Y's Men's Meeting At Summerside

Dr. Hillard Clark was chairman for the weekly meeting of the Summerside Y's Men's Club held in the Baptist Church Hall on Thursday, May 15th. A lively program was led by Rev. Chas. Carnegie, and Albert Hucsis arranged a special piano arrangement of "Onward Christian Soldiers." Eric Sheen was inducted as a new member. Robert Willett was a guest. Lowell Hancock requested and received the promise of members' cars to transport Summerside school children to the Music Festival in Charlottetown next week. The directors also voted to join with other service clubs in providing a bus for the same purpose. Morley M. Bell, M.P.P., and a member of the Club, gave an interesting address on fish and game. He outlined several instances where birds, fish and animals have become greatly reduced in numbers and in some cases are now extinct due to the uncontrolled activities of sportsmen and others and to the lack of adequate conservation measures. He urged general support for the various projects now underway in Prince Edward Island (sponsored and financed by the Fish and Game Association and by the Dominion and Provincial Governments) to maintain and increase the supply of fish and game, which, he pointed out, were not only for the benefit of local sportsmen but were of considerable economic value as natural resources and attractions for tourists if properly developed.

Calendar Causes Excitement In Kensington School

All is serene again in Kensington High School and all persons and things have been restored to their normal positions. There is with one exception. There is a blank spot on the wall of one of the classrooms and if one looks closely he might discern the outline of something that once covered the space. It was a calendar and it is supposed that the Summerside merchant who distributed it to his customers hoped to get some reasonable amount of advertising in return for his investment but never did he think it would become a "cause celebre" and a matter of controversy that would split the Town into two factions.

Secretary's Report

Following is the secretary's report for the year 1946-47. The year just ended has been a very successful one both financially and socially. We have held 12 monthly meetings and 8 executive meetings with a fair attendance at each. We have a membership of 100 which includes 24 new members. During the year we have been called upon to bear the loss of 4 members. We have 6 paid-up subscriptions to the League magazine, which are duly distributed to the members. Monthly meetings were regularly reported in the press and all correspondence was attended to promptly. All national and Diocesan fees and obligations have been paid. The financial report shows the total receipts as \$590.61 with total disbursements of \$335.58 leaving a balance on hand of \$45.03. Members assisted the Mobile X-Ray clinic during their stay in the parish in the Canadian Legion and School-Building Committee with their entertainments. Donations were sent to the Holy Father's Appeal for the Children of Europe; C. W. L. Scholarship Fund; Prince County Hospital; Sisters of Mercy's Building Fund; Sisters of Service; Tuberculosis League; and a first prize for a school lottery. Christmas gifts were given to our esteemed chaplain; to the Sisters of the Precious Blood; to the patients at the Provincial Infirmary and to a bereaved family. We provided transportation for children to attend Catechism classes and we also provided some children with the necessary clothing for First Holy Communion. We contributed \$170.00 towards equipment for a new classroom, and every month a committee was appointed to visit the schools and report on required articles. Study clubs are organized. Meetings are held bi-monthly and deal mainly with religion, education and community matters. Masses were offered for the League members, the dead of the parish and the souls in purgatory. Messages of sympathy were extended to bereaved families and visits made and treats provided for the sick. Quilts were donated to a needy family. Members have taken care of the church linen, of the altars, provided flowers for holy days and furnished all church music. To raise funds members assisted at the entertainments in the parish hall, and at games during the winter. Funds were also raised by icees, bingos, a bazaar, a share in a lottery, cash donations and a sale of apples. We were represented at the Diocesan Convention in Charlottetown by two delegates who furnished us with valuable information concerning the wonderful activities of the League. We wish to express our appreciation to our chaplain, Rev. Father Gillis, for his untiring interest in our work and his attendance at our executive meetings; to the press for publishing the reports of our meetings; and to all who helped in any way to make our year a successful one. Calendar Causes Excitement In Kensington School

Where is the calendar now? That is a mystery perhaps never to be solved. But for nearly four months it had hung there in oblivion until suddenly great heat was thrown on it and it hung for a short time in the centre of all eyes. The picture on the calendar was of the type that would definitely place it in the "pin-up" category but among the more modest examples of that type of art. One night the Home and School Association met in the classroom and suddenly one of the members spied the calendar. Although other meetings had been held in that room this was the first time it had been noticed. A motion was promptly moved and passed that the calendar be removed. Feeling that this group had no authority in this matter the teacher in question appealed to the school board and on reconvening the board a number of the members decided to let the calendar remain where it had hung since January. Another meeting of the Home and School Association was held and the calendar was observed to be occupying the usual place with a sign of ever having been disturbed. This of course was not very pleasing to the mover of the motion and the question was very acutely asked why had not the calendar been removed. Then developed an altercation which resulted in one of the trustees who had been vigorously supporting the teacher handing in his resignation. To show that they stood behind their champion a number of the teachers promptly submitted their resignations also, to take effect last Friday. A few days after the meeting some of the citizens circulated a petition requesting the trustee to reconsider his resignation and it is said that over ninety-five per cent of the rate payers signed. Faced with this testimony of their confidence the trustee withdrew his resignation and the teachers automatically withdrew theirs also. So far this story has had all the elements of old-fashioned melodrama except mystery but now that comes in too. One morning the pupils entered their classroom to find that the calendar had disappeared. Outraged and suspecting that it had been taken by some of its detractors the pupils determined to go on strike and strike they did. They fashioned placards bearing such slogans as "we want our calendar back" marched through the streets of the Town and paid no heed to the school bell calling them to class. It is said that they returned when one of the trustees promised them a big feed but whether this is so and whether they will get it is not known but they did go back to school after only being absent some hours. One of the elements of melodrama is missing after all because it is customary to have the mystery solved before the end. In this story the mystery is still a mystery but the fact that the source of controversy has disappeared, no matter how, has cleared the air and all is quiet again in Kensington High School.—S.

Many Turn Out For R.C.A.F. Parade In Summerside

Favored by fine spring weather citizens of Summerside turned out by hundreds yesterday to hear the central band of the R.C.A.F. and see a parade of airmen and air cadets through the streets of the town. During the band concert in Memorial Park that followed the parade Sir Alexander Clutterbuck, British High Commissioner who is visiting in Charlottetown, accompanied by an official party arrived. He was being conducted on a sight seeing tour of the Island and his arrival in Summerside was timed to coincide with the concert. The parade formed up at the Queen Hotel and proceeded down Water Street to Granville, Granville to Convent to Summer and to the Square. It was under command of Squadron Leader Lane staff. D.F.C., commanding officer of the station and consisted of two flights of airmen and the Summerside Air Cadet Squadron under Flying Officer Norman MacLeod Jr. This is the first Air Force parade since the station reopened and it was evident that the people were happy to see them back by the numbers that lined the streets. At the park Acting Mayor Henry Wedge introduced the band and said that during the war years the relations between the people of the Town and the personnel of the Air Force station had always been cordial and he was happy to have them return. He welcomed the band to the Town and said he felt sure that their concert would be much enjoyed. The band is a 29-piece musical organization under the command of Squadron Leader W. H. Dunphy and Sqdn. Ldr. R. Lawlor. Squadron Leader Dunphy is a native of Cherry Valley, P.E.I., and a former student of St. Dunstan's University. The band leader is WO 2 C. O. Hunt. The band has headquarters in Trenton, Ont., and works mostly in Central Air Command. They are concluding a tour of air force stations in the Maritime and on leaving here will proceed to Moncton and then to Goose Bay, Labrador. It is doubtful if a band of their calibre ever played in Summerside before. Their performance met with an enthusiastic response by the people was quite evident from the applause. Their repertoire ranged from light classical numbers to swing and included a number of marches. Selections from the musical comedy Oklahoma were received with much enthusiasm as was Cole Porter's "Begin the Beguine."
