CHICKS TAKING CARE OF GROWING

The care of growing chicks, especially during warm weather, is most important. The baby chicks may be smart little fellows, and they may have been brooded carefully for the first two or three weeks, unless they receive proper care and management during their later growing period they will not develop properly, and many of them will be lost by sickness or disease.

Coops and Houses

The chicks should be provided with large, roomy coops, or houses which will give them a comfortable place to stay at night and during the stormy weather. No particular kind of house is necessary but it should be so built that it will provide the chicks with lots of light, pure air, and sunshine, and protect them from dampness, and storm of all kinds. It also should be arranged so that it can be cleaned easily and frequently.

GIVE THEM FRESH LAND.

It is never advisable to rear chickens in the same yards or up on the same soil that the old hens have used. Give them new soil that is sweet and free from disease germs. Such a place as a cultivated orchard, potato patch, root or where there is a growing crop of corn, field, or in fact any place such a nature that they cannot destroy it will be an ideal spot for the chicks.

PLENTY OF SHADE

During the warmer months shade is very important. This can be provided by the growing crop orchard, shrubs or even the raising of the house and in some cases, made from boughs or cotton screens is an advantage.

FEEDING

The feeding of a flock of chicks during the growing season should not be laborious. Though plenty of feed is required it may be given in such way that the minimum amount of labour is entailed. For this purpose, hepper feeding is very much to be recommended. A home-made hopper in which mixed grains and mash can be placed and to which the chicks can have access at all times insures plenty of feed for the chicks with very little labour on the part of the attendant. If the chicks are late and it is necessary to hurry them in order to get their growth in plenty of time for the fall, a moist mash fed once a day will help them, and milk before them at all times is a decided advantage.

Raspberry Sherbet

3 cupsful of boiling water,
2 cupsful of raspberry juice,
1 cupful of corn syrup,
2 tablespoonsful of lemon juice,
1 egg white.

Wash the berries, squeeze through a cheesecloth. Pour boiling water over the syrup and add to the fruit juice and lemon juice and freeze, when partly frozen add the stiffly beaten white of egg, stir in well and finish freezing.

Green Gooseberry Pudding

Boil a pint of gooseberries till soft; add a teaspoonful of sugar. When cold mix in five well beaten eggs and two ounces of butter. Butter a mold and sprinkle thickly with flour and fine bread crumbs; then carefully pour in the mixture. Cover the top with bread crumbs and sugar to the depth of one inch; dot over with butter and bake one hour. Serve with cream.

Cataract On Eye May End Cobb's Career

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 16.—Tyrus Cobb may never play baseball again after this season, for the great ball player is badly handicapped by a cataract on his right eye. Hereafter all of the Georgia Peach's baseball activity may be confined to the manager's bench.

After the present playing season ends Ty Cobb is coming to Boston where specialists will perform an operation to save his eye. If the cataract is a serious one it is doubtful if Cobb, after submitting to the operation will ever dare to face a pitched ball again. The cataract now is noticeable and Ty's eye is badly bloodshot.

CARE OF THE CHICKS ON RANGE

(Experimental Farms Note)
The care of the chicks while in the brooder stage is most important, for at that time the largest mortality occurs, yet the subsequent care of the chicks that have lived through the brooder stage has very much to do with the success or failure of the birds later.

Plenty of Heat.

Do not cut down the heat too soon until the chicks are well feathered, and even after that if the weather is cold and changeable, they will require a certain amount of heat, whether they are raised naturally or artificially.

Naturally Raised Chicks

The hen will probably leave the chicks to themselves by the time they are feathered, sometimes even before, and it is well to have the chicks housed in a fairly comfortable coop or colony house, so that when the hen leaves them they will be quite comfortable and can get along without her.

Artificially Raised Chicks.

The same care as to heat and comfortable rearing quarters should be given to the chicks that are hatched and reared artificially, and sometimes even more care is necessary.

Plenty of Shade.

During the warmer months shade chard, shrubs or even the raising is very important. This can be provided by the growing crop, or of the house and in some cases, made from boughs or cotton screens is an advantage.

The First Feed

Allow the chicks to remain in the incubator for 24 hours after the hatch is completed. A chick so hardened off will have a great deal more "brooder intelligence" than one removed too soon and will learn more quickly where to go for warmth and comfort.

Range and Shade

An abundance of free range with plenty of shade is necessary if the chicks are to grow rapidly and develop into vigorous fowls. Growing chicks, in hot weather it should eat in quantities of green feed, bugs, worms etc., therefore requiring less grain and they are also less liable to sickness or disease.

place goes to Johanna Pontiac Segis owned by J. W. Stewart with 34.08 pounds butter from 677.2 milk. Mr. A. C. Hardy again scores with Avondale Pontiac Pauline making 33.94 pounds butter from 496.5 pounds milk average test being better than 5.5 per cent Johanna has the honor of standing sixth in the highest seven day butter record. The seventh place goes to Princess Pesch Albino owned by John D. Smith with 33.31 pounds from 685.7 pounds milk. Another outstanding cow in the junior three year old class is Hill-Crest Rauwerd Sadie with 600 pounds milk and 31.86 pounds butter; she holds fifth place in Highest Seven day butter records for junior three year olds.

Taking the list of records I find that forty cows have passed the thirty pound record this year, and that one hundred and nineteen have made records ranging from twenty five to thirty pounds butter, while one hundred and four have made records from fifteen pounds to thirty two pounds butter in 7 days. This latter heifer Glen Alex Queen DeKol has 32.81 pounds butter and 577.7 pounds milk and leads her class being the best senior two year old in Canada. She also holds the Canadian thirty day record for her age having 2413 pounds milk and 131.78 pounds of butter having an average test of 4.3 per cent.

This one can see by the above records the possibilities of the dairy cow when bred along producing lines and properly fed and looked after.

A careful perusal of the year book of any of the dairy breeds should tend to the improvement of our herds and eventually result in larger incomes.
