### FREEDOM OF FALMOUTH FOR SIR SAM HUGHES

CANADIAN MINISTER OF MILITIA HONORED ON HIS ARRIVAL IN ENGLAND.  
TRIBUTE TO HIS SERVICE  
General Hughes Arrived in London Last Evening When His Callers Included Lord Dundonald and Lord Brooke

LONDON, March 20.—The freedom of the Cornish borough of Falmouth, formerly a distinguishing packet station, was today conferred on Sir Sam Hughes, the Canadian Minister of Militia, amid the enthusiasm of the townspeople. The parchment presented, in lambskin, set forth that it was unanimously resolved, at a special meeting of the County Council, that this honorary freedom be conferred on the Canadian minister in recognition not only of his valuable services to literature and journalism but of his life-long advocacy of military assistance to the Empire in Imperial days. The parchment, which had done much to bind together the Mother Country and the colonies.

In conferring the freedom, Mayor Chard said that General Hughes was noted in Great Britain for his bluff honesty and his untiring energy. 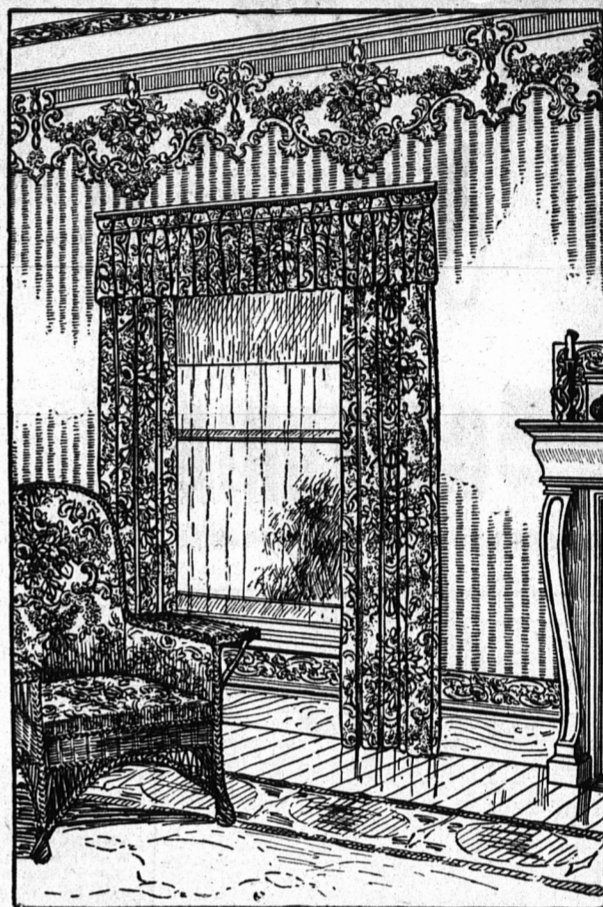
### ENQUIRY WILL BE ASKED
