Joe Wright Badly Beaten

Canadian Was A Bad Third In Olympic Single Sculling Elimination.

(By Elmer Dulmage, Canadian Press Staff Writer) MARINE STADIUM, Long Beach, Cal., Aug. 9—They counted out Joe Wright, Jr., of Toronto tonight as a contender for the singles sculling championship of the Olympic Games after the dark red haired Canadian had taken the worst beating of his career late this afternoon before the thousands that gathered in grandstands, bleachers and on hills surrounding the course to see the opening Olympic programme.

Wright, who four years ago ranked as one of the finest scullers in the world, trailed far behind today in the second heat for the eight-oared crews after Great Britain, Japan, Brazil and Italy have raced in the first. Winner of each heat qualifies for the final Friday, losers rowing off in two heats for the right to row in the deciding race.

The setback of the broad-shouldered son of Joe Wright, Sr., veteran eastern rowing coach, was the biggest surprise of the afternoon to a crowd that thrilled a few minutes later to the superb blade work of the giant Bobby Pearce, of Australia, defending Olympic champion, and Guillermo Douglas of Uruguay, battled strongly for a win, a race that put Southwood in the final.
