchised.
Mr. J. A. MacDonald said at this time it would be a hardship on the poor farmer and fisherman if such a drastic measure were introduced.
Mr. LePage: "I want's suggesting any time to do it."
Mr. T. A. Campbell: "Just a 'serious consideration' (Laughter)."
The bill, after discussion was reported agreed to with amendment.
The following bill was read a third time and the Summerisle Incorporation Act.

FISHERIES RESOLUTION
Mr. McIntyre moved, seconded by Mr. Cox, the following resolution:
Whereas the Fishing Industry is one of the most important industries in the Province of Prince Edward Island and affords a livelihood for a large percentage of our population.
And whereas, owing to the uncertainty of markets a very few of those engaged in this industry have been able to realize from a bare livelihood anything beyond a bare livelihood and their families and dependents are consequently unable to lay aside any means to assist them in times of depression.
And whereas, owing to the very limited home market for fish, it is necessary for our fishermen to export by far the greater part of their catch.
And whereas, while many of our fishermen now ship their products to the Quebec and Montreal markets, the nearest and most natural market ought to be found in the cities of Eastern United States of America.
And whereas, owing to the high rates charged for the transportation of fish to markets, our fishermen are, at present, unable to make any profits from their catches and in many instances have found that they were shipping at a financial loss.
And whereas, it is noted that although within recent years some reductions have been made in export charges for shipping fish from this Province to some other parts of Canada, yet there has been no change of shipping rates on fish to the New York and Boston markets during the last ten years.
And whereas, in order to assist the Fishing Industry in this Province, and to grant relief to those engaged therein, it is most urgent that some immediate steps be taken to have the shipping charges reduced on fish exported from this Province to the Canadian and American markets.
Therefore Resolved that it is the wish of the people's representatives in the Legislature assembled that they should take immediate steps to have the Federal Government through the Minister of Railways urge upon the Canadian National Railways Company and also upon those who have authority to negotiate with American Railway Companies the necessity of a reduction

Hon. Mr. Sharp
Hon. Mr. Sharp said this was a resolution in which both sides would agree. It was not a matter of loss of the American market because we have practically no duty on fresh fish going into the United States. Any move toward the reduction of freight rates should materially assist our fishermen in taking advantage of the markets in New York and Boston. The fish shipments are now delayed nearly 24 hours as against passenger traffic, he pointed out. If some arrangement were made with the United States railways whereby our fish could go from St. John and make connections that way it would be a good thing.
Mr. LePage: "I believe Mr. Sharp pointed out, will this year be worth about \$20 a case while last year the price was only \$12, but this is only one phase of the fishing industry in the matter of fresh fish shipments particularly the suggestions made in the resolution were worthy of every consideration."
Mr. P. W. LePage spoke in full approval of the resolution. He did not think the Department of Fisheries at Ottawa was doing all that it might do. It should assist in the marketing of the product.
Mr. Allen, who also spoke in approval, believed there should be a new freight structure for the Maritimes.
Hon. Dr. MacDonald expressed his approval of the resolution and emphasized the value of the resolution as the real cause of the depression in the fishery industry, and expressed the hope that conditions would be materially improved by next year.
Mr. J. Howard MacDonald stressed the value of advertising Island fish, especially lobsters. He suggested the value of a resolution asking protection against the importation of Japanese crab meat which competes with canned lobster but which does not compare in quality. He pointed out that nature has given us practically a monopoly of the lobster industry and there should be no reason why a fair price should not be obtained every year.

Premier MacMillan
Premier MacMillan, in expressing approval of the resolution explained that it has been unfairly attacked by the ex-Minister of Public Works in Opposition (Mr. McIntyre) with regard to the rebate on gasoline tax for fishermen, because necessary office expenditures were (Continued on Page 5)
