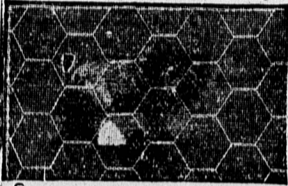

TRANSPORTATION OF MARITIME COAL TO UP. PROVINCES

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—The Board of Railway Commissioners today will hear the results of the experiments whereby Maritime coal was transported to Upper Canada points under certain test rates. In accordance with the provisions of the order-in-council which authorized the tests, the Board will be asked to ascertain what amount is owing to the Canadian National and Canadian Pac-

ific railways on account of these experiments in order that any deficit occurred may be made good to the transportation companies. The tests were ordered in 1928 and were to extend over a period of three years. A minimum rate was fixed for rail-hauled coal from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick points, and another rail rate set for coal, water borne to St. Lawrence points and transported westward by rail. 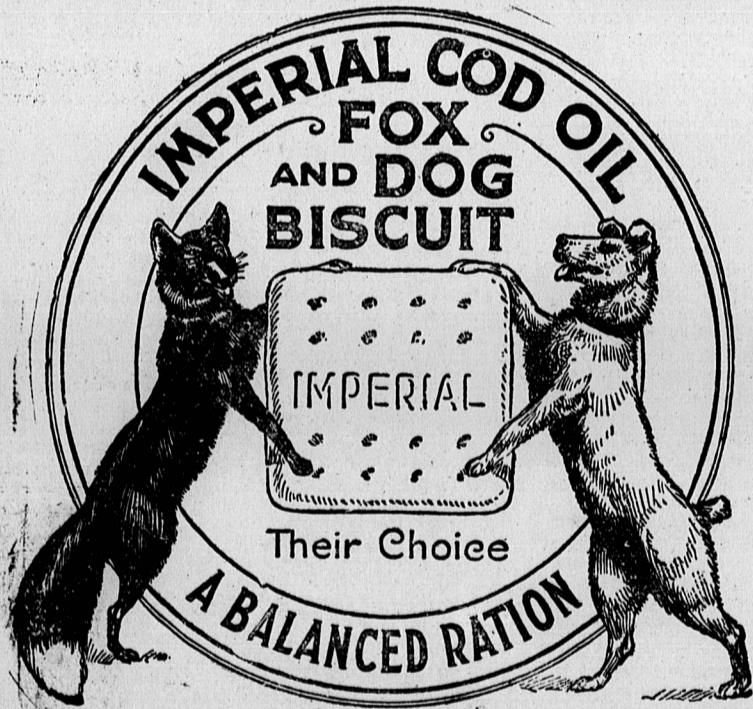
